May Speaker: Yonavea Hawkins

Caddo Beadwork, the Journey

Learning beadwork techniques, moccasin making, and sewing started as an adult when I wanted Caddo clothing (regalia) to wear at Caddo dances. Growing up my mother sewed my dresses, but paid others for the moccasins and accessories needed. My self-teaching journey started with books on beading, searching the internet, and looking at museum collection images and learning more with each pair of moccasins I made for myself and family.



As a beadwork artist **Yonavea Hawkins** learned by sewing and beading cultural items for herself and family. When asked to participate in her first art market she entered a pair of Delaware moccasins in the Beadwork category. She has since continued to win awards in other juried Native American art market competitions with her moccasins, beaded cultural items and loomed beaded belts in the Beadwork or Cultural/Diverse Arts categories. Whether doing loom work or two needle appliqué bead work, her beadwork designs are a combination of traditional and contemporary using cut beads. She has a Fine Arts degree from Oklahoma City University and has been drawing and painting since grade school.

From the Archives

NTAS is currently refining the protocol to identify which documents will be archived now, and in the immediate future, with the University of Texas at Arlington (UTA). The NTAS relationship with UTA began in 2022, with the delivery of eleven boxes of paper materials. Those pieces of paper have now been archived, preserved individually in digital format and made accessible online, or as paper copies retained in the hard-copy archival system.



As we all know, there are different standards today for preservation of our documents. The need to carefully choose what is saved is central to this discussion of record retention. The way we communicate has changed. Emails have replaced hand-written letters. The monthly reports submitted by the NTAS Executive Committee are presented in PDF format and shared online as email attachments. The Benchmark, the NTAS monthly newsletter, digitized and shared with the membership via email, presents a panoramic snapshot of the highlights of each month. These few documents consistently tell the story of NTAS.

Beginning with this calendar year, NTAS is choosing to preserve fewer documents. The NTAS newsletters, monthly EC reports, as well as an annual listing of membership (name only), and The Journal, are the documents that will be digitally archived by the UTA for NTAS. Of course, these documents prove that NTAS is meeting its objectives as a non-profit organization. And that we're environmentally friendly, too.



NTAS meets at 7:00 p.m. on the second Thursday of each month (except June and December) at the University of North Texas Health Science Center, 3500 Camp Bowie Boulevard, Fort Worth (in the Research and Education Building, Room 114), near the intersection of Camp Bowie and Montgomery Street.

Traveling west on I-30 from downtown, take the Montgomery Street exit. Turn right on Montgomery and continue to the five-way intersection at Camp Bowie. Turn right onto Camp Bowie, followed by an immediate left onto Clifton Street. Turn into the first parking lot on the left (Administrator and Visitor Parking). You will drive past an information booth as you enter the parking lot. Park on the far (north/west) end of the parking lot and enter the Research and Education building. Once you enter the building, turn right and proceed down the hallway to Room 114.

News from the NTAS Executive Committee

The NTAS Executive Committee (EC) meetings (typically held two Tuesdays before the monthly meetings) are open to the membership, and minutes from the meetings can be obtained from the President or Secretary. The following items passed unanimously via vote during the April 29, 2025 EC Meeting.

- Scholarships can now be awarded for attending accredited field schools throughout the United States in addition to NTAS and TAS events. See Page 8 for how to apply!
- A scholarship in the amount of \$425 was awarded to Simon Jerden to attend the 2025 TAS Field School.
- The EC endorsed the awarding of a scholarship to Marisa Harris to support attendance at the Crow Canyon Archaeological Center's Cultural Resource Management Field School in the amount of \$525. As this amount is above the threshold for the EC to spend without vote by the membership, this item will be presented to the membership at the general NTAS meeting on May 8, 2025 for approval via vote.
- The partnership with the University of Texas at Arlington to house the NTAS archives (which began in 2022) was approved to continue. The NTAS President and Vice-President were authorized to sign the Transfer of Title document and the NTAS President and Historian were authorized to execute/complete the annual Digital Materials Information Form.
- The following items were authorized to be included in the archival digitized materials maintained by UTA: NTAS newsletters, EC reports, annual list of membership (excluding personal information such as addresses, emails, and phone numbers), and the Journal of the North Texas Archeological Society.
