### Our History

ind bands are an integral part of American history and culture. From circuses to military ceremonies, concerts in the park to concerts in Carnegie Hall, bands have provided Americans with entertainment and artistic enlightenment for generations. From the great touring professional bands of the 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> centuries to the outstanding high school and collegiate ensembles that have entertained the country since World War II, wind bands have long captured the hearts and imaginations of audiences across the county.

utside of our country's wonderful military bands, there are currently no full-time professional wind bands in America, so when John Carmichael moved to Tampa in 2007 to become the Director of Bands at the University of South Florida, he came with the goal of rectifying that situation. He believed that the Tampa Bay area has the unique ability to support such an ensemble, and he spent the next 11 years until his retirement working tirelessly to bring this dream to fruition.

he **Florida Wind Band** is now Tampa's premier wind band, bringing entertaining and inspiring performances of high-quality music to our vibrant and engaging community. The ensemble is comprised of professional musicians which include K-12 teachers, college professors, and full-time performers who have a deep love for the eclectic repertoire ranging from Bach to contemporary composers. The band is led by USF's Director of Bands, Matthew McCutchen, who is dedicated to programming music that will make audiences laugh, cry, dance, and wonder.

n 2011, Dr. McCutchen and the Florida Wind Band, Inc. founded **Bay Area Youth (BAY) Winds** as Tampa Bay's premier outlet for middle and high school students to receive exceptional performance opportunities for intermediate and advanced musicians. Student participants come from all over the Tampa Bay Area including Hillsborough, Pasco, Pinellas, Polk, and Hernando counties. A few years later with the excitement and opportunities provided through BAY Winds, **Summer Breeze** was founded and meets annually in the month of June to provide an opportunity for BAY Winds students and alumni to rehearse and perform in the summer. Summer Breeze regularly welcomes 60-80 musicians back to their joy of playing an instrument in a relaxed and enjoyable setting. This opportunity offers musicians the unique ability to rekindle old friendships, dust off their instruments, be surprised at how many fingerings they remember, and return to the joy of making music purely for fun, culminating in a joint performance with the Florida Wind Band on an annual Independence Day concert at Carrollwood Village Park.

Since its debut in 2008, the Florida Wind Band has entertained thousands of people, including prestigious performances for the American Bandmaster's Association, the College Band Directors National Association, and the Florida Music Educators Association Convention. We look forward to many more years of inspired music-making and hope you will join us in these endeavors.

### DR. MATTHEW MCCUTCHEN ARTISTIC DIRECTOR & CONDUCTOR

Matthew McCutchen has served on the University of South Florida's music faculty since 2009, first as the Director of Athletic Bands for nine years and then as the Director of Bands since 2018. His responsibilities at USF include conducting the Wind Ensemble, teaching graduate and undergraduate courses in Conducting, Wind Band Literature, and Music Education, and serving as the Assistant Director of the School of Music.

McCutchen earned a Ph.D. in Music Education with an emphasis in Instrumental Conducting from Florida State University, a Master of Music degree in Conducting from Virginia Commonwealth University, and a Bachelor of Music Education degree from Furman University. Before coming to USF, he taught middle school in Georgia, high school in Virginia, and served as an adjunct instructor at Virginia Commonwealth University for several semesters.

McCutchen is active as a guest conductor and clinician. He is the Artistic Director and Conductor of the Florida Wind Band and the Founder and Conductor of the Bay Area Youth (BAY) Winds, which features many of the finest high school musicians throughout the Tampa Area. He has been published in the National Band Association's Journal, the 7th and 8th editions, and the "Solos with Wind Band Accompaniment" editions of the Teaching Music Through Performance in Band series, The Instrumentalist, VMEA Notes, and The Florida Music Director. He is the Chair of the National Band Association's William D. Revelli Memorial Band Composition Contest Committee, is a member of the John Philip Sousa Foundation Legion of Honor Selection Committee, and holds memberships in numerous national



### TONY NEGRON CLARINET—OBLIVION

Tony Negron has enjoyed a richly varied career as a professional clarinetist, chamber musician, concerto soloist, and music educator. As a performer, Tony serves as principal clarinet with the Florida Wind Band and second clarinet with the Punta Gorda Symphony. He has performed with The Florida Orchestra, Orlando Philharmonic, and Disney Candlelight Orchestra. Tony has won several competitions, including first place in the

