



What is a cat colony?

A cat colony is a a group of stray cats that live together. The cats could be feral or friendly, or a mix of both. Often, these colonies begin with only a few individuals, but they can quickly grow to a population of several dozen or more if the cats are not sterilized.

How are the colonies managed?

Typically, a caretaker or team of caretakers will care for and manage the colony. CAT works with these caretakers to get cats **TNVR'd** (trapped, neutered, vaccinated, returned), provide food, and assist with other medical care. CAT volunteers assist by transporting food to colonies and cats to veterinary clinics.

How can I help?

One of CAT's three major programs is the Pet Retention & Colony Maintenance Program. Through this program, CAT provides medical care and food assistance to approximately 30 cat colonies. The **Sponsor-A-Colony** program is part of this, where individuals or businesses can help cover the annual expenses to care for and feed a colony of cats!

What does sponsorship entail?
