



President's Message

Thank you TCAS members and guests for being so generous at our last monthly meeting. When the Board decided to "pass the hat" to raise money for TCC and Weatherford College students' TCAS memberships we hoped we'd raise \$50.00. Well, we did significantly better, raising \$110.00 which will be used to pay the \$10.00 TCAS membership fee so these students can participate in the Newberry Cabin excavation and get hands-on experience in Archeology. We were able to close a couple of units and open some new units in the footprint of the kitchen structure which has long since been destroyed. Our two day excavation over March 23-24 included 4-5 students each day; it always rewarding and fun to see their enthusiasm and budding interest for Archeology.

Our other Weatherford College related project, the mammoth preservation has four dates set for April. Those are April 13, 14, 27 & 28th. This is an exciting project, which has received a lot of publicity and is led by TCAS member Lori Gouge,

head of the Geology Department at Weatherford College.

If you have not yet been to the Bob Bullock Museum in Austin, it is definitely worth a trip to see Texas' heritage on display. Our planned tour of La Salle's La Belle shipwreck and associated artifacts is an added incentive to make the trip. The tour will be conducted by Amy Borgens, State Marine Archeologist and is scheduled for May 20th, at 12:00 p.m.

Admission fees are being waived for us, but the tour is limited to 25 people. There will be a sign-up sheet at this month's meeting, and there are still plenty of spots available, so make sure to get your name on the list if you are

interested.

Our return trip to Camp Wood for the 2018 TAS Field School is fast approaching and the registration form is on-line at their website (<https://txarch.org/civicrm-event/188>)

I am starting the process of assigning crews next week, so if you are not sure where you would like to volunteer this year, let me know and I will give you my insight. We had over 300 participants last year and I think everyone is looking forward to the interesting archeology, scenery and cool waters of the Nueces river, so I expect that we will have another good turn-out for June 9-16th, 2018.

TCAS has agreed to sponsor five student scholarships to Field School this year, so if you know of deserving students or teachers who might be interested, encourage them to get their application submitted by the April 30th deadline. Applications are on-line at our TCAS website.

If you are unable to attend the TAS Field School in June, there is an opportunity to participate in Dr. Ashley Lemke's UTA field school being held May 15-30 on the Way Ranch in San Marcos, Texas. April Speaker: Sarah Linden, Marine Archeologist

The TARRANT COUNTY ARCHEOLOGICAL SOCIETY (TCAS) will welcome Sarah Linden as the featured speaker for the April 12th meeting. TCAS meetings are free and visitors are always welcome.

BIO: A native Texan, Sarah holds a B.A. in History from Texas A&M University and a M.A. in Historical Archaeology from the University of West Florida. She has worked on projects in Florida, North Carolina, Sweden, Malta and now Texas. She is just beginning her third year at the Texas Historical Commission in the Marine Archeology Program as a Marine Archeologist and the Diving Safety Officer.

Abstract: The oldest shipwrecks in the United States are two small separate Spanish fleets off the coasts of Florida and Texas. The discovery of the 1554 Spanish plate fleet off of Padre Island, Texas directly influenced enactment of Texas' first antiquities law and was one of the first scientific underwater investigations conducted in the United States. The Emmanuel Point wrecks in Pensacola Bay are significant as evidence of the first Spanish colonial enterprise in Florida. These shipwrecks, differing by only 5 years in age, closely link these two Gulf states with some of the best Spanish colonial artifacts of this period in the country. Now as an archeologist at the Texas Historical Commission, Sarah Linden has traveled full circle in her underwater Spanish colonial experience, having worked on the Emmanuel Point Shipwreck Project in the past and now as a member of the THC investigative team in the new chapter for the 1554 Shipwreck Project at its semicentennial.



TCAS meets at 7:30 p.m. on the second Thursday of each month (except June and December) at the University of North Texas Health Science Center (UNTHSC), 3500 Camp Bowie Boulevard, Fort Worth, in the Lewis Library Building, Room 110, near the intersection of Camp Bowie and Montgomery Street. Traveling west on I30 from downtown, take the Montgomery Street exit. Turn right on Montgomery and continue to the five-way intersection at Camp Bowie. Turn right onto Camp Bowie, followed by an immediate left onto Clifton Street. Continue on Clifton to Parking Lot "1" on your left (past the Parking Garage and Sky bridge). Park in the patient spaces (after 5:00 p.m.) and go past the information booth into the underground parking garage. Turn left down the corridor at the double doors in the center. Proceed down the hallway until you come to Room 110 in the Lewis Library building.