Robert Shankovich Wind Ensemble Concerto Competition with Scott McAllister's Black Dog. He has been a featured soloist with Alia Musica Pittsburgh, the Duquesne Symphony Orchestra & Wind Ensemble, and the Florida Wind Band. He served as a resident artist with the Master Chorale of Tampa Bay and has been a featured artist on Pittsburgh's Classical Music Radio Station WQED 89.3. Tony has also performed alongside notable musical acts, including Celtic Thunder, the Italian pop opera trio Il Volo, Il Divo, and Sarah Brightman.



### CALVIN FALWELL BASS CLARINET—THE LIGHT FANTASTIC

Calvin Falwell holds the 3rd/Bass Clarinet/Utility chair with the Sarasota Orchestra in Sarasota, FL and is Assistant Professor of Clarinet at the University of South Florida where he teaches in the School of Music and the Judy Genshaft Honors College. During the summer months can be found performing with the Des Moines Metro Opera Festival and the Killington Music Festival. As an orchestral musician Calvin held positions with the

Sarasota Opera Orchestra and the Orlando Philharmonic Orchestra. Calvin has also appeared with the Philadelphia Orchestra, Fort Worth Symphony Orchestra, Alabama Symphony Orchestra, Memphis Symphony Orchestra, Florida Grand Opera, Miami City Ballet, Florida Orchestra, Louisville Orchestra, Green Mountain Opera, Charlottesville Opera Festival, Central City Opera Festival and Colorado Music Festival among others.

Calvin is a Buffet Group USA, D'Addario Woodwind and BG France Performing Artist. Performing on Buffet Clarinets, D'Addario Reeds and BG Ligatures exclusively. Calvin lives in Florida with his wife Kerry Falwell, son Zachary, their two cats Callie & Radish and lovable bull dog named Ricky Lake. When not playing Clarinet Calvin is an avid cyclist and races Gravel and Cyclocross for Team Chase Factor.



### THEME AND VARIATIONS ON "A MIGHTY FORTRESS IS OUR GOD" ARR. ANTHONY O'TOOLE (b. 1988)

Program Note from Wikipedia

In 1709, when the 24-year-old Johann Sebastian Bach composed his **Chorale Prelude on Martin Luther's "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God,"** the congregation would, at the appropriate time, have sung the hymn they all knew so well – in German. Luther composed *Ein feste Burg is unser Gott* between 1527 and 1529, well after his 1517 nailing of the 95 theses. The words are a paraphrase of Psalm 46.

Walter Damrosch transcribed Bach's work for orchestra and choir in 1935. This transcription for band, initiated by the board of Sierra Nevada Winds for this very occasion, is by Anthony O'Toole.

### OLD WINE IN NEW BOTTLES GORDON JACOB (1895—1984)

Program Note by Marc Decker

Gordon Jacob composed *Old Wine in New Bottles* (1959) when he was 64 years old for the St. Bees Festival of Music. The festival was hosted by the St. Bees School, a coeducational grammar school, located in St. Bees Village on the coast of Cumbria near the English and Scottish border. In 1959, Donald Leggat, the music director at St. Bees School, approached his friend Gordon Jacob to compose a piece for the festival. *Old Wine in New Bottles* premiered April 4, 8:00 pm, in Rawnsley Hall, located in the nearby village of Keswick. The premiere was conducted by Donald Leggat and the membership consisted of mostly members of the St. Bees Symphony Orchestra; however, two of Donald Leggat's former pupils -- Timothy Reynish and Guy Woolfenden -- played French horn.

The premiere performance was entirely successful and the following week received a gleaming review in the local paper: "It is not often to-day that a new work is the most popular in any concert programme. But Gordon Jacob's "Old Wine in New Bottles" written specially for the festival amply deserved its success. This is a suite of four folk-song settings for woodwind and brass in which the composer displays all the dexterity of instrumental writing and harmonic ingenuity for which his music is well known. The Raggle Taggle Gypsies, The Three Ravens, and Begone Dull Care formed the basis of three well-contrasted movements. The final Early One Morning blended discreet sentiment, wit, and high spirit with a felicitous craftsmanship in a manner which recalled that of a Haydn finale."

