As we gather on this second Sunday of February and continue to reflect on Black History Month, I would like to introduce you to one of my favorite saints, Saint Josephine Bakhita. She holds a special place in our hearts as the first saint canonized from Sudan.

Bakhita was born in 1869, and her early years were marked by unimaginable suffering. At the tender age of seven, she was kidnapped and thrust into a life of slavery. For the next six years, she endured the cruel fate of being bought and sold more than 10 times; treated as a mere commodity, and deemed worthless by her various owners. She bore the physical scars of her ordeal, with 114 lash marks on her body; a constant reminder of the brutality she endured.

However, a glimmer of hope emerged when Bakhita, at the age of 13, was purchased by an Italian ambassador residing in Sudan. Recognizing her strong work ethic and endearing personality, he treated her with kindness and compassion. Yet, when she turned 18, Bakhita was once again sold, this time to another Italian family who decided to return to Italy. It was in Italy that Bakhita's life took a profound turn. There, she encountered the Christian faith for the first time, meeting devout Catholics who lived their faith deeply.

After attending church, someone gifted her a crucifix and explained to her the significance of Jesus choosing the cross as the ultimate symbol of love. This encounter deeply moved Bakhita, and she found solace in Christ crucified. In Him, she discovered a figure who endured torture, scourging, and mockery, yet never ceased to love.

Bakhita realized that despite her own wounds and the degrading treatment she had endured, she was called to love in a manner akin to Jesus.

Bakhita went on to be baptized and became a Canossian Sister; dedicating herself to the education of children. The children affectionately referred to her as "Moretta," meaning "Black Mother." When she shared her story of being a former slave with the children, they would sometimes gently tug at her sleeve to glimpse at her scars.

One day, a young child asked Sister Bakhita, "What would you do if you were to meet your captors?"

Without hesitation, she replied, "If I were to encounter those who kidnapped me, and even those who tortured me, I would kneel and kiss their hands. For without those painful experiences, I would not have embraced the Catholic faith and my calling as a nun today."

In the remarkable life of Saint Josephine Bakhita, we find a powerful example of forgiveness, resilience, and the transformative power of faith. May her story inspire us all to love and forgive as she did.




