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## TEXAS BRIGADES CAMP - 2015 SEASON

The Texas Brigades' mission is to educate and empower youths with leadership skills and knowledge in wildlife, fisheries, and land stewardship to become conservation ambassadors for a sustained natural resource legacy.

The Texas Brigades is a wildlife-focused leadership development program for high school youth (ages 13-17). There are five different camps! You will be introduced to habitat management, hone your communication skills, and develop a land ethic. The state's leading wildlife and fisheries biologists and land managers serve as instructor and mentors. Each camp is 4 1/2 days long. Camps are held on private ranches in different areas of the state. In addition to learning animal anatomy and behavior, botany, nutrition, habitat management, population dynamics, etc., you will learn valuable leadership skills. You will write news releases, practice public

speaking, and find out how to handle radio and television interviews. If you are interested in biology, conservation, leadership or just appreciate the outdoors, you should consider applying to one of these camps!

### **Conservation Tip: Caring for Native Plants**

We all know the benefits of planting native plants, but how do we care for them best once we have them? Let's focus in on trees and woody shrubs, although many of these suggestions can be used across the board for all native plants.

Established native plants should be able to survive without watering, fertilizing or pruning but these practices can be utilized to improve the plant. Most newly planted plants need to be watered about an inch weekly to establish themselves for the first year. For established plants, water no more than a few times a month, watering slowly allowing the water to penetrate deeply. Watering for established plants may only need to take place during drought conditions, as some species can react adversely to over-watering.

Pruning is not necessary for native plants either, unless you want to improve the appearance of a plant. Any pruning should be done carefully. Always sanitize your tools with rubbing alcohol to prevent the spread of diseases or fungus. Also make sure to paint all pruned spots on all species!

Fertilizers, again, are not necessary but can be used on native plants. Always fertilize in the early spring months and never in drought conditions. Avoid fertilizers with a high level of nitrogen, opting instead for a mild fertilizer.

Be observant in changes in your native plants. Any time a disease or problem is suspected, use local resources to diagnose the situation. Your local AgriLife Extension Office is a great place to start since they have numerous information packets and experts on staff to answer your questions. Kerr County also boasts a great Master Naturalist and Master Gardner Programs (through the Extension Office as well), as well as a chapter of the Native Plant Society of Texas and the Riverside Nature Center for resources.

Above all, enjoy your drought-resistant, low maintenance native plants as they are!

## **USDA-NRCS & TSSWCB Programs Available**

Several programs are available for Kerr County residents to apply for and receive assistance in implementing management practices for agricultural land.

The Environmental Quality Incentive Program (EQIP) is designed to assist agricultural producers in enhancing their land with certain management practices. Practices that address and improve water quantity and domestic animals are given high priority in Kerr County and include such practices as brush management,

livestock water systems, fencing, and seeding.

The NRCS office accepts applications for this program year round and more information can be gained by contacting the Kerrville office at 830-896-4911 x 3 or visit the NRCS Texas homepage at: www.tx.nrcs.usda.gov.

The Water Quality
Management Program
(WQMP) is a statedfunded program made
available through Senate
Bill 503. It is a site-specific
plan developed through
and approved by the local
soil and water

conservation district for agricultural or silvicultural lands. The main goal of these plans is to abate agricultural and/or silvicultural nonpoint pollutant contributions to impaired or threatened waters as prioritized. A WQMP covers the entire operating unit and includes required practices applicable to the planned land use. The first step in obtaining a WOMP is to contact the Kerr County SWCD. There is no charge for the development of a WOMP, but there may be costs for implementing required practices outlined in the

WOMP.

Financial assistance is available at this time in the form of a cost-share program for WQMPs in Kerr County. You may read more on this program at TSSWCB's website at: www.tsswcb.texas.gov (click on Programs, then select WQMP). ### **UGRA's Rain Barrel Program**

The Upper Guadalupe River Authority (UGRA) has a rebate program to promote water conservation and watershed stewardship through rainwater harvesting. The Rainwater Catchment System Rebate Program is available to anyone with a Kerr County address and will reimburse eligible applicants up to \$50 when they provide proof of purchase of rainwater catchment system equipment.



This incentive program is open to businesses or individuals who will initiate rainwater harvesting in Kerr County. Purchases of rainwater catchment system equipment made after March 24, 2011 are eligible for the rebate and payment by UGRA is subject to the availability of funds.
