January Speaker: Ryan Breslawski

Bunnies, Badgers, and Box Turtles: Early Caddo Diets along Bois D'Arc Creek

In northeastern Texas, Caddo subsistence is synonymous with cultigens such as maize, but domesticated plants are only one aspect of pre-contact diets in the area. This region is rich in deer, migratory birds, and fish, and animal foods likely would have been diverse for much of the late Holocene. Between 2019 and 2021, AR Consultants, Inc. excavated six sites in the Bois d'Arc Creek watershed of northeastern Texas, providing a snapshot of Early Caddo (AD ~1000-1200) subsistence patterns. The animal bone recovered from these sites suggests that woodland environments provided people with a variety of mammals, birds, and reptiles. Despite the presence of some animals common in plains and prairie environments, bison are lacking. This talk will focus on what we have observed so far, what it suggests about the kinds of environments that people were living in, and the choices that those people made when it came to deciding what was on the menu.

Ryan Breslawski is an archaeologist who studies the roles of animals in human subsistence economies. His research focuses on Texas, the Great Plains, and the Intermountain West, from the Late Paleoindian period to early agricultural societies. Prior to joining the Bois d'Arc Lake project at AR Consultants, Ryan studied human responses to declining bison habitats during the Early Archaic period across the Great Plains, spanning central Alberta to West Texas. He received his PhD from Southern Methodist University, MS from Utah State University, and BS from the University of Utah, all three in anthropology.



Charlene Erwin — Historian


