Corvus Health, a US-based health workforce firm, is supporting through leadership 7 relatively new health professional schools in the Lake Victoria Region Economic Block (LREB). Before Kenya devolved health to the county level in 2013, most health professional schools were located in Nairobi. This prevented rural youth from accessing higher education. Or if they did, they rarely returned back home. Being educated closer to their home counties enables students to be trained in the specific health needs of their counties and maintain their local relationships. This makes it much more likely that they will stay and practice in these medically underserved counties.

The schools include county-government schools, NGO schools, and one faith-based school. All schools are working together with the Center for Health Professional Schools and the Africa Institute for Health Transformation to create shared library resources and build economies of scale in other areas such as group procurement and simulation labs. The schools are requesting a wide range of books including basic sciences, preclinical, medical specialties, pathology, pharmacology, nursing, ethics, research design, and public health. Any book you send will be appreciated and used.

The University of Tennessee (UT) has been selected to host a cohort of 10 African veterinary professors by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Faculty Exchange Program. This program is designed to assist developing countries to improve their agricultural education, research, and extension programs through exchanges with U.S. universities.

The cohort of African veterinary professors will spend the fall 2021 semester under the guidance of a faculty mentor at the UT Knoxville campus. They will participate in coursework, research activities, and field visits during the exchange.

The UT College of Veterinary Medicine is requesting veterinary textbooks and references to send with these professors when they return to their home institutions in Ghana, Kenya, Uganda, Tanzania, and Ethiopia. The Faculty Exchange Program will pay for additional checked luggage for the participants return travel.
