NC House Passed HB 149 "Disaster Recovery Act of 2024"



On Wednesday October 9th, the North Carolina House of Representatives approved the first hurricane relief package in a unanimous vote. Natural disasters like Hurricane Helene are why the General Assembly keeps a strong rainy day fund. The tragedy and destruction that occurred in western NC will take many years to recover.

Key Provisions of HB 149:

\$273 million is allocated from the Savings Reserve to the Hurricane Helene Fund

- \$250 million to the Department of Public Safety's Division of Emergency Management to provide the state match for federal disaster assistance programs for state agencies and local governments.
- \$16 million to supplement or replace the lost compensation for school nutrition employees affected by school closures due to Hurricane Helene.
- \$2 million to provide grants to entities such as the North Carolina League of Municipalities, the North Carolina Association of County Commissioners, and the North Carolina Association of Regional Councils of Governments.
- \$5 million is allocated to the North Carolina State Board of Elections (NCSBE) to address election-related issues resulting from the disaster.

Election Modifications

- Allows for additional flexibility in appointing election judges and poll workers.
- County election boards can modify early voting plans by bipartisan majority vote, including changing early voting sites, days, and hours of

- operation.
- Election boards are also able to make changes to election-day polling places.
- Extends ballot return options for absentee ballots, enabling voters registered in the impacted counties to return their ballots to any county board of elections, early voting site, or voting place up until 7:30 pm on election day. It also allows for in-person absentee ballot requests up until 5 pm on Nov 4, the day before election day.
- Allows poll observers from outside a county to serve in the affected counties.
- Requires the NCSBE to establish processes for transmitting out-ofcounty ballots to the appropriate county including documentation of the chain of custody of ballots.
- Mandates education efforts, which include establishing a hotline for voters impacted by the disaster.


The General Assembly is set to reconvene on October 24, and it is expected to pass a second round of disaster relief funding.

Unprecedented Response to Hurricane Helene Continues as State, Local and Federal Resources Work to Help those Impacted in Western North Carolina

North Carolina National Guard and Military Response

More than 3,000 Soldiers and Airmen are now working in Western North Carolina. Joint Task Force - North Carolina, the task force led by the North Carolina National Guard is made up of Soldiers and Airmen from 12 different states, two different XVIII Airborne Corps units from Ft. Liberty, a unit from Ft. Campbell's 101st Airborne Division, and numerous civilian entities are working side-by-side to get the much-needed help to the citizens in western North Carolina.

National Guard and military personnel are operating more than 40 helicopters and more than 1,200 specialized vehicles in Western North Carolina to facilitate these missions. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers is helping to assess water and wastewater plants and dams. Residents can track the status of the public water supply in their area through a <u>website</u> launched on Saturday.

FEMA Assistance

More than \$60 million in <u>FEMA Individual Assistance</u> funds have been paid so far to Western NC disaster survivors and more than 134,000 people have registered for Individual Assistance. Approximately 2,600 people are now housed in hotels through FEMA's Transitional Sheltering Assistance. Federal partners have delivered approximately 9.78 million liters of water and approximately 7.7 million meals in North Carolina to support both responders and people living in the affected communities.

More than 900 FEMA staff are in the state to help with the western North Carolina relief effort. In addition to search and rescue and providing commodities, they are meeting with disaster survivors in shelters and neighborhoods to provide rapid access to relief resources. They can be identified by their FEMA logo apparel and federal government identification.

The Major Disaster Declaration requested by Governor Cooper and granted by President Biden now includes 27 North Carolina counties (Alexander, Alleghany, Ashe, Avery, Buncombe, Burke, Caldwell, Catawba, Clay,

Cleveland, Gaston, Haywood, Henderson, Jackson, Lincoln, Macon, Madison, McDowell, Mecklenburg, Mitchell, Polk, Rutherford, Swain, Transylvania, Watauga, Wilkes and Yancey) and the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians.

North Carolinians can apply for Individual Assistance by calling 1-800-621-3362 from 7am to 11pm daily or by visiting www.disasterassistance.gov, or by downloading the FEMA app. FEMA may be able to help with serious needs, displacement, temporary lodging, basic home repair costs, personal property loss or other disaster-caused needs.

Help from Other States

More than 1,300 responders from 35 state and local agencies have performed 118 missions supporting the response and recovery efforts through the Emergency Management Assistance Compact (EMAC). This includes public health nurses, emergency management teams supporting local governments, veterinarians, teams with search dogs and more.

Beware of Misinformation

North Carolina Emergency Management and local officials are cautioning the public about false Helene reports and misinformation being shared on social media. NCEM has launched a <u>fact versus rumor response webpage</u> to provide factual information in the wake of this storm. FEMA also has a <u>rumor response</u> webpage.

Food, Water and Commodity Points of Distribution

Efforts continue to provide food, water and basic necessities to residents in affected communities, using both ground resources and air drops from the NC National Guard. More than 20,000 hot meals a day are being prepared and served by mobile kitchens. Food, water and commodity points of distribution are open throughout western North Carolina. Missing Persons

To report a missing person or request non-emergency support, please call NC 211 or 1-888-892-1162 if calling from out-of-state. NC 211 also has a <u>registry page</u> for missing persons and welfare check requests.

Shelters

A total of 17 shelters are open in Western North Carolina serving 715 people and 102 pets.

Storm Damage Cleanup

Power Outages

Across Western North Carolina, more than 86,000 customers remain without power as of Tuesday, down from a peak of more than 1 million. Overall power outage numbers will fluctuate up and down as power crews temporarily take circuits or substations offline to make repairs and restore additional customers.

Road Closures

Travel remains dangerous, with hundreds of roads closed. Many of these roads are primary routes connecting the region. As connectivity and reporting measures improve, these number may increase.

NCDOT is asking people to avoid unnecessary travel to or in Western North Carolina. NCDOT has posted at ncdot.gov an <u>interstate detour map</u> for travelers to avoid western N.C. NCDOT currently has more than 2,100 employees and 1,100 pieces of equipment working on approximately 4,700 damaged road sites.

Fatalities

Eighty-eight storm-related deaths have been confirmed in North Carolina by the Office of Chief Medical Examiner. We expect that this number will continue to rise over the coming days. The North Carolina Office of the Chief Medical Examiner will continue to confirm numbers twice daily. If you have an emergency or believe that someone is in danger, please call 911. To report that you have been unable to reach a person in Western North Carolina, please call 211.

Volunteers and Donations

Due to dangerous road conditions and the need to maintain open routes for emergency operations, travel to Western North Carolina is strongly discouraged. Instead, consider the following options for donations and volunteer opportunities:



2024 House, Senate and Congressional District Maps





HB 898: House Redistricting Plan 2023/H898 Ed 2 (above).
