September Speaker: Heather Para

The First Vikings of Britain

Lindisfarne is one of the most iconic sites in Britain. This is where the Kings of Northumbria established an important religious centre, where resident monks created the Lindisfarne Gospels, and where skilled artisans forged the treasures that adorned the altars of early Medieval Europe. It's also where Vikings launched a series of devastating raids in the 8th, 9th, and 10th centuries. The early medieval monastery that once stood there was lost to time. In 2014, commercial archaeology company Digventures joined forces with experts from Durham University and unearthed the first concrete evidence of the lost monastery. This presentation will discuss what this project has discovered, and what the archaeology tells us about life before, during, and after Vikings arrived on the Holy Island of Lindisfarne.

Dr. Heather Para is the current Exhibits & Collections Manager for the Museum of the Coastal Bend at Victoria College. Para holds a PhD in Archaeology from the University of Wales Trinity St. David. Para taught at the post-secondary level for ten years and has worked



in museums for ten years as well. Her archaeological work has been primarily in Britain and has taken her to Greece and coastal Alaska. In her current role Para oversees an ongoing excavation at 41VT141, the McNeill Ranch Site, and manages the museum's archaeology lab where materials for the site are processed.



TAS/ETAC 2022 Annual Meeting



The co-hosts for this year's meeting are North Texas Archeological Society and the Department of Social Sciences at UT Tyler, TX. The Program Co-Chairs are Dr. Thomas Guderjan and Dr. E. Abstracts and creative ideas are sought for papers, symposia, and posters to be presented at the 93rd Annual Meeting of the Texas Archeological Society on October 21-23, 2022, at the University of Texas at Tyler. TAS encourages presentations by avocational, student, and professional archeologist members on any topic of archeological interest.

In addition to individual papers, we welcome regional and topical symposia. Anyone interested in presenting at the meeting should contact the program chair for availability.

All presenters must be TAS members and be registered for the meeting. Papers will be limited to 15 minutes. The deadline for receipt of paper abstracts is September 9, 2022.

Poster presentations can effectively convey visual, graphic, and quantitative information, and posters reach a larger audience than oral papers. Members are encouraged to consider poster presentations as an alternative to papers. Poster abstracts must be received by September 9, 2022 to appear in the program; late poster entries may be accommodated after consultation with the Program Chair.

Other presentation formats such as discussions, demonstrations, and hands-on workshops may be held on approval of the Program Chair and Annual Meeting organizers.

Submit all abstracts as files attached to email. Meeting rooms will be equipped with data projectors and laptop computers; additional audiovisual needs may be accommodated given prior notice. Contact the Program Chair with questions about submission dates, formats, and/or equipment. We look forward to your contributions to this meeting.

Abstracts must include the following information: Paper/Symposium/Poster (indicate one); Title; Author (s) and Affiliation(s); Abstract for each presentation (150 words maximum).

Denton Dig It Archeology Fair

October is sure to be an exciting month for NTAS with another TAM event on our calendar. The Denton County Historical Commission is hosting their first annual "Denton Dig It Archeology Fair" on October Ist at History Park on Carroll Boulevard in Denton. The fair will be adjoining the Denton Community Farmers' Market that occurs every Saturday featuring live music, kids' activities, local farms, local artists, food trucks, food vendors, and, on this weekend, a section dedicated to celebrating TAM and archeology happening in Denton County. In addition to NTAS, other participants include the Denton County Office of History and Culture, the City of Denton Preservation Office, and Integrated Environmental Solutions, LLC. The fair will feature different exhibits and activities including one hosted by Doug Boyd that highlights the TxDOT Bolivar excavations of Tom Cook's blacksmith shop, a project many of our members volunteered on in the past. There will be an earth oven demo, a presentation of prehistoric Texas rock art, and flintknapping by our very own Dylan Holubar. In addition, local Scouts have been invited to attend the fair and participate in a mock excavation and an activity that demonstrates stratigraphy where they will attempt to reconstruct a past event by exploring the contents of an intentionally stratified trash can.

Volunteers will be needed at this event to talk with folks about NTAS and archeology at our booth and to guide participants through the mock excavation dig and trash can stratigraphy activity. Volunteers for the mock dig will need to feel comfortable walking participants through a basic excavation process where-

as the stratigraphy activity is scripted. The archeology fair and market will be open 9 AM to 1 PM but volunteers need to arrive around 8:30 to check in.


Paluxy River Dinosaur Tracks And a Call to Volunteer



Who Are Those People? The NTAS Photo Archive Project

Thanks to months of hard work by NTAS Historian Linda Lang and President Jimmy Barrera, the NTAS paper and digital archives were accepted by the University of Texas at Arlington's Special Collections section in January. (See the January and February 2022 NTAS Benchmark.) The NTAS newsletters, publications, and administrative records will be protected at UTA and will be readily available to NTAS members and the public. However, the many photos that had been part of the NTAS archives have not yet been submitted to UTA. Before that happens, decisions need to be made concerning which photos should be placed in the Special Collections. Also, to the extent possible, archived photos need to be identified regarding the event that is taking place in the photo, the date of the event, and any people involved.

I began this project by eliminating photos that were not appropriate for the archives (e.g., casual scenes from past parties; individual campsites or trailers with no people pictured; antique cars displayed at museums visited by members; etc.). I have also turned over to Paula Vastine, the Texas Archeological Society (TAS) Historian, a number of photos that pertained more to TAS events and members than to NTAS members. Those pictures will become part of the TAS photo archive.

For many of the remaining NTAS photos, I have been able to provide identifying information based on personal knowledge of the events and the members involved. However, there are still a number of photos for which I need help to determine what was happening, when the photo was taken, and/or who is pictured. Since June, I have shown these photos to several NTAS members individually, and their responses have completed the documentation for some pictures. Over the next few months, I will schedule times when other longtime members can provide input on the photos. If you would like to view the several hundred photos on an individual basis, just let me know (immediatepastpresident@ntxas.org).

On August 11, I brought 10 photos to the NTAS meeting, each with an attached sheet asking for information regarding the event, the date, and the name of the person or people in the photograph. I plan to bring 10 different photos to the next few NTAS monthly meetings for similar member input. **Each month, please look for the photo display** on a table near the front of our meeting room and provide any information you can. Even if you cannot help identify any of the photos, the pictures provide interesting insights into our organization – who we are, how we have changed, and what we have done through the years.
