February Speaker: Arlo McKee

The State of Mobile Technologies; Or, Putting Our Phone Addiction to Work for Archeology

NASA sent astronauts to the moon with computers that could perform calculations 100 thousand times slower than the average cell phone most of us carry in our pockets today. These devices are so present in most of our lives, that mobile app development is an industry with more than \$70 billion in annual revenues. Both mobile hardware and software have seen more than 75% growth since 2016, and the pace of this development is often so staggering that most of us consumers have little idea where to begin with selecting the best apps to help us with our passions. Today's smartphones integrate what were previously thought of as separate recording techniques. The same small device can be used as a camera, calculator, GIS/GPS, and for managing databases, as a notepad, drafting, and the list goes on. This presentation will focus on the ways we can think about these devices compared to traditional pen and paper, and we'll hopefully identify some avenues where we can better make use of relatively low-cost apps for field recording. With both the diversity of integrated technologies and the rapid pace of app development, we will be covering some of the current apps that will likely prove to have some "staying power" and ultimately be worth investing time learning before your next field project.




Arlo McKee is the regional archeologist for Northcentral Texas and the Panhandle for the Texas Historical Commission. Since 2009, he has been living in Texas and has been focused on various aspects of Texas Geoarcheology and Geospatial Information Sciences. He has a MA degree in Geoarchaeology from the University of Kansas and is currently working on his PhD dissertation in Geospatial Information Sciences at the University of Texas at Dallas. He has experience conducting archaeological and remote sensing studies throughout Texas and most of the Midwest. Much of Arlo's interest in archaeology centers on the use of geospatial technologies to understand site preservation.

TAS Ceramics Academy

TAS Archeology 101 Academy
