(Ron Lee Davis, "Rejoicing in Our Suffering," Preaching Today, Tape No. 74.)

Years ago, there was a master violinist in Europe. He would play in concerts, and he had a magnificent Stradivarius violin, extremely expensive. He would play the Stradivarius violin in concert and everyone would whisper in the crowd, "Listen to the beautiful sounds of the Stradivarius."

He would play in churches, and people would say, "Listen to the beautiful sounds of the Stradivarius." He even played before kings and queens, and they, too, would turn to one another and say, "Listen to the beautiful sounds of the Stradivarius." All the glory went to the instrument.

Then one day this master violinist was walking by a pawn shop. He noticed an old, beat-up, worn-out violin. He walked into the pawn shop and asked how much it would cost. The owner of the pawn shop told him the American equivalent of five dollars. He bought the violin, and he took it home.

He polished it, and he refined it, and he tuned it, and he re-tuned it, and he built some character into that violin. Then, when he was to play the greatest performance of his life in a concert hall, he took out the little, five-dollar, worn-out, beat- up violin that he had polished and refined. He put it up to his chin, and he began to play, and everybody in the concert hall whispered, "Listen to the beautiful sounds of the Stradivarius."

It should be our goal to allow God to "play" us and use us for His glory and honor to the point that people see Him, and not us.

The Bible says in: Matthew 5:16 – Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in heaven.

This is truly reflecting the praise to the master musician. Let your life be a mirror that reflects the goodness God give and the blessings we receive from Him daily.

Bette's Bits & Bytes:

I began studying about the Feasts, in my home church gathering, several years ago.. September rolls around & I start thinking about the Fall Feasts of Israel that will soon began...

Rosh Hashanah, known as Feast of Trumpets or Days of Awe, begins Sept 25, ends Sept 27.. Ten days later, Oct. 5 will be the feast, Day of Atonement, also known as Day of Judgement, (a Day to repent). Five days later, the last of the three fall feast, Sukkot, or Festival of Tabernacles or Booths will begin Oct 9, ... These feasts begin at sundown & end at sundown...

God declares these feasts to be HIS appointed times. In <u>Leviticus 23:1–2</u>, the Lord told Moses, "Speak to the Israelites and tell them: These are <u>MY</u> appointed times, the times of the LORD that you will proclaim as sacred assemblies" (CSB) ... He didn't say they were the Jews appointed times... He said "My"...

As Christians we're not required to keep the Feasts, but shouldn't we want to celebrate with the Father the days that are special to Him?". Since Jesus came & died on the cross for us, Once & For All, I do not believe we will be doing blood sacrifices in the New Kingdom..

The ultimate Day of Judgment of sin will come. Jesus' death demonstrated that sin must be judged. He received the judgement in our place. His resurrection shows that God has appointed Him the Judge (see John 5:21-27; 12:31; and Acts 17:31). The Ultimate Day of Judgement will come when the trumpet shall sound and Jesus the Messiah returns to judge the earth (I Thess. 4:16; I Cor. 15:52). He will preside over the heavenly court. We are called to repent and celebrate the New Creation that has begun in the Messiah (2 Cor. 5:17; Romans 5:12-19; and I Cor. 15:45) and will come in fullness when he returns (Romans 9:19-22). excerpted from https://www1.cbn.com/roshhashanah-and-days-awe

Food Pantry News by Rose Lenig First of all, "THANKS TO ALL OF YOU WHO HELPED OUR CHURCH MAKE ITS QUOTO OF 45 BAGS OF FLOUR AND 45 BAGS OF SUGAR FOR THE PANTY' THANKSGIVING DINNER ITEMS GIVEN AWAY. We even ended up with more than our share with the Christian Church. Because the pantry is expecting 90 families, there will be two days - Wednesday, November 16th and Thursday, November 17th.

Secondly, the pantry has been blessed by the love that has been shown us by you and the community so that we can have the funds to buy the food given to the clients and for food given to us to keep the pantry stocked. For the 5th year the pantry has received a \$3,000 grant from the Unity Foundation. This year's budget is \$36, 075. Thanks to you and the community for participating in the



money makers - Culvers, Dollar Dogs and Bake Sale at Kablin's as well as the financial donations and food.

So Jesus approaches the threshold of our being with beckoning love, and He waits for us to open our life to Him from the inside.

To enter into that intimate relationship where Jesus becomes our Savior is to let Jesus be with and within us, person to person, on the emotional and volitional levels of our being. It is to respond to the contagion of His presence. It is to let down whatever defenses we have in place so that we come together heart to heart, so the the spirit in Him touches and resonates with the spirit in us. It is to meet Him with our deepest feelings and fears, with our aspirations and imaginations, with our desires and loyalties, with our creative energies and selfunderstanding. It is to meet Him with our shadow side and our hidden face, risking His acceptance of all we are--even those things about ourselves we have rejected and tried to disguise. It is to meet Him with the expectation that what happens between Him and us will enlarge life with fulfillment and beauty. It is to enjoy with Him that same pervasive sense of wellbeing and excitement that quickens in us when we spend unhurried time with good friends or when we share intimate moments of oneness with those we love.
