TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Eastern Catholic and Orthodox Christians share a love for the Byzantine liturgy because it is during the Eucharist that the Church is most true to its identity, expresses its integrity, and discovers its vocation. Eastern Catholic and Orthodox Christians celebrate essentially the identical liturgy, with only very slight variations. It is a fairly complex ritual weaving together three separate layers of prayers: a liturgy prayed in the sanctuary by priests, often hidden by a curtain or screen; a liturgy sung by the assembly and led by a deacon in front of a screen formed of painted icons; and a third layer of private prayer by the priest, who prays in support of the deacon and the faithful. It is an eyeswide-open experience, gorgeous in visuals, and filled with the sound of God's people singing prayer. The energy of the worship centers on the presence of Christ, largely through an awareness of heaven touching earth when the Church gathers to celebrate.

In the late twentieth century, Latin Rite Catholics were encouraged to embrace a style of worship that was "full, conscious, and active," a value that has never been lost in the East. The liturgy has great impact in its beauty, in its poetry and contemplation, and by the actions of bowing, signing with the cross, and chanting that are required of the assembly. Contact with the Eastern Church reveals some key values that have been obscured in our own Church and are slowly being recovered.

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK



Dear Parishioners and friends of St. Monica,

This coming Sunday, as a parish family we will celebrate the patronal feast of our parish. St. Monica is a saint that I have come to know and love because she reminds me of my grandmother. My grandmother was a woman of simplicity but of great faith. I remember seeing her everyday praying her rosary. She would pray the rosary while working or even walking. Every small break

from her chores meant catching on her beads. She prayed constantly.

As a young boy I would wonder, "Why does grandma pray so much. Is it because she does not receive what she prays for?" And so one day I decided to ask her, "Grandma why do you pray so much, day after day, don't you get what you always pray for." To which she told me, "my grandson, **we become what we pray**." In other words, prayer helps us to see ourselves better, and then forms us to be the persons God intended us to be.

This is true when we think about the life of St. Monica. She was not only a woman who persistently prayed for the conversion of her husband and her son. But eventually what happened is that as she continued to pray for her family, her prayers and tears started to change her from within, to become the woman God intended her to be; a saintly woman. For persistent prayer helped her to be more compassionate, more loving, more patient and eventually growth in perseverance. In other words she became the first, beneficially, of her prayer.

And so, as a parish community under the patronage and guardianship of St. Monica, we just don't emulate her prayer life so that God can grant us all our individual private needs. But as a parish community, we enter into prayer and worship so that we can align our wills to that of God and become a saintly people. I would like to extend a word of welcome to all visitors and friends of St. Monica.
