Ponderings by Pastor JoEllyn...



There are times in life when another's circumstances are not fully

understood. Unfortunately, during these times, we make judgement calls, we try to find answers that are not ours to find. It would be easier to ask our friend/family member, "let's talk about what you're going through?"

That old expression comes to mind, "Walk a Mile in My Shoes." Others need us to walk along side them, they do not need our opinions or judgment, they merely need our support.

It's safe to say, we are quick to judge without knowing someone else's story. Today let's focus on stuffing our size 8's into another's size 6 footwear. Let's walk with them, not in front of them showing them what we believe, but by their side in solidarity.

Philippians 3: 12-16 shares the following:

¹² Not that I have already obtained this or have already reached the goal; but I press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me his own. ¹³ Beloved, I do not consider that I have made it my own; but this one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, ¹⁴ I press on towards the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of

God in Christ Jesus. ¹⁵ Let those of us then who are mature be of the same

mind; and if you think differently about anything, this too God will reveal to you. ¹⁶ Only let us hold fast to what we have attained.

There are times when we have to step back and allow our people to *Shake it Off and Press On:*

There was a farmer who discovered that his donkey had fallen into a dry well. The animal cried pitifully for hours as the farmer tried to figure out what to do for his poor donkey. Finally, he concluded that the well was too deep, and it really needed to be covered up anyway. Besides, the donkey was old, and it would be a lot of trouble to get him out of the pit. The farmer decided that it was not worth trying to retrieve the animal, so he asked his neighbors to help him fill in the well and bury the donkey.

They all grabbed shovels and began to toss dirt into the well. The donkey immediately realized what was happening, and he began to bray horribly. Crying would be our normal response if somebody was mistreating us this badly, so this donkey was responding the same way we would at first, but then he got really quiet. A few shovel loads of dirt later, the farmer looked down the well and was astonished at what he saw. With every shovel of dirt that hit the donkey's back, the donkey would shake it off and step on top of it.

As the neighbors and farmer continued to shovel dirt on top of the animal, he continued to shake it off and take a step up. Pretty soon the donkey shook off the last shovel full of dirt, took a step up, and walked right out of the well.

We can learn from this story. When trouble comes, if we will get still and listen, God will tell us what to do. By the grace and the mercy of God, we are able to shake off a lot of things in our lives: hurt feelings, mistreatment, abuse, unfair...unjust...unkind things. Just like the donkey, in order to keep pressing on and have victory in our lives, we are going to have to learn to shake off the troubles that come our way.

Our purpose is to support those around us, it's their story to tell, not ours. They need a listening ear; we need to sit back and offer support. I think I can do this...... can you?

Trustees has been hard at work checking things off their to do list and other things that crop up..

The memorial benches have been placed on the pads in the memorial circle.

The trees down the parsonage driveway have been trimmed.

The bushes around the church have been trimmed..

The church roof started leaking... Estimates were given and Kolar roofing was selected to replace the roof.

The cost of the replacement was turned into Church Mutual Insurance

and all we have to pay out of pocket, is the deductible of \$1000..

Upon replacement of roof, damage under the steeple was detected.. This will have to be done later as the steeple will need to be removed and that can't be done during winter...

Kolor will resubmit an estimate to the insurance for this, and will find a company with a crane who can remove the steeple..



VALPARAISO — Activities people enjoy sometimes take a back seat in order for them to focus on life. For many, that hobby is music, and a regional group is dedicated to giving those wanting to pick up the instruments they left gathering dust a place and chance to do so. The Northwest Indiana Rusty Strings Orchestra, based in Valparaiso, includes residents from all over the region who played in high school or college or after, and would like to play again.

Carrie Ann Carlson, the orchestra's new conductor, said the group was for people who wanted to play in an orchestra, but time and other priorities got in the way. There is no audition process and all of the

material is meant to help musicians remember how to play sheet music, while providing concertgoers quality music from established composers. "We take people wherever they are ...," Carlson said. "People are going to be coming in here at all different levels and it's as much for camaraderie and just the experience of socializing with other musicians, and being together and making music."

However, she said, they do not accept just anyone. Those who wish to join must have a background in whatever instrument they desire to play.

"If you can't play your instrument, we don't give lessons," Carlson said. "We're just there to facilitate people 18 and older who were probably in their high school orchestra or college orchestra or are teachers."

Currently, 27 people are signed up to

play, but she expects more to join.
Carlson took over as conductor from
Tom Schnabel, the founder of Rusty
Strings. She said many of her former
students and colleagues asked her to
do it.

"I got some arm-twisting and that type of thing, and finally my husband said, 'Carrie, you should do this,'" she said.

Schnabel, Carlson's colleague at Duneland Schools, started the orchestra in 2017. The idea came, he said, when many former orchestra students he met later would apologize for not continuing their musical interests outside of school. "I'd always obviously say 'no big deal," Schnabel said, "but it led me to wonder why there wasn't a place for full-on amateurs to play, especially considering how many strong string programs there are around."

After he retired in June 2017, Schnabel started a Facebook page to see if anybody was interested in joining. Once word got out, he started reaching out to different retirement areas to find a space for rehearsals.


The group's first concert was in December 2017, and the group has played regularly at any places that would have them, including Pines Village, Anderson Winery and Valparaiso Nazarene Church. However, he said, the group had to go on hiatus in March 2020 due to the pandemic.

Some of the members say the group is a great addition to their life.
Patrick Barriball of Valparaiso, who plays violin, said he never thought he'd play again.

"It [my violin] was in a closet for 20 years," he said. "It has been great to play again, and the fact that there is no pressure or judgment on ability makes it something to look forward to. I know many of my fellow 'Rustys' feel the same way."
