The service will include the unveiling of our new commemorative shield and will be followed by a light morning tea.

### **George Town Council Roadshow**

This week Greg Kieser and Shane Power, accompanied by Councillors Dawson, Harris Barwick and Mason, and GTC staff, presented their annual Roadshow which highlighted a range of Council initiatives and priorities.

The following is a summary of their presentation.

## • Flood Mitigation and Recovery.

During the last rain event, a number of bridges and 23 roads were impacted. Council has been working to repair the damage. Permanent bridges that need to be replaced will be replaced with more flood resistant structures.

## • Trevor Street Extension and Breakwater repairs.

Plant will be mobilized this coming Monday to commence works on the access road to the Trevor Street boat ramp. Works will take approximately 3 months. Repairs to the breakwater will commence in about 6 weeks, after which the Trevor Street extension will be completed to provide improved access for boat trailers.

### Dalrymple Road Upgrade.

Improvements to Dalrymple Road including the Dalrymple Road, Industry Road intersection, the Bangor Road section of Dalrymple Road and The Glen will go to tender soon.

## • Weymouth Recreation Area.

There has been no further action from the private developer.

#### • Village Character Plans.

This project will investigate the "look and feel" of villages based on feedback from residents. This may include improved signage, vegetation and recreation areas. Conversations with local community members will commence in 2024.

#### • Artisan Guild.

A grant of \$380k from the Government will provide a retail and work space for local artisans. This funding will be for three years after which it is hoped that the Guild will be self-funded. A retail space has been secured in Macquarie Street.

## • Get Out Into the Wild.

A Grant from Austrade of \$400k will allow the Council to promote existing activities within the Municipality such as scuba diving, rock climbing, sky diving.

## • Colonial and Heritage Trail.

This initiative will combine interpretation boards with storytelling. QR Codes will enable visitors to link to heritage sites where they will be able to see



digital imagery of the site and read historical transcripts. This will also include public artworks. There has been a \$300k commitment by the private sector for seed funding which will be matched by the GTC and supplemented by State and Federal funding. The program will include the kanamaluka trail which will provide a First Nations perspective on the history of George Town. This program also includes a Commitment to Reconciliation.

Acknowledgment of Country will be included on Council assets and dual flags will be flown on Council flagpoles. A part time Aboriginal Liaison Officer has been appointed.

## • G is for Gastronomy.

Launceston has been recognised by UNESCO as a City of Gastronomy. There will be follow on benefits for the George Town community and north east of Tasmania.

#### Our Futures.

The Tasmanian Community Fund has provided funding of \$500k to establish a Youth Advisory Group. This will consist of 10-15 12-25 year olds under the guidance of Community Youth Development Officer, Andy Beeston.

## • Aquatic Health and Wellbeing Centre.

This will be funded by a Federal election commitment of \$15m with a further \$2.5m from the state Government. The GTC will contribute \$2.5m-3.5m to this project which will be linked to improved opportunities for residents of the George Gown Municipality to engage with the NDIS programs and therapies such as hydro therapy and aqua aerobics. The Centre will provide Learn to Swim courses, Child Care and a café. Annual operating costs are estimated to be \$600k.

Attendees at the Roadshow raised a number of questions including:

- Historical context relating to the Colonial and Heritage Trail
- Disability access to the main beach.
- Access the Nearby Safer Place.
- Rate rebates for Commonwealth Health Care Card Holders.
- Roadside verges and overhanging trees.

The General Manager and Mayor provided responses and undertook to follow up any unanswered questions.

The GTC presentation was the followed by a presentation by Kirsten Seaver from Tamar NRM, which addressed the five focus areas of:

- Sustainable agriculture
- Environmental education



- Biodiversity
- Weed management
- Sustainable living.

A new App has been developed to target Boneseed, Ragwort and Sea Spurge. The App will allow residents to identify weeds and report on weed density to Tamar NRM. The App will be released in April.

Kirsten also talked about feral cat management and fuel reduction burns.
