



Our excursion on November 19th was a perfect opportunity to see this park, and with Jim's narrative, to discover the prior historical uses of this small Preserve. The Preserve, maintained as a "wildscape" by the Arlington Parks and Wildlife Department, is a haven for bird watchers and also serves as the home for the non-native farkleberry tree\shrub, which produces edible berries, and the sumac, with leaves that showcase "autumn" colors.

For you, with love: Reserve a spot for yourself at the 2018 TAS Academy in San Antonio!



He explained his very thorough methodology in site verification that encompassed archeological principles. *The Texas Frontier and the Butterfield Overland Mail, 1858-1861,* published by OU Press in 2016, does not disappoint and is a terrific addition to any library.

Another reason to include this in your gifting is the cover, which features the dramatic painting, "*A Taint On the Wind*," painted in 1906 by Frederic Remington. The original work is on view at the Sid Richardson Museum in downtown Fort Worth.
