Remembering Pope Francis: A Personal Reflection

By now, since Monday, you have likely heard so much about Pope Francis in the news and across various tributes that I don't think it's worth repeating it all here in this bulletin. His life, teachings, travels, and papal milestones have been well-covered. But I felt it was important to take a moment to share a more personal reflection—how Pope Francis' papacy has shaped my own priesthood and faith journey.

Pope Francis was elected in March 2013, just a year before I was ordained to the priesthood. In that sense, he is the only pope I have known as a priest—his voice, his gestures, and his shepherding presence have accompanied me all through this sacred vocation. From the very beginning, his election surprised many. He was a cardinal not widely known and not mentioned among the likely successors to Pope Benedict XVI. Even his choice of name —Francis—signaled something new. He came from the peripheries, both geographically and

institutionally, and many of us, me included, wondered how he would lead the Church and how he would be received.

But almost immediately, Pope Francis began to leave a mark—not just on the Vatican, but on the hearts of many, including my own. His deep prayerfulness, his simplicity, and his humble gestures spoke louder than any preaching. I remember being stuck by his decision to live in the Casa Santa Marta questhouse instead of the papal apartments.

That simple act spoke volumes: he was a pope who would walk among us.

He made it clear early on that he came from the margins, and he wanted the Church to move outward —toward those who feel forgotten, excluded, or unloved. That resonated with me. It reminded me that priesthood is not about status, but about service. It's about finding Christ in the poor, the broken, and the invisible. That has shaped how I interact with those entrusted to my care.

One of the defining moments of his pontificate, for me, was when he called the Extraordinary Jubilee Year of Mercy in 2015. He reminded us that "God never tires of forgiving us; we are the ones who tire of seeking His mercy." This statement changed the way I approach the Sacrament of Reconciliation, both as a confessor and a penitent. It reminded me that mercy is not a soft option—it is the very face of God.

Pope Francis was never afraid to initiate uncomfortable but necessary conversations—within the Church, among clergy, and in society at large. He challenged clericalism, the abuse of power, and called out life-draining bureaucracy in the Church's structures. And in recent years, his focus on the Synod on Synodality encouraged us to walk together, to listen deeply, and to grow as a family of God—not as isolated voices, but in communion.

He has been referred the People's Pope, and rightly so. Even in his final hours, he wished to be known not by title, but by his deep connection to the people he loved and served so passionately. He didn't retreat into grand halls of isolation and despair despite his frail health. Instead, he has remained close to the suffering, the marginalized, and the faithful till the end.

His legacy continues to influence how I treat people, how I welcome them, and how I strive to walk with them. He taught us that the Church must be a field hospital, not a fortress. That we are called not to condemn, but to accompany.

I was blessed to see Pope Francis in person for the first time during the World Meeting of Families in Philadelphia in September 2015.

I saw him again in Rome—twice on the same day—on Ash Wednesday in 2019. Those brief moments were life changing and affirming to my priesthood and ministry.

He will be greatly missed and always deeply loved. May his example continue to inspire us all to be people of mercy, simplicity, and joy.

May Pope Francis rest in peace. Amen. Fr. Leonard

our float and welcome your ideas, time, and talents as we prepare to win again!


Women's Bible Study
