

TCAS meets at 7:30 p.m. on the second Thursday of each month (except June and December) at the University of North Texas Health Science Center (UNTHSC), 3500 Camp Bowie Boulevard, Fort Worth, in the Lewis Library Building, Room 110, near the intersection of Camp Bowie and Montgomery Street. Traveling west on I30 from downtown, take the Montgomery Street exit. Turn right on Montgomery and continue to the five-way intersection at Camp Bowie. Turn right onto Camp Bowie, followed by an immediate left onto Clifton Street. Continue on Clifton to Parking Lot "1" on your left (past the Parking Garage and Sky bridge). 

October Speaker: Jeff Durst

The **TARRANT COUNTY ARCHEOLOGICAL SOCIETY (TCAS)** will welcome Jeff Durst as the featured speaker for the October 11th meeting. TCAS meetings are free and visitors are always welcome.

Bio Jeff Durst has a bachelor's degree in English literature and a master's degree in anthropology from the University of Texas at San Antonio. Durst has been actively employed in archeology for the past 24 years, most recently as a THC Regional Archeologist and Project Reviewer for southeast Texas. Prior to his current position he served as the project director of the THC's Fort St. Louis Archeological Project. He has experience in both historic and prehistoric archeology and has worked in Texas, New Mexico, and Belize, Central America. His educational research was focused on the pre-



historic Maya civilization with a concentration on the archeology of the Maya Lowlands. Durst previously was employed by the Center for Archaeological Research at the University of Texas at San Antonio and acted as a Project Archeologist conducting archival research, archeological surveys, site excavations, artifact analysis, and report preparation. Durst has authored and coauthored numerous publications and papers on the archeology of Texas, New Mexico, and Belize.

Topic: Excavations at San Felipe de Austin 2014-2016

Abstract Excavations at the site of San Felipe de Austin began in June of 2014 as part of the annual Texas Archeological Society Field School and continued on in the 2015 and 2016 TAS Field Schools. The excavations which took place at the Texas Historical Commission's San Felipe de Austin State Historic Site, focused on the historic "town lot" 566 where the Farmer's Hotel was reportedly constructed between 1829 and1830. While still under construction the building served as the town hall described by San Felipe resident Noah Smithwick in his memoirs. The structure was described as being 32 feet square with a brick cellar 6 feet deep. The first season focused on attempting to locate the four corners of the brick cellar and getting an idea of the construction method of the brick outer wall of the cellar. The second season continued the attempt to define the four corners of the cellar and also included a centrally located unit aimed at identifying the floor of the cellar. A third session was held in November of 2015 in order to take at least a few of the previously opened units all the way to the floor of the basement. Returning in 2016 excavations focused on two other features known to have been located on this same lot. The four seasons produced an interesting array of artifacts and features which will be discussed during this presentation.

James was born and raised in Fort Worth, but has lived in many other places (e.g., Madrid, Spain; Baltimore, MD; Denver, CO). He credits his grandfather with kindling his interest in archeology, since his grandfather had a collection of Indian artifacts from the Great Lakes area and often dis-

cussed the points with James when James was a child.

In 1970, James joined TCAS, TAS and the Dallas Archeological Society. Since then, he has served in a number of positions, including:

For TCAS: President (1975-1978), Vice-President/ Program Chairman (1995-1998), Historian (2016-present)

For TAS: Regional Vice-President (1978-1980), Director (1984-1988), Region 3 Director (2016-present), Secretary of the Field School Committee (1988-1990), Parliamentarian (2018) For DAS: Vice-President/Program Chairman

(late 1970s, 1980s)



James has written a number of articles for the TCAS newsletter through the years, has done a dozen presentations for us, and has also spoken at the meetings of other archeological societies (Collin County, Parker County, Iraan) as well as at outside organizations (e.g., Rotary Clubs, AARP, Department of Agriculture). He is an Archeology Steward for the Texas Historical Commission, attends Southwest Federation meetings each April, and is a member of the Iraan and Concho Valley Archeological Societies.

James received a BA in Spanish with a minor in History from the University of Texas at Arlington and an MA in Spanish with a minor in Linguistics from Indiana University. He taught school in Dalhart and at Dallas Highland Park before becoming a bilingual Claims Representative with the Social Security Administration (SSA). He ended his 32-year career with SSA as the Regional Commissioner over the 6-State Denver Region. He then managed a tax preparation office, conducted investigations for Federal top secret clearances, and taught Communication and Leadership Skills for The Graduate School throughout the United States, in Thailand and in Japan.
