The University of Tennessee (UT) has been selected to host a cohort of 10 African veterinary professors by the U.S. Department of Agriculture’s Faculty Exchange Program. This program is designed to assist developing countries to improve their agricultural education, research, and extension programs through exchanges with U.S. universities.

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The cohort of African veterinary professors will spend the fall 2021 semester under the guidance of a faculty mentor at the UT Knoxville campus. They will participate in coursework, research activities, and field visits during the exchange.

The UT College of Veterinary Medicine is requesting veterinary textbooks and references to send with these professors when they return to their home institutions in Ghana, Kenya, Uganda, Tanzania, and Ethiopia. The Faculty Exchange Program will pay for additional checked luggage for the participants return travel.
