#### **August Speaker: Amy Bluemel**

## From Moundbuilders to Chickasaws: History, Language, and Stories of the Southern Native Americans

Amy will present in her regalia while sharing stories, language, history, and culture of the Chickasaw Nation.

As the great-granddaughter of Eastman Kaney (an original Dawes Commission enrollee), **Amy Bluemel** is a proud member of the Chickasaw Nation. She is an award-winning storyteller and educator, artist, and stomp dancer.

Her appreciation for cultural awareness came at an early age. She was raised in a military family; she lived in Germany, Okinawa, Turkey, and Scotland before returning to her Chickasaw roots in America.

Amy is the 2023 recipient of the Coleen Salley Storytelling Award ,for her commitment to the art of storytelling, from The University of Southern Mississippi. She shares Chickasaw and Southeastern tribal customs with audiences of all ages through lively programs at schools, museums, libraries, and festivals across the country. She also performs with the dance troupe Chikashsha Hithla at events and festivals around the nation.

Amy is an accomplished artist. Her artwork is sold at several mu-

seums and stores, and she sells her creations at powwows and festivals throughout the United States. She was also one of 36 Native American artists chosen to show and sell her art at the Smithsonian National Museum of the American Indian, Native American Art Market in Washington DC in 2019.

Amy lives in Austin Texas with her husband Carl, and a houseful of pets. She has two daughters who have also taken to Chickasaw culture and stomp dance.



## Art & War in the Renaissance at the Kimbell

I took this photo at the Kimbell, where the Art & War in the Renaissance exhibit features The Battle of Pavia Tapestries. The battle was fought on February 24, 1525. The tapestries, constructed with gold, silver and silk threads, from 1528-1531, are truly a unique collection. The beautifully ornate Farnese Armory arms and armor provide a sense of the immense difficulties experienced by those on the battlefields. Seeing these pieces together strengthens the impact of the exhibit, which is only at the Kimbell until September 15th. Attending this exhibit deserves to be on every "to do" list.


