I look forward to seeing you all at the February 13th meeting!



February Speaker: Reid Ferring

Earliest Humans in Eurasia: The 1.8 million year old site of Dmanisi in the Georgian Caucasus

Located in the southern Caucasus Mountains, the Dmanisi site contains the earliest Eurasian fossils of Homo erectus, as well as thousands of stone artifacts and fossils of over 50 species of extinct animals. The site covers at least 40,000 square meters and has stratified deposits up to 6 meters thick, bearing evidence of many repeated occupations. Five Homo erectus skulls and many post-cranial bones derive from the population. Associated artifacts and faunas reveal patterns of scavenging and possible hunting, in an environment that supported many prey species and an exceptionally large group of carnivores, especially wolves and large cats. That these small humans could survive in such a hostile environment, without fire or projectile weapons, suggests strong bonds among social omnivores.

Reid Ferring is Professor emeritus in the Department of Geography and the Environment, University of North Texas. He earned a PhD in Archaeology at Southern Methodist University and a PhD in Geology from the University of Texas at Dallas. His research interests include Quaternary geology of North Central Texas, as well as archaeology and geology in Oklahoma, Israel, Portugal, Ukraine (Crimea) and for 30 years in the Republic of Georgia. There he has been a member of the international team working at the I.8 million year old site of Dmanisi.



NTAS meets at 7:00 p.m. on the second Thursday of each month (except June and December) at the University of North Texas Health Science Center, 3500 Camp Bowie Boulevard, Fort Worth (in the Research and Education Building, Room 114), near the intersection of Camp Bowie and Montgomery Street.

Traveling west on I-30 from downtown, take the Montgomery Street exit. Turn right on Montgomery and continue to the five-way intersection at Camp Bowie. Turn right onto Camp Bowie, followed by an immediate left onto Clifton Street. Turn into the first parking lot on the left (Administrator and Visitor Parking). You will drive past an information booth as you enter the parking lot. Park on the far (north/west) end of the parking lot and enter the Research and Education building. Once you enter the building, turn right and proceed down the hallway to Room 114.

NTAS Members Stephen and Linda Bell volunteered at the final excavations at Washington-on-the-Brazos last month with archeologist Alexandra Younger.