Newberry Cabin Historic Site: Recent Excavation History

The strange weather we are experiencing this spring is playing havoc with the excavation days I planned at the beginning of the spring semester. To avoid the rain and still be productive, on March 2 instead of excavating at the Cabin, Amanda Edwards from the Doss Heritage and Culture Center of Weatherford visited my class at Weatherford College. Amanda gave us a wonderful presentation on museum curation practices which differ from our archeology curation practices. Chris Meis and I learned that the Doss prefers that we do no cleaning of the artifacts we are recovering at the Cabin. Learning this fact will certainly speed up our processing the artifacts when we finally do get to spend some time in the lab.

We have been able to get in the field and excavate on March 16, 23 and 24. Of course my standard TCAS excavation crew of Chris Meis, Art Tawater, Bret Williamson, Mike Shannon, and Lori Gouge were there along with Gen Freix, Daniel Davenport, Andrea Johnson, Jose Garcia, Sonny Wheeler, Lloyd Erwin and granddaughter Caroline. Much to our surprise and pleasure, we had a star appearance from one of our long time TCAS members when Ona B Reed came out for a visit! My five students from Weatherford College, and two students from my Tarrant County College Introduction to Archeology class were also at the site. Everyone's help is always greatly appreciated and much needed so even if you can't excavate, please just drop by and we will give you a short tour of the site and visit for a little bit.

If you will remember from my last update, I wrote about the woman visiting us who lived at the Cabin when she was a child and shared details from the past about the Cabin. Her telling us about the kitchen addition and the fence on the north side of the Cabin has proved to be very helpful. We already had two large pieces of flat stone exposed in one unit, and with the above knowledge, we opened up three more 2 X 2 units and the two pieces of flat stone turned into a stepping stone path to the north from the kitchen area. Late in the day on the 24th, Lori Gouge was excavating in a unit that we think would have been underneath the kitchen area and found our first intact glass bottle of a cobalt blue color. We can't wait to get back out there and see what else this area is going to reveal to us! Please look for pictures of the blue bottle, stone path and some of our crew further in this newsletter.

The following days are currently scheduled at the Newberry Cabin for excavation. Please note the change from the previous schedule that April 20 is a Friday and at the request of my Weatherford students, this will be an excavation day not a lab day. I am hoping to get in a couple of more excavation days in May before we all head to TAS field school, but we will look at those days later in the month.

May: 5/05, Saturday, 9:00 a.m

Directions to the site will be available at our monthly meetings or I can email you a copy.

When the Newberry Cabin is relocated to the Pioneer Cabin Park at the Doss Heritage and Culture Center (DHCC) in Weatherford, it will join the McDonald Cabin, which was moved to the park on September 14, 2017.



Thanks and bravo to Ben and Trudy Termini for their continued support and sponsorship of the Distinguished Anthropologist Lecture Series at the University of Texas at Arlington. Dr. John O'Shea was the guest lecturer for the 2018 event, which was the 18th in the Series. Dr. O'Shea is the Curator of Great Lakes Archaeology at the University of Michigan Museum of Anthropological Archaeology (UMMAA), and the *Emerson F. Greenman Collegiate Professor of Archaeology* in the Department of Anthropology. He received his PhD in Prehistoric Archaeology at Cambridge University in 1979. In addition to underwater research, he is active in terrestrial archaeology in the Great Lakes region and in the Bronze Age of Eastern Europe.



From the CMSHS newsletter: Please join us on Saturday, April 14 from 10 a.m.–3 p.m. as we celebrate Caddo Culture Day. Visitors will experience Caddo culture through a number of activities including a live performance of Caddo Indian music and dance. Other activities include: talks about Caddo culture, guided hikes, children’s activities, exhibits by Caddo artists, and more.

More than 1,200 years ago, a group of Caddo Indians known as the Hasinai built a village 26 miles west of present-day Nacogdoches. The site was the southwestern-most ceremonial center for the great Mound Builder culture. Today, three earthen mounds still rise from the lush Pineywoods landscape, where visitors discover the everyday life and the history of this ancient civilization.
