Just recently, the Doss released figures showing that 631 visitors attended that event. It is significant that NTAS was able to interact with so many North Texas residents at the Pioneer Heritage Fest, and we now look forward to our third involvement with that event next year.

On Nov 23, NTAS members again assisted with important events that contributed to public education, as shown in several photos in this newsletter. At the Perot Museum's "A Day in the Life: Archaeologist", 13 NTAS volunteers helped people who are considering a possible career in archeology to experience archeological activities and begin to develop needed skills. 

Newberry Cabin Excavation Is Nearing Completion by Katrina Nuncio

On Friday, November 15, a total of fourteen people met at the Newberry Cabin to work on the first excavation at this site since last spring. From NTAS there was Gen Freix, Lori Gouge, Chris Meis, Art Tawater, Mike Shannon, Vinnie Ramos, myself, and two new student members, Cameryn Shady and Jordan Moody. Five of the eight students enrolled in my Weatherford College Introduction to Archeology class were present for their very first experience excavating. The weather forecast had predicted a very cold start to the day but the temperature warmed up to a very comfortable short sleeve t-shirt kind of day.



We set up four 1x1 meter units in the area that would have been under and just outside the edge of the front porch. I had hoped this area would prove to be productive for the students and it was. Nothing is more boring than digging in a sterile environment and I was so hoping this wouldn't be the case for my students. As usual, everybody was finding lots of glass fragments and unidentifiable pieces of rusty metal. The unusual artifacts we found were some unique buttons along with, not one, but two Shield nickels. A hole had been drilled in one of them so it was probably worn as a pendant by one of the family members that previously lived there.

This type of nickel was the first five-cent piece to be made out of copper-nickel in the United States. This is the same alloy that American nickels are made from today. The Shield nickel was designed by James B. Longacre and was minted from 1866 until 1933. The coin's name comes from its motif and was the first five cent coin referred to as a "nickel." Silver pieces of this denomination had previously been referred to as half dimes. Our age estimate of the Newberry Cabin has been in the 1870s, so these two nickels fall right into this time frame. The dates on our two nickels are hard to read as they need to be cleaned up, but I did attach a picture of both the front and back of the cleanest coin. If you want to know more about Shield nickels there is a great deal of information on Google.

If the weather cooperates, I have another excavation day scheduled for Friday, December 6, from 10:00 am until around 2:00 pm. Of course, NTAS members may come and go as needed. If the weather doesn't cooperate, I will move the event to the Doss Heritage and Culture Museum, and we will analyze previously excavated artifacts. An all-member email will be sent out at the beginning of that week as a reminder, and directions can be requested at that time.

I may schedule one more excavation day for the Newberry Cabin, but that will be determined by how much we accomplish on December 6. At some point, the newer cabin that was attached to the Newberry Cabin will be torn down and I will schedule an excavation day once we can access the area underneath this cabin.

As always, many thanks to everyone who has assisted with this project.

TAS Geoarcheology Academy

When: February 15-16, 2020 Where: Victoria College
Cost: \$100 (and TAS membership)

This two-day Texas Archeology Academy explores how geological and soil formation processes affect archeological sites, and how investigators use this information to reconstruct both the human and natural histories of an area. Learning to record and interpret soil profiles can illuminate both how a site was used by people and how people responded to changes in the natural environment. This Academy will include instruction, laboratory exercises, and field trips. Both presenters (Dr. Charles Frederick and Karl Kibler) are experienced geoarcheologists. The cost includes two days of instruction, refreshments, lunch, and a digital manual.

TAS Ceramics Academy

When: March 28-29, 2020 Where: Fort Concho National Historic Landmark
Cost: \$100 (and TAS membership)

This two-day Texas Archeology Academy provides a comprehensive background and understanding of prehistoric and historic ceramics from archeological sites. Expect a hands-on learning environment! In this workshop you will learn how pottery is made and used, how pottery reflects cultural traditions, and how archeologists use the ceramic data to understand the people and their past lifeways. Participants will learn to recognize and sort sherds to answer questions about ancient lifeways. Presenters include Dr. Chris Lintz, Marybeth Tomka, and Becky Shelton. The cost includes two days of instruction, refreshments, lunch, and a digital manual.

TAS Archeology 101 Academy

When: May 1-3, 2020 Where: San Felipe de Austin State Historic Site
Cost: \$100 (and TAS membership)

This three-day Texas Archeology Academy introduces the field of archeology and provides each participant with the tools to identify, assess, and record an archeological site. Instruction will include identifying archeological sites, mapping visible remains, analyzing evidence, reporting finds, and protecting our heritage from destruction. This Academy will include instruction and laboratory exercises led by Dr. John Lohse and a day of field excavations at San Felipe de Austin State Historic Site. Dr. Sarah Chesney, archeologist at the San Felipe de Austin State Historic Site will be the Principal Investigator for Sunday's excavations. The cost includes two days of instruction, refreshments, lunch, and a digital manual.
