Did you know that mustard plants belong to the Brassica family, which also includes broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower and kale?

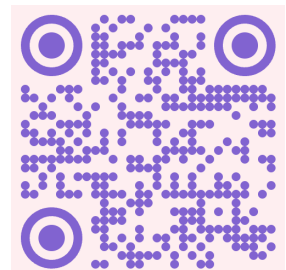
Mustard dates back to 3000 BC, which makes it one of the world's oldest spices!

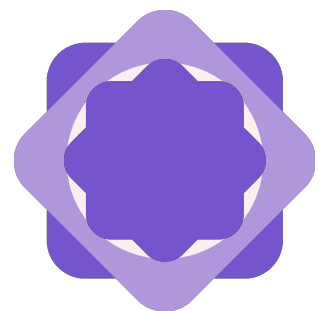

Colouring Book Day

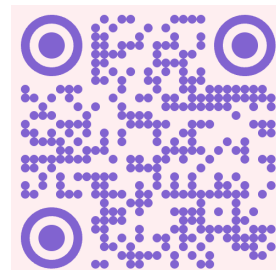

The colouring books for children didn't exist until late 1800s. The old colouring books were for adults who learnt to paint with watercolours.



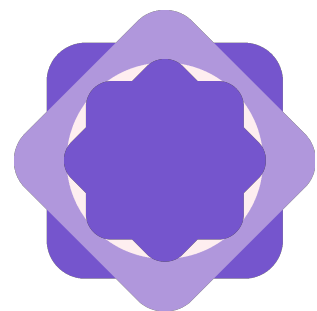

Watermelon is made of about **92 % water**, which is why it is so popular in hot weather! It helps hydration.

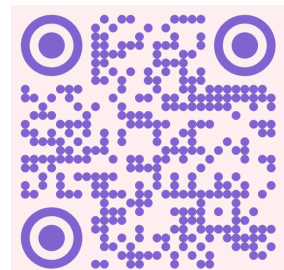
It is a **fruit** because it grows from a flower and contains seeds. Have you ever seen a watermelon flower?

Did you know that archaeologists have found paintings of watermelons in Egyptian tombs that are **4,000 years old**?



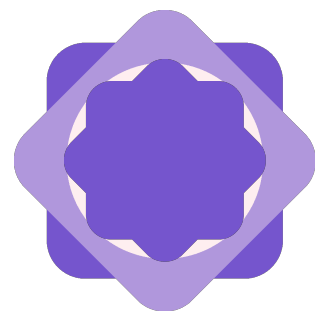

National Chocolate Chip Cookie Day

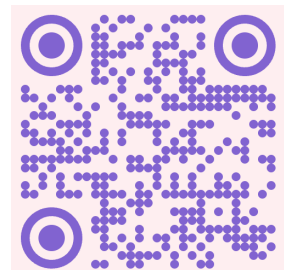

Did you know that freshly baked cookie smell is produced by the **Maillard reaction**? It also helps cookies turn golden brown!



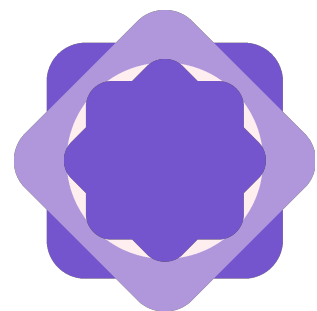

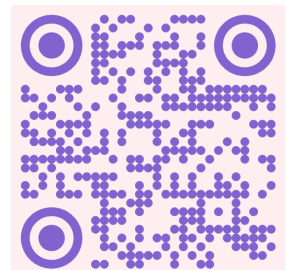
International Cat Day

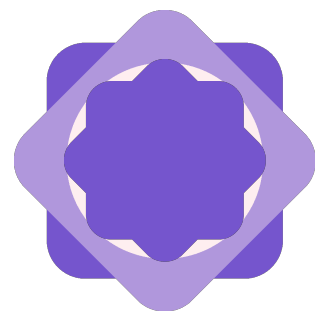

Tarantulas may look scary, but they are calm, slow-moving spiders that rarely bite and prefer to avoid people.

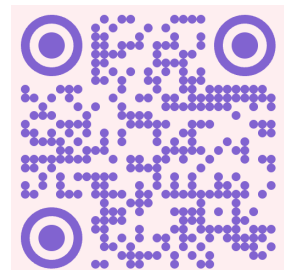
They grow by molting — shedding their outer skeleton as they get bigger. After molting, they are soft and fragile for a short time.

Most tarantulas are harmless to humans and help control insect populations.



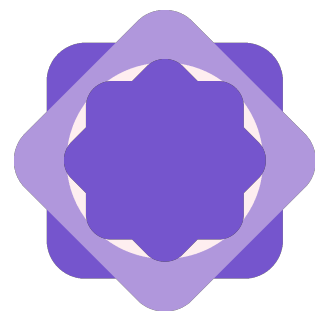
How are tarantulas different from other spiders? Who is scarier — and who is actually more dangerous?

