WHAT'S ROTARY?

Rotary International is a volunteer organization of business and professional leaders who provide humanitarian service, and help to build goodwill and peace in the world. There are approximately 1.2 million Rotary club members belonging to 33,000 Rotary clubs in more than 200 countries and geographical areas.

Founded in Chicago in 1905, Rotary celebrated 100 years of service in 2005. The Rotary Foundation has awarded more than US\$ 4 billion in grants which are administered at the local level by Rotary clubs.

What is the purpose of Rotary?

Rotary clubs exist to improve communities through a range of humanitarian, intercultural and educational activities. Clubs advance international understanding by partnering with clubs in other countries. Rotary also encourages high ethical standards in all vocations.

What do Rotary clubs do?

Jesse Kurtz is a 25-year veteran sportscaster based in Colorado Springs. For the last 12 years he's served as one of the radio broadcasters for Air Force Football. In addition to his role as "The Voice of the Falcons", Kurtz is the lead anchor/host and Executive Producer of the Mountain West Network where he broadcasts college sports content all year long.

Prior to heading up the Mountain West Network, Kurtz spent more than 15 years as a television sports anchor/reporter, including ten years at the CBS affiliate (KKTV) in Colorado Springs. During that time, he also worked as a sideline reporter for nationally televised NFL games and college basketball contests.

Widely respected by his peers, Kurtz has been recognized on a local, regional and national level with the following awards:

Special Guests

Lesley Irvine



Lesley Irvine began her tenure as Vice President and Director of Athletics at Colorado College on June 1, 2019. In her role, Irvine serves on the President's cabinet and oversees Athletics and Recreation within the Division.

A native of England, Irvine was a three-time national champion in outdoor field hockey and two-time national champion for indoor field hockey while attending Loughborough University. Irvine also played for the England Under 18 and Under 21 National team.

Irvine earned a Bachelor of Science degree in physical education, sports science, and sport management at Loughborough University in 1998 and a master's degree in health, leisure, and sports studies with an emphasis in athletic administration from the University of Iowa in 2001. As a student athlete in field hockey, Irvine led the University of Iowa to the Big Ten regular

season title and an NCAA Final Four appearance in 1999.

During Irvine's tenure, Colorado College Athletics has experienced unprecedented success and several landmark moments including: 27 All-Americans, 15 Teams in NCAA Tournament, 10 Individuals in NCAA Tournament, 22 Team Conference Titles, 24 SCAC Elite19 Awards, and 21 Coach of the Year Awards. In the classroom, nearly 90 percent of all CC student-athletes earned a spot on their respective conference academic teams last season, while the men's cross country team had the highest grade-point average of any Division III team in the country at 3.81.

Prior to joining Colorado College, Irvine was Director of Athletics and Recreation and Chair of Physical Education at Pomona and Pitzer Colleges. Irvine was the senior associate athletic director and senior woman administrator at Bowling Green State University from 2010-15. From 2001-2010, she was the field hockey head coach at Stanford University, leading the Cardinal to three consecutive Northern Pacific Conference championships. She is a two-time conference Coach of the Year recipient and led her team to program highs in national ranking, wins, goals, assists, and points in 2009

Blessing 'Yemi' Mobolade




Blessing 'Yemi' Mobolade was born in Nigeria to two bi-vocational pastors. His father was in finance and his mother was a secondary education teacher. At age 17, he immigrated to the United States, following in the footsteps of his brother to pursue the American Dream through education. He has bachelor's degrees in business administration and computer information systems from Bethel University (Mishawaka, Ind.) and master's degrees in management and leadership from Indiana Wesleyan University (Marion, Ind.) and theology-intellectual leadership from the A.W. Tozer Theological Seminary, part of Simpson University (Redding, Calif.).

Mobolade moved to Colorado Springs in 2010 and started a church and them cofounded The Wild Goose Meeting House in 2013 to address the needs for cultural gathering places

in 2013. He co-founded COSILoveYou to unite more than 100 churces in a common mission while working at First Presbyterian. In 2017, he assumed the role of VP of Business Retention for the Colorado Springs Chamber and Economic Development Corp. In 2019, Mobolade served the City of Colorado Springs as a small business development administrator. In this role, he established tools to assist entrepreneurs with starting a business, COSOpenForBiz.com and Permit Partner, and led many collaborative efforts across the community's public and private sectors. Mobolade stepped down from this position in March 2022 to officially launch his mayoral campaign.

Mobolade was sworn in as the 42nd Mayor of Colorado Springs on June 6, 2023. This is his first four-year term as mayor. He is the first Black man and immigrant to be elected mayor of Colorado Springs and one of the youngest.

In Memory of our Founder



Dick Powell

Richard "Dick" Powell was a member of the Garden of the Gods Rotary Club in the early 1980s when he had an idea about honoring the kind of fabulous high school students he saw daily as assistant principal at Coronado High School. He was tired of the negative press young people were receiving. He took his idea of an event to his Rotary club's Board of Directors, thinking they would surely embrace it. They did not. Soon, Dick became president of his Rotary club and succeeded in convincing his board to create a first-class event to recognize the outstanding community minded scholar athletes in the Pikes Peak region.

Rotarians held the first Rotary Champions event in the spring of 1985 and the tradition continues to this day.

Dick Powell passed away peacefully on May 27, 2021, at the age of eighty-nine. Dick was a well known and respected educator for 40 years in Colorado Springs.

In Memory of Donna Sawaya



Donna Sawaya became a member of the Rotary Club of the Garden of the Gods in 2001. The Garden of the Gods Club is the original founding Club of the Champions program and is now one of the seven area Rotary Clubs that govern the activities of the Rotary Champions Foundation nonprofit organization that puts on the annual Rotary Champions event. Donna served as Garden of the Gods club president in 2004-2005, becoming the first female president of the Club. Donna also co-chaired the Rotary Champions event in 2012. Donna was always positive and energetic, and she personified service above self during her tenure as a Rotarian. Donna always had time to support any Rotary initiative, particularly those efforts that addressed the needs of children. Donna often made considerable donations to projects for low-income children, specifically Rotary projects intended to promote higher attendance and

academic performance, including frequent contributions to an annual year-end trip to the zoo rewarding the academic efforts of 50 children at John Adams Elementary school. Donna Sawaya represented the best of Rotary and willingly supported a wide range of programs. Donna was especially taken with the goals of the Rotary Champions program, and she has made a very substantial bequest to the Rotary Champions Foundation to ensure that Champions remains financially viable well into the future. Her generous gift has been established as an endowment gift of the Rotary Champions Foundation that can be used by the Foundation to match funds raised from other sources up to an annual limit that preserves the endowment fund and assures the long-term success of the Champions program. We as the board of directors of Rotary Champions will forever be grateful to Donna Sawaya, a friend, and a tremendous Rotarian.
