George Holekamp Belt Buckle Awarded at the Annual Youth Range Workshop



The campers visited and learned from two local ranchers, toured the Kerr Wildlife Management Area, and swam in the headwaters of Johnson Creek. This was all made possible by our amazing donors and sponsors, an excellent group of students and our hard working and outstanding adult directors and speakers.
