You can either panic or persevere when you are under pressure. Which one do you think God wants you to do?

We do not want you to be uninformed, brothers and sisters, about the troubles we experienced in the province of Asia. We were under great pressure, far beyond our ability to endure, so that we despaired of life itself. Indeed, we felt we had received the sentence of death. But this happened that we might not rely on ourselves but on God, who raises the dead.

2 Corinthians 1:8-9 NIV

Paul learned that in his own ability he could not handle the stress of life. But he also learned that in God's power he could handle anything. How did he learn that lesson? Through the things he suffered.

I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me.

Consider it pure joy, my brothers and sisters, whenever you face trials of many kinds, because you know that the testing of your faith produces perseverance. Let perseverance finish its work so that you may be mature and complete, not lacking anything.

James 1:2-4 NIV

When you go through suffering, you can face it with resentment or gratitude with complaining or rejoicing; with worry or worship; with fear or faith; with self-dependence or self-surrender.

When you ask God "Why?" and demand an explanation, you're not really looking for an answer. You're looking for an argument. Instead of saying "God, why are you doing this to me?" you should say what Jesus said: Father, not my will, but your will be done (see Luke 22:42). Do whatever it takes to make me like Jesus in this trial I'm facing. My life is in your hands.
