Abuse of Process, a novel by author Billy P. Smith, is a story about a ficticious empire brought to the brink of bankruptcy by shady lawyers, seasoned businessmen, and a news media corporate giant.

Smith said the book will be published by Erica House and should be available in bookstores by February, 2001.

The following is Smith's letter to Journal Editor Pauline Davis:

Dear Ms. Davis, Thanks for taking my call today. As mentioned, Mr. Davis was a big help during some very difficult times when the Albany Herald was having its field day with me several years ago. He was infuriated over the Herald's treatment of the owner of Simon's restaurant. A week or so after the articles the man died in an auto accident on the four lane that runs through Fort Benning near Columbus.

Over a drink at Carr's one evening we discussed this incident as it related to my problems. He was convinced that it was not an accident, but considered the possibility of it being suicide as a result of the article.

Mr. Davis mentioned my problem in the "Inside Albany" section of your paper. It offered insight and later in my case and with affidavits and tape recordings, I was able to prove that he was correct in his assumption. He wanted this material, but due to ongoing matters in my case, I was unable to discuss it. He encouraged me to write a book and expose what happened and offered suggestions and advice often when we saw each other. He even mentioned that he might like to run

excerpts of the book in the paper.
