

UGRA Water Enhancement Cost Share Program

Receive an additional 25% reimbursement for finished NRCS and TSSWCB contracts for brush management

Eligibility:

- Property must be located in the Guadalupe River watershed in Kerr County
- Must have signed documentation from NRCS or TSSWCB indicating contract completion
- · Contracts for cedar removal only
- If contract executed after 5/22/19, cedar must be stacked or burned

to Apply:

 Bring project completion documentation to UGRA within 12 months and submit application for reimbursement

Makalya Waiser, daughter of Travis and Amy Waiser, received a \$250.00 Sponsorship Check from the Kerr County SWCD to attend the **Texas 4-H Ambassador Training** program held in College Station. This program strives to provide high school aged 4-H members the opportunity to develop and practice advanced leadership skills related

to mentoring other youth, and to become advocates for animal agriculture. Other objectives are to prepare youth to serve in leadership capacities in junior livestock programs across Texas, to prepare youth for the experience of the University setting through intensive science based instruction and experiences, to prepare and provide opportunities for the youth to serve in advocacy roles for animal agriculture, 4-H, and junior livestock programs, and to develop a heightened awareness of career opportunities in animal agriculture and advocacy. Through the creation of the Texas 4-H Livestock Ambassador Program a new generation of knowledgeable, educated, and well-spoken youth have emerged in Texas to teach other youth and adults the skills of being good stewards, producers, and exhibitors of beef cattle, sheep, goats, and swine.

MARKET FACILITATION PROGRAM

The Market Facilitation Program (MFP) provides direct payments to help producers who have been directly impacted by illegal retaliatory tariffs, resulting in the loss of traditional exports. The MFP is established under the statutory authority of the Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) Charter Act and is under the administration of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA). The Charter Act Authorizes CCC to assist in the expansion of domestic markets or development of new and additional markets and uses.

Producers may apply for MFP through Dec. 6, 2019.

Payments

MFP payments are available to eligible producers of specified commodities for 2019 that include certain non-specialty crops, specialty crops, dairy, and livestock.

MFP payments will be made in up to three tranches (or portions), with the second and third tranches evaluated as market conditions and trade opportunities dictate. If conditions warrant, the second tranche will be made in November, and the Third in January.

The first payment will be comprised of the higher of either 50 percent of a producer's calculated payment or \$15 per acre. The first payments were issued starting in late August.

Producers requesting an MFP payment mush have a crop acreage report on file with FSA for MFP crop commodities.

Cover Crops

Producers affected by natural disasters who filed prevented planting claims then planted an MFP— eligible cover crop, with the potential to be harvested or for subsequent use as forage, may qualify for a \$15 per acre payment. Acreage of cover crops must have been planted by Aug. 1, 2019, to be considered eligible for MFP payments.

Applications can be completed at a local FSA office or submitted electronically either by scanning, emailing, or faxing.
