## May Speaker: Chris Lintz

### Chipped Stone Tool Cache Diversity on the Southern Plains

From their earliest presence in North America, most prehistoric Native American people lacked access to metal implements, and relied primarily on making chipped stone tools to kill, process, and consume plant and animal resources. Chert and flint resources are geographically restricted resources leading to a patchy distribution of suitable kinds of rocks for making such chipped stone tools as points, knives, scrapers, gouges, drills, and “trade blanks”. While archaeologists study individual complete and broken, lost, or discarded chipped stone tools for interpreting prehistoric activities, occasionally clusters of stone tools that were hidden or cached by prehistoric people are found by the lay public and professional archeologists. The composition of materials in these caches reflect choices made by early people for their selectivity and inclusion, and the intentional placement of items with perceived value within a cache has the potential to provide further insights into ancient behaviors. Over the past decade, the speaker has been collecting information on 325 chipped stone caches from the southern Plains region of Texas, Oklahoma and southern Kansas. His talk will delineate cache functions and significant behavioral differences in activities involving the acquisition and use of flaked stone from a half dozen kind of chert resources across the region.

#### Chris Lintz

Dr. Christopher Lintz received his M.A. (1975) and Ph.D. (1984) in Anthropology from the University of Oklahoma and his B.A. in Anthropology from Arizona State University (1970). He has conducted cultural resource management archaeology in 17 States and Puerto Rico over a 36 year career for various university and private consulting firms and was briefly affiliated with the Anthropology Department at the University of Denver. Since 2006, he served as the Cultural Resource Program Specialist for the Wildlife Division of Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. In this capacity, he man-



aged cultural resources on some 51 Wildlife Management Areas involving 1,200 square miles across Texas, and coordinated cultural resource consultation for federal grants on habitat restoration projects on private lands across Texas. Since 1970, he focused his geographical research interests on the southern High Plains with emphasis on ecological anthropology involving paleo-environmental reconstruction, settlement/subsistence patterns, architectural and community patterns, technological trends in lithic resource extraction, and tool manufacture, ceramic technology, and exchange/interaction across the Southern Plains region with adjacent areas. He has published 360 papers, and reports in archeology.


He retired from Texas Parks and Wildlife in 2016, and is currently a Research Associate at Texas State University in San Marcos. He has been the recipient of several Merit in Archeology Awards from the Texas Historical Commission, a Lifetime Achievement Award from the Panhandle Archeological Society, a Lifetime Membership Award by the Hill Country Archeological Association, a Fellow of the Texas Archeological Society, and the Distinguished Service Award by the Plains Anthropological Society.
