

A Journey Back in Time....

I felt like this German saying, which translates to “The happiness of this world is on the backs of horses”, when I sat in a doctor’s buggy on Labor Day 2017. Beside me were my husband and my son and we were driving our horse, Tai, at a historical drive at Old World Wisconsin, a place to visit if you are a history fan and seek the feeling of living in the “Olden Days”. Just about a month earlier that day I had the luck to meet Carole Brinkman, then President of the PAHS, and we got to talking about the carriage exhibition in the Steele Building of the Clark House Museum on Wisconsin Ave. I admired the beautiful restoration of a doctor’s buggy and mentioned to Carole that our family owned horses and that it would be a great experience for us to use the buggy at a historical drive. If you know Carole, you know that this idea was put into action and so we got the opportunity to test the buggy for its usability and decided after a thorough test drive to go for it.

The big day arrived quickly and the buggy got another check-over and a wheel grease session on a field of prairie at Old World Wisconsin before we took off.

If you have not heard about it, members of the Dairyland Driving Club participate multiple times a season in historical and recreational horse drives at Old World Wisconsin. They show their original and carefully restored wooden vehicles and dress up in period clothing. In 2017 it was our chance to “shine” in the authentic doctor’s buggy borrowed from the Pewaukee Area Historical Society and to show Old World Wisconsin visitors how it could have looked like in the olden days when horse-drawn carriages were a common site in traffic and everyday life.

Jean's Salad

- 1 small pkg. Jello
- 1 8 oz. pkg. cream cheese
- 1/2 pint whipped cream, whipped

Heat pineapple fruit and juice. Stir in and dissolve Jello in pan with pineapple. Cut cream cheese in small slices and stir into warm pineapple/Jello mixture. Let mixture cool. Fold in whipped cream. Put in serving bowl. Refrigerate until served.

A Look at Pewaukee's Origins

Even before white men were here, Pewaukee was known as a gathering place to many Indian tribes. Permanent residents were the Potawatomi tribe who planted and harvested crops, but they had visitors from the Sac, Fox, and Winnebago as they passed through between summer and winter encampments.

The lake was called Sa-kaegan by the tribes, because it was a place of abundance and beauty. It had herbs, berries and nuts in addition to game in the forest and fish and wild rice in the lake. Sa-kaegan, by the way, translates to "Snail Lake"!

Deacon Asa Clark paid \$80 for a quarter section of land and returned to Vermont for his family to make the trip west. His eldest son, Timothy Lyman, along with three of his friends, were paid to stay behind to prepare for their arrival.

It was a long and arduous trip, and when they reached Milwaukee they bought a team of horses and the necessary tools to homestead in the wilderness. Upon arrival here, they built a temporary lean-to for shelter from the weather, and next they planted a garden of vegetables and oats to tide them over the winter. A team of oxen, costing \$6.00 per day was brought in to do the plowing.

The four young men built a log cabin overlooking the south shore of the lake in which the family started their new life. It is now part of the Connell property on Prospect Avenue. A replica of the cabin,

made by Asa's great-granddaughter can be seen upon request at the Pewaukee Historical Society Clark House Museum.

Unfortunately, need and want are two entirely different things. I'm resigned to sorting through the years' accumulations, enjoying my memories as I make the discard decisions.
