July Speaker: Dr. Robyn L. Dodge

Ancient Maya Marketplace Investigations at Hun Tun

With funding from the National Science Foundation, the Hun Tun Archaeology Project participated in collaborative research to investigate the hypothesized existence of an integrated market system in the Three Rivers Region of northwestern Belize during the Late Classic period (CE 600-850). Marketplaces do not operate in isolation. Therefore, marketplace networks are best understood on a regional level. However, regional integration, movement of goods, and other aspects of trade and exchange are difficult to gauge without first identifying known marketplace locations. This aspect remains an important component for investigations of ancient marketplaces worldwide. The coordinated support and collaborative nature of the NSF marketplace study provided an opportunity to gain a regional perspective of Late Classic Maya economy within northwestern Belize.

Marketplace interactions between larger sites and the surrounding hinterland settlements provide data about the regional mobility of goods. Current marketplace research is the first of its kind at Hun Tun and a first of its kind in terms of scale and coordinated collaboration. The first objective of this project was to confirm the existence of suspected marketplaces in the region; the second objective was to examine the comparability of goods between confirmed marketplaces. The third objective was to investigate how marketplace activity contributed to long-term human environmental interactions related to climate change. Research methodology at Hun Tun was consistent with other research sites in the study. This involved the following: soil geochemical testing of marketplace plazas, trench excavations of plaza courtyards, investigations of associated features, and identification of modern tree species. Hun Tun Group A served as a control or confirmed "non-marketplace" while Group C at Hun Tun was the location for data collection within the proposed marketplace plaza.

Dr. Robyn L. Dodge is a Visiting Assistant Professor of Anthropology at The University of Texas at Arlington and Director of the "Hun Tun Archaeology Project." Dr. Dodge earned her B.A. in archaeology from the Boston University and her M.A./Ph.D. from the University of Texas at Austin. She also has experience working in the CRM industry and museum administration.

Dr. Dodge is an archaeologist specializing in ancient Maya social complexity with additional experience in Texas archaeology. She has taught archaeology courses on the topics of archaeological field research, theory and methods, ancient Maya civilization, archaeology in practice and Texas archaeology. Her current research interests include ancient Maya commoners, marketplace studies, and household archaeology.

The "Hun Tun Archaeology Project," draws participants from all over the world in collaboration with UT Austin as part of the Programme for Belize Archaeological Project (PfBAP). Dr. Dodge has been conducting research at Hun Tun since 2008 in a remote area of northwestern Belize. She named the site "Hun Tun," translated as "First Stone" in ancient Mayan languages. Hun Tun was chosen as a site name after a stone altar was discovered in one of the main courtyards during the first survey season. She enjoys taking students to the field with her for research and instructing field school. Dr. Dodge is also an accomplished marathon runner having finished the prestigious Boston Marathon twelve years in a row. She is also currently serving as Captain of the Austin Marathon Pace Team.



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Archeology Presentation at Dancing River Assisted Living

In early May, Tina Mandrell Brown, the Life Enrichment Director at Dancing River Assisted Living in Grapevine, left a voice mail message for NTAS, explaining that in June the residents at Dancing River were scheduled to study Greece and asking if NTAS could provide a speaker to explain what archeology is and what archeologists do. James Everett agreed to present "An Introduction to Archeology" and Gen Freix volunteered to bring artifacts to display and discuss with the audience.

The presentation occurred on June 18; twenty residents attended. James encouraged residents, their families and their friends to become members of NTAS and TAS, to attend NTAS Zoom meetings (e.g., as a



group activity at Dancing River), and to enjoy our digital publications. He also emphasized that residents' grandchildren might enjoy participating in TAS field schools.

Gen demonstrated how a "nutting stone" functions, showed how an atlatl works, and explained pottery sherds and a number of lithic artifacts. The residents then engaged James and Gen in an active question-and-answer session.

As a result of the program, NTAS may be asked to do additional presentations for Dancing River (e.g., for Native American Month), and for related facilities in the Metroplex.
