October Speaker: Alexandra Younger

Excavations at Washington-on-the-Brazos State Historic Site (2023-2024)

Alexandra is the Principal Investigator for the recent data recovery excavations at Washington-on-the-Brazos State Historic Park, also known as the "Birthplace of Texas." The Texas Historical Commission plans to reconstruct early-to-mid-nineteenth century buildings related to the events and major players of Texas Independence. Alexandra and her team led the investigations beginning in 2023 to locate and identify domestic and architectural remains of these loci including a tavern where David Crockett once stayed, Sam Houston's Office, and Hatfield's Exchange where the 8th and 9th Texas Congress assembled. A total of 34 features were recorded and tens of thousands of artifacts have been collected, and are currently being analyzed for the purpose of informing the reconstruction that will turn the park into a living history museum. While synthesis of these findings is ongoing, a significant portion of preliminary results from this presentation will be incorporated into the upcoming park and museum improvements.

Alexandra Younger is a Principal Investigator for a cultural resources firm, Integrated Environmental Solutions, LLC, in Denton, Texas. She began her career as an archeologist in Williamsburg, Virginia following graduation from Appalachian State University. She moved to Texas ten years ago and has since earned her Master of Science degree in Geography from the University of North Texas under the mentorship of Drs. Reid Ferring and Steve Wolverton. Her professional experience here spans northern, eastern, and central Texas that includes Archaic, Prehistoric, and historic-age archeological sites. Stone tool analysis, geoarcheology, remote sensing, databasing, historic ecology, and cultural resource management are among her repertoire of applications in archeology. Much of her personal time is dedicated to outreach and public archeology.





Archeology Presentation for Master Naturalists

On September 10, NTAS member James Everett taught a 90-minute archeology segment for the Fall 2024 Class of the Cross Timbers Master Naturalists in Fort Worth. His program, attended by 35 Master Naturalists including the 28 students taking this year's classes, consisted of two parts: "An Introduction to Archeology" followed by "The Native American Cultures of Tarrant and Parker Counties". James encouraged the students to contact NTAS, the Texas Archeological Society, or Texas Historical Commission Archeology Stewards if they encounter potential archeological sites or artifacts during their field activities. He also invited Master Naturalists to attend NTAS meetings and to become members if they are interested.

In Memory of Dr. Tom Middlebrook (1952-2024)

Texas archeology lost a legendary figure with the passing of Dr. Tom Middlebrook on September 17, 2024. Dr. Middlebrook was a retired doctor of Psychiatry and Child/Adolescent Psychiatry, and an extremely capable and accomplished avocational archeologist. His remarkable knowledge and efforts toward Texas archeology left a legacy. Our paths initially crossed working on historic, Caddo, Woodland, and Archaic archeological sites in various parts of east Texas. His desire to discover and preserve information led to our working together on the infamous Keystone XL Pipeline where he represented landowners and the public while working with our professional archeological teams to help identify and protect important resources. A remarkable example of bridging public interest and infrastructure where Dr. Middlebrook clearly knew the importance of helping professional archeologists in front of development.

Over the years getting to know him more I found out that he was a two-time past President of the Texas Archeological Society (TAS), awarded the Crabtree Award from the Society for American Archaeology as the most outstanding avocational archeologist, founder of various archeological organizations, research-

er, and patron of the discipline. He supported projects and programs to help further interest and research in archeology. Watching Dr. Middlebrook present at the East Texas Archeological Conference (which he cofounded), at TAS, and other organizations was always a treat since he was well versed in the literature and research issues particularly for east Texas. My condolences for Dr. Middlebrook's family and friends, and Texas archeology will certainly miss Tom, but his legacy lives on through many contributions and for that I am grateful.
