SAINT JUNÍPERO SERRA

(1713-1784) July 1

No one who has stood before the quiet majesty of Mission San Juan Capistrano, or the altogether different but no less lovely Mission Dolores in San Francisco, or any of the missions from San Diego to Sonoma can fail to bless the Franciscan padre who, while not founder of each, was inspiration for them all, Saint Junipero Serra. Abandoning the comfortable academic life to which his doctorate in theology entitled him, Serra journeyed to the New World where his tireless traveling, dramatic preaching, and penitential austerity converted thousands of native peoples. Saving souls and celebrating the sacraments were Padre Serra's primary mission but not his only one. Education in letters and crafts, trades and agriculture transformed the people, while roads and irrigation systems transfigured the landscape. His more than thirty years of ministry were not free from conflict with authorities or without controversy in the retrospectively critical eye of history. But when John Paul II beatified him in 1988, he praised Padre Serra for assisting his converts to use their new faith to advance their true human development.

BISHOP UPDATES TO CURRENT LITURGICAL/SACRAMENTAL PRAXIS:

- a) Clergy and EMHCs (with the approval of the pastor) may begin distribution of Holy Communion in a private home where all persons residing there have been absent any fever, chills, cold or coronavirus symptoms for the previous 14 days. The Communion Minister is to wear a mask the entire time in the home (no exceptions), sanitize his/her hands upon entry prior to set up that maintains six feet of distance from all persons present (except at the brief moment of distribution of Holy Communion) and sanitize one's hands after distribution of Holy Communion and again outside the residence's door and prior to entry into one's vehicle. The determination of which Communion Ministers are allowed to assist with this ministry at this time and which homebound communicants are able to receive is the Pastor's.
- b) Nursing homes are still problematic due to the ongoing changes of law and health directives. Pastors are invited to contact nursing home administrators directly to begin a dialogue about these pastoral and/or communion visits that are not danger of death situations.
- c) Masks remain required for all who are entering/exiting our Churches for Masses.
- d) While Governor Parson and the State of Missouri has ended promulgation of additional health directives, those of the local county and/or city remain in force and to be followed (for example, KC is up to 50% occupancy through July 5 currently). The governmental, CDC, and KCSJ of our Bishop, still require six feet social distancing. Weekend Masses, weddings, funerals, and other large worship gathering still REQUIRE six feet social distancing between individuals and/or household groups. For weddings, it is best to provide the engaged couple with a template of the pews layout and have them 'assign' seats to individuals and household groups with the approved six feet separation as a master template for the presider, the (parish) wedding coordinator, and the ushers. The number of wedding guests and funeral participants, for example, is limited in ALL our parishes by this six-foot social distancing requirement that remains diocesan particular law.
- e) The previously presented Large Group Gatherings published mid-May continues in force: "Large parish gathering events are currently not possible due to the above restrictions. Unless the "Phase" guidelines change, church group activities like float trips, picnics, ice cream socials, carnivals, fundraisers, auctions and other "mass gathering" events should not occur through **August 10, 2020**." An exception to this timeline can be considered by written proposal (which may or may not be approved) of all safety steps and protocols, meeting the six foot distancing, and so on requirements submitted to Fr Ken Riley and/or Mr. Pat Miller at the chancery.

Thank you for your ongoing attention to these and related matters. As circumstances change, guidelines will be updated accordingly.
