

Pastor's Corner Being the Church in the Time of Coronavirus

Never could I have imagined such a time as we are in. When I was planning for Lent this year, the wilderness theme seemed right, based on where I thought we were, so very long ago in late February. We were concerned about torrential rains and floods, intermittent snow days, and schools being closed to help slow the spread of the flu. How far in the distant past it all seems!

Wilderness is where we are. All the signposts that help us orient ourselves and our lives are missing or immaterial in the present moment. In the absence of all that normal noise of daily living, what do you notice? I think I'm more aware of spring bursting forth around us. I'm paying more attention to the songs of the birds, the warmer days, the flowers budding and then exploding in color. I'm not rushing as much from one thing to another. There are a few pauses. A few moments to take a deep breath. Gratitude for life. Stopping to be thankful even in the midst of uncertainty.

Everything that seemed important for us to do, all the places to go, activities that we needed to attend has all faded into the background as we focus on the pandemic in front of us and around us. In our house, Dan has turned our dining room table into his workstation. He is doing his work from there, nearly business as usual, constantly on the computer, taking calls, and attending meetings online. Meanwhile, our granddaughter is trying to get enough attention to do her school work in between calls, with both of us on our computers a lot. In general, all of us are together more



than we are used to. We are eating suppers together, and, because there isn't anything to rush off to, we are taking more time to talk about things that matter – in the moment and longer term.

But we miss the routine and rituals of life. We miss the clamor and the hectic pace. We miss being with other people. We miss worship. We miss the rituals of worship – of singing together, of offering signs of peace, of sharing in the bread and cup. We know that rituals are important, and now handwashing has become its own ritual. As we prepare our hearts and minds for Holy Week, I think about how Jesus washed his disciples' feet. Even the feet of the one who was about to betray him. Which makes me think that what we do now to try to stop the spread of the virus in this time of pandemic is for us, and it is for those who are not us. We are all in this together. As ones whom God loves, as ones for whom Jesus died.


Where is God in the midst of all this? God is with us. God is with the health care workers on the front lines who are putting their own lives at risk. God is with the ones who get sick and even die without family around them. God is with the families who lose loved ones, even as grief is overwhelming in the moment. I don't for a minute believe that God sent the pandemic as punishment or to get our attention. But I do believe that as in any time of trial, there are lessons that we can learn about what is truly important.

COVID-19, the novel corona virus has taken over the news and has dominated the changes in behavior. We won't know if our response is right until later, when the metaphorical dust settles. For right now, not gathering for worship, staying home and away from other people seems to be the best, most caring, loving response we can make as a faith community.

Yet, we are social creatures. We struggle with the social distancing. I'm a hugger by nature. One way I've heard this described is a time of <u>physical</u> distancing. We can still connect <u>socially</u>. We have all these wonderful ways of communicating with one another. Telephone calls, texting, email, social media...now is a great time to get in touch with someone you are missing seeing. Perhaps someone you usually only see at work or in church or at the beauty salon. Let them know you are thinking about them. See if they need anything. We are still the church.

My prayer for all of us is to find ways to be the church outside of the building. The vision I've always had for the gathering community that is the church is that we come to building for teaching and worship, and are then deployed for mission. We, right now, are in an extended time of deployment. Paul reminds us:

God shows no partiality and doesn't favor one group over the other. This is the message of peace that comes in proclaiming the good news through Jesus Christ – He is Lord of All! (Acts 10:34-36 paraphrased).

An Easter



Most hymnals include "The Old Rugged Cross," composed by George Bennard (1873-1958) in the early 20thcentury. Bennard was a Christian evangelist, lyricist and composer who traveled throughout the Midwest. The inspiration for the hymn came from several youth attending a revival meeting in Michigan. While we would love to believe he was inspired by their examples of Christian love, it was their constant heckling during the revival meeting.

He was troubled by their disdain for the gospel and turned to his Bible when he was alone later. As he studied and considered the works of Christ and the cross he stated, "I seemed to have a

vision ... I saw the Christ and the cross inseparable." He quickly composed the melody and the first verse and then continued to work on the verses over a period of months. In June of 1913 he played and sung the hymn for the pastor and wife in Pokagon, Michigan where he was leading a revival at a local church. The minister was moved to tears and the song premiered in the revival service on June 7, 1913. First, Bennard sang the hymn with guitar accompaniment, then a five-voice choir sang with organ and violin accompaniment. This barn turned church is now owned by the non-profit Old Rugged Cross Foundation and receives thousands of visitors each year.
