Technologies of Chromatic Prayer: Creating Blue-Green in Chaco Canyon

In the Pueblo World of the U.S. Southwest, color is integral to a complex system of relationships connecting cardinal directions, animals, plants, sociopolitical structures, and sacred geographies. The preparation of paint is often viewed as an act of chromatic prayer that reinforces these relationships. This talk explores the social and technological dimensions of chromatic prayer through the production of blue-green paint—a color tied to all-important rain and vegetation—using a case study from Chaco Canyon (A.D. 850–1150). Using innovative micro-sampling techniques and non-destructive methods, I describe a unique recipe for blue-green identified in Chacoan painted performance media, highlighting its widespread use among Chaco great houses. I suggest that the act of creating blue-green served as both a powerful expression of identity and a means of participation in Chaco society, offering a unique window into broader social and cultural dynamics.

Kelsey E. Hanson is an Assistant Professor of Anthropology at the University of Texas at Arlington, specializing in interdisciplinary and collaborative archaeological research in the Greater Southwest. Her work focuses on Indigenous technological innovation, land use, and sociopolitical change, with publications in *American Antiquity*, *Journal of Field Archaeology*, *Ethnoarchaeology*, and more.



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Gault Site Documentary Release

The Stones Are Speaking tells the inspiring story of how archaeologist Mike Collins, at great risk and personal sacrifice, saved 30 acres of looted land deep in the heart of Texas and revealed it as one of the most significant sites in the Americas. Collins and his team changed history when they found evidence of people living in Central Texas 20,000 years ago. The film is more than a simple tale of discoveries at the Gault Archaeological Site. It illustrates the power of an individual to make a difference and what people can accomplish when they come together for the greater good.



NTAS Monthly Meeting Location & Directions

NTAS meets at 7:00 p.m. on the second Thursday of each month (except June and December) at the University of North Texas Health Science Center, 3500 Camp Bowie Boulevard, Fort Worth (in the Research and Education Building, Room 114), near the intersection of Camp Bowie and Montgomery Street.

Traveling west on I-30 from downtown, take the Montgomery Street exit. Turn right on Montgomery and continue to the five-way intersection at Camp Bowie. Turn right onto Camp Bowie, followed by an immediate left onto Clifton Street. Turn into the first parking lot on the left (Administrator and Visitor Parking). You will drive past an information booth as you enter the parking lot. Park on the far (north/west) end of the parking lot and enter the Research and Education building. Once you enter the building, turn right and proceed down the hallway to Room 114.



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Paint Rock Pictograph Site

NTAS members participated in investigations last month at the Paint Rock Pictograph site in Concho County, Texas. Under the leadership of Drs. Eric Schroeder and Jeremy Elliott, this collective effort involved a variety of participants including college student interns, vocational and professional archeology volunteers, and several members of tribal nations such as the Comanche, Lipan Apache, and Coahuiltecans. Activities spanned rock art documentation, archeological survey and manual excavation, laboratory techniques, and geophysical investigation. Par-



ticipants came to learn from each other several topics including archeological methods, cultural history, and traditional knowledge and practices. Collaboration and coordination between participants coalesced through conversations, sharing roles and tasks, and instructional forums. NTAS members Carol Macaulay and Brian lameson dedicated their time to manual excavation in-







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struction. Christopher Goodmaster conducted geophysical survey with participants, which also included some prickly vegetation removal and classroom time. Chris Meis led survey instruction. Alexandra Younger, Gen Frix, and Charlene Erwin also participated in various roles. This project represents a new standard for archaeological investigations in close collaboration with landowners, professionals, members of the public, and tribes. Everyone had a fantastic and meaningful experience.
