We Hear & Respond to God's Word

PARAMENTS

A reading from Isaiah: "In the wilderness prepare the way of the Lord, make straight in the desert a highway for our God. Every valley shall be lifted up, and every mountain and hill made low. Then the glory of the Lord shall be revealed." (Isaiah 40:3-5)

We place the Advent paraments, which are blue, a color of hope and expectation, but also comfort, reminding us that our hope is in Jesus who is coming soon. And so we cry in this Advent season: "Come, Lord Jesus!"

ADVENT WREATH

A reading from Jeremiah: "The days are surely coming says the Lord, when I will raise up for David a righteous branch, and He shall reign as king and deal wisely, and shall execute justice and righteousness in the land. In His days Judah will be saved and Israel will live in safety. And this is the name by which He will be called: 'The Lord is our Righteousness.'" (Jeremiah 23:5-6)

The Advent Wreath is a vivid symbol of preparation. The lighting of a new candle each of the four weeks before Christmas reminds us that something is happening, but more is yet to come. The circle of evergreens reminds us of the everlasting covenant offered in the birth of Jesus. The four candles symbolize **hope**, **peace**, **joy**, and **love**. Today, we light the first candle as a symbol of Christ, our hope. May the light sent from God shine in the darkness to show us the way of salvation.



WREATHS

A reading from Isaiah: "The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who dwelt in the land of the shadow of death, among them a light has shined. For unto us a child is born, unto us a Son is given. And the government will be upon His shoulder, and His name shall be called Wonderful, Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace." (Isaiah 9:2, 6-7)

From ancient times, evergreens have been considered a symbol of eternity, a sign of God's everlasting nature. Isaiah tells us that there will be no end to the reign of the Messiah. Therefore, we hang wreaths shaped in circles as a sign of everlasting life. These are symbols of Christ's gift of eternal life and of the celebration of Christmas itself.

POINSETTIAS

A reading from Numbers: "I see Him, but not now; I behold Him, but not near...a star shall come out of Jacob and a scepter shall rise out of Israel." (Numbers 24:17)

The poinsettia speaks to us symbolically in several ways. The star shaped formation of ten leaves calls to mind the star which shone that first Christmas. In a less joyous sense, the color of the flower is blood red, reminding us of the male infants killed because King Herod wanted to eliminate any threat to his throne. We sometimes forget this part of the story, which made it necessary for Mary, Joseph, and the Christ Child to flee to Egypt.

Hymn: "Lo, How a Rose E'er Blooming" (Hymn #272, Verses 1 & 4)

MANGER

A reading from Luke: "And while they were there, the time came for her to be delivered. And she gave birth to her first-born son and wrapped Him in swaddling cloths, and laid Him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn." (Luke 2:6-7)

The manger, or crèche, is placed as a reminder that Jesus Christ was born in the humblest of places, because humankind would not make room in their heart to hold the Son of God. Jesus, who

was born in this most modest beginning, has compassion on all God's children— from the humblest to the richest.

CAROLING

A reading from the Psalms: "O sing to the Lord a new song; sing to the Lord, all the earth, sing to the Lord, bless his name; tell of His salvation from day to day. Declare His glory among the nations, His marvelous works among all the peoples. For great is the Lord and greatly to be praised. Honor and majesty are before Him; strength and beauty are in His sanctuary." (Psalm 96:1-4a, 6)

We are a singing church. Martin Luther believed that, next to the Word of God, music deserved the highest praise. The singing of carols is one of the greatest joys of the season.

EVERGREEN TREES

A reading from Micah: "But you, O Bethlehem, from you shall come forth one who is to rule in Israel, whose origin is from ancient days. And He shall stand and feed His flock in the strength of the Lord, in the majesty of the name of the Lord His God. And they shall live secure, for now He shall be great to the ends of the earth; and He shall be the one of peace." (Micah 5:2, 4)

In ancient times the cedar was revered as the tree of royalty. It also signified immortality and was used for purification. We have placed these trees in the sanctuary as a symbol of Christ, who reigns as King forever, and whose coming will purify our hearts.

LIGHT OF THE WORLD

A reading from John: "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through Him, and without Him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in Him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it. The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world. He was in

the world, and the world came into being through Him, yet the world did not know Him. He came to what was His own, and His own people did not accept Him. But to all who received Him, who believed in His name, He gave power to become children of God, who were born not of the blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God. And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen His glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth." (John 1:1-5, 9)

As our final preparation for the coming of Jesus, the Light of the World, we will light the evergreen trees. Whenever you see a lighted tree, let it call to mind the One who brings light into our darkness, healing to our brokenness, and peace to all who receive him. May these trees remind us of the life-giving cross, that we may always rejoice in the new life that shines in our hearts.


