# From the Kítchen of Kathy Sampson

# **Raisin Spice Oatmeal Cookies**

2 cups sifted flour

- 1 tsp. baking soda
- 1 tsp. salt
- 2 tsp. cinnamon
- 1/2 tsp. nutmeg

1-1/4 cups shortening 1 cup brown sugar

1/2 cup granulated sugar

2 eggs

1/4 cup milk

1-1/4 cups raisins 3-1/3 cups quick oats

Blend shortening, sugar, eggs and milk. Sift flour, soda, salt and spices together and add to shortening mixture. Beat until smooth. Add raisins and oats. Mix well. Drop by teaspoon on lightly greased or non-stick baking sheet. Bake at 375 degrees for 12-15 minutes. Makes about 6 dozen.

This recipe was one my mother made often. It is always popular at PAHS events. We say it is good for you because it is made with oatmeal.

### Settler's Homes Different from Today

When homesteading, the first thing to come to mind was a house sturdy enough to provide shelter to withstand the storms of the first year and those to come in a new environment. Of course, that was on Asa Clark's mind when he left his son and friends in Pewaukee and returned to Vermont for the rest of his family, and that's exactly what the young men did over that first summer here.

After clearing the land, the decision of the size was foremost. The cabins were made of the best materials available. Some woods were too heavy to be easily carried Show Us Your **Collection** to the site, some split too easily, some were bug infested, and of course pine logs were out not only because they rotted, but also because they burned too easily. Tamrack from the swamps were the best because it was almost indestructible, but ash. walnut, poplar, chestnut, and maple were also used. The logs had to be straight and uniform in size to be joined easily.

Foundations for the cabin could be a simple dugout filled with stone or rocks, or sawn posts to support the floor above. Most times just a dirt floor was laid over the foundation. For walls, the logs used were dove-tailed to fit together and then pegged to provide as snug a fit as possible. Later the chinks were stuffed with moss to keep out the winter winds. Doors and windows were cut into the completed walls and measured as exactly as possible to fit the

frames which had been premade. Most families shuttered the windows at night for protection against weather, animals and roving Indians who were not always friendly!

An opening was left in one of the walls for the fireplace which extended outside of the cabin to prevent fires from burning the cabin down. Fireplaces were composed of rocks stuck together with mud, and the fires dried the mud and made it hard. Most times the fireplace was planked and held together on the outside with bolts to keep it all in place. The fireplace provided warmth, if you were close enough, and of course provided a source of heat for cooking, but by today's standards, they would have left much to be desired!
