Thank you for reading my newsletter for legislative updates and District 37 news.

This week the House reconvened for a voting session. The House passed the conference report to House Bill 10, "Require ICE Cooperation & Budget Adjustments." This bill provides for many necessary budget adjustments including Medicaid rebase funding, \$159 million in ADM enrollment growth which goes directly to NC public schools and community colleges, rural broadband expansion, funding for the opportunity scholarship waitlist which the General Assembly committed to last year, and a provision to strengthen public safety by requiring NC sheriffs to cooperate with ICE detainer requests for illegal immigrants charged with serious crimes.

The House also voted to override the Governor's veto of SB166 "2024 Bldg. Code Regulatory Reform" - a regulatory reform bill regarding amending various developmental regulations and state building codes.

It continues to be my absolute honor and privilege to serve the people of District 37 in the North Carolina House.

Rep. Paré Explains Lesser Known Details About the Opportunity Scholarship Program

Rep. Paré has received several questions about the opportunity scholarship pulling money from public schools. This is important.

Simply put - the state saves money when a student chooses to leave the public school system and uses a voucher to attend a private school. Current law says the state will reinvest those savings into public schools even if the student isn't in the public school anymore.

Explanation: There is a hold harmless intent provision in state law, which was passed last year, that says,

"It is the intent of the General Assembly to reinvest in the public schools any savings realized by the State each year, beginning in the 2025-2026 school year." (Section 7.82 of the 2023 Appropriation Act)

Since the average Opportunity Scholarship award is less than the per pupil public school spending, there will be a realized savings to the state if a student leaves the public school system and switches to a private school using a voucher, which is a fraction of the cost to the state than if the student remained in public school.

This language currently in law indicates the General Assembly's intent to reinvest that savings back in to the public school system even though the child has left the system.

The Department of Public Instruction is required to calculate those savings.

Another fact regarding opportunity scholarships that rarely gets mentioned in public discourse, and this involves accountability:

Did you know that state law requires that any nonpublic school must administer a nationally standardized test to their students starting in 3rd grade who are opportunity scholarship recipients every year just like public school students, AND, the Superintendent of Public Instruction by law is charged with picking a nationally standardized test for all 3rd and 8th graders who receive a voucher, AND, that those test results need to be submitted to the NCSEAA by July 15 of each year, and to parents of the student?