The first books that existed were written on clay tablets, papyrus and animal skins.

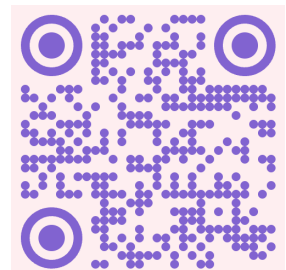

The most expensive book ever sold is Codex Leicester written by Leonardo da Vinci. It was purchased by Bill Gates for 31 million dollars!



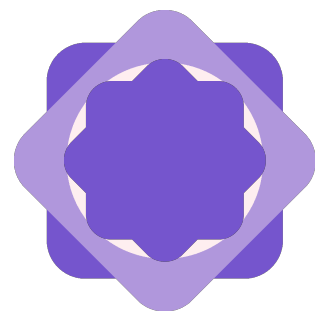

Have you seen Disney's Lion King? If not, today is the best day to do it!

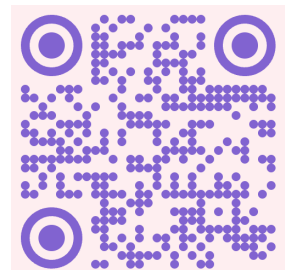

It is important to protect lions. Wild lions numbers have dropped because of habitat loss and hunters. **How can we help lions?**



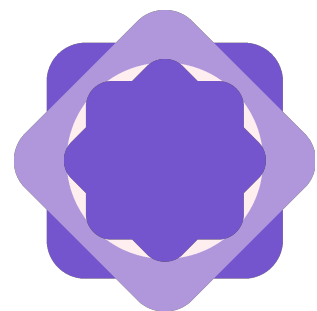

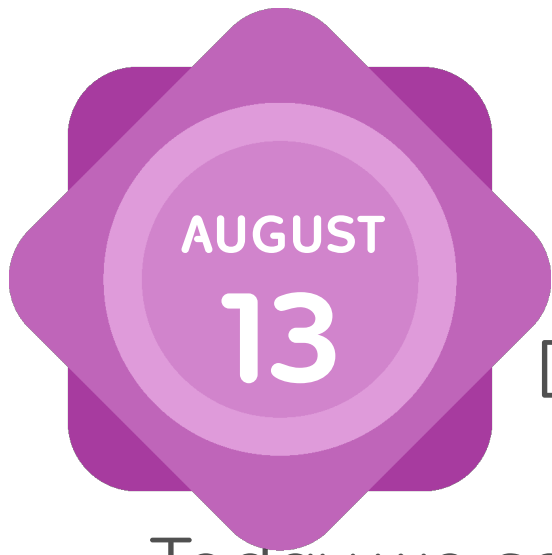

Did you know that 10 % of people are left-handed?

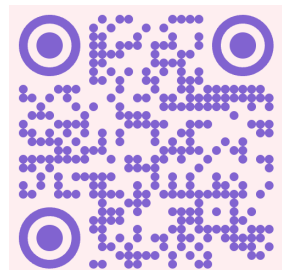
Today we celebrate "lefties" - **are you a "lefty"**, or do you know anyone who is?

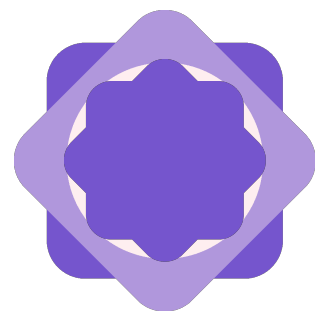

A gummy bear!

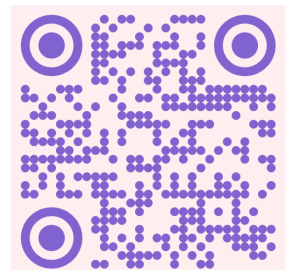
Today is the perfect day to share a silly joke

where everyone feels included and happy.



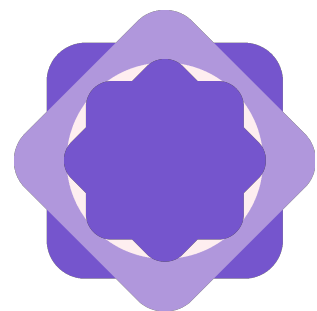

A good photographer thinks about light, composition, focus, timing and story.

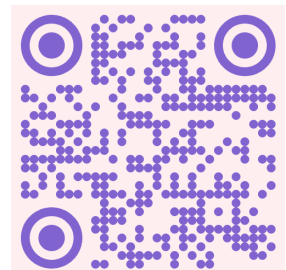
Photography is more than taking a picture, it is **telling a story in a new way**.