### SEASCAPE, OPUS 53 RUTH GIPPS (1921—1999)

Program Note by Publisher and Christine Higley for the University of Maryland concert program, 9 October 2021

Ruth Gipps was one of the most fascinating women in the music world in England during the 20th century. She was a true pioneer as a composer and performer -- she founded and conducted the Portia Wind Ensemble, a chamber music group comprised entirely of women that provided an important outlet for composers throughout the past fifty years.

In a time where orchestras, wind bands and military bands were male-dominated, British composer Ruth Gipps was a pioneer in the world of music composition and performance. She founded and conducted the Portia Wind Ensemble, a group made up entirely of women. This group was an important part of music in Britain, and they premiered works by Gordon Jacob, Peter Maxwell Davies, Harrison Birtwistle, Alan Hoddinott, Wilfred Josephs and John McCabe. **Seascape**, composed by Gipps in 1958, was written for and premiered by the Portia Wind Ensemble.

Seascape is a programmatic work, thought to be inspired during a trip to the coastal town of Broadstairs in Kent, where Gipps was giving lectures. About her stay, Gipps said: "I spent the night in a hotel right on the beach. I could hear the sea. I always loved the sound of the sea and particularly storms."

This piece is written for double wind quintet, with an English horn used in place of a second oboe. The edition by Rodney Winter used for this concert uses an optional string bass which is covered on the contrabassoon to bring further depth and color to the composition.

#### **OBLIVION**

#### ASTOR PIAZZOLLA (1921—1992)

#### Program Note by Steve Anthenien

Born in Argentina, raised in the musical melting pot of New York City before returning to his native country, Astor Piazzolla revolutionized the tango as a compositional form, incorporating jazz and classical idioms into what he called nuevo tango. He was also a virtuoso bandoneon player, an Argentine/Uruguayan instrument somewhat similar to an accordion. Piazzolla was spotted playing bandoneon by renowned pianist Artur Rubenstein, who encouraged him to study composition with noted Argentine composer Alberto Ginastera. Ginastera, in turn, persuaded Piazzolla to enter a composition contest, and by winning, he was granted a scholarship to study with Nadia Boulanger in Paris. Boulanger quickly convinced Piazzolla to abandon his formal compositions, which she felt lacked originality, and explore his musical roots. He returned to Argentina, formed an octet, and developed his nuevo tango style of composition. Piazzolla lived in Italy periodically during the Argentine dictatorship of the 1970's and 1980's, and in 1984 composed *Oblivion* as music for a film by Mario Bellochio entitled Enrico IV. *Oblivion* is written in the style of a milonga, a song form that predates the tango. It has become one of Piazzolla's most popular works, and has been adapted for performance by a variety of solo instruments.

### THE LIGHT FANTASTIC ANDREW RINDFLEISCH (b. 1963)

#### Program Note by Publisher

**The Light Fantastic** is a large-scale three-movement work for wind ensemble commissioned in 2000 by the Serge Koussevitzky Foundation and the Library of Congress. Its title refers to the poetic expression "to trip the light fantastic", meaning "to go dancing".

The first movement, *Squaring Off*, is then a kind of square dance for winds. After an initial fanfare, three instrumental "couples" take turns "squaring off": clarinet with bass clarinet, two trombones, and flute with piccolo. As the couples take turns, the tonality of the movement modulates. Eventually, all three couples take center stage together. However, they do so each in their original tonalities. With encouragement from the ensemble, they finally find compatibility. There, the ensemble responds with a brief return to the opening fanfare, and concludes with one final celebratory whirl around the dance floor.

Do the Hustle is a movement from which the bass clarinet explodes as a soloist. Here, the ensemble presents and quickly moves through a series of ostinato "grooves" (the principal one being referencing the 1970's mega disco hit of the same name). As the movement unfolds, the bass clarinet dances around and weaves in and out of these grooves. Each groove is often quickly concluded by a climax of sorts, only to be wound back up again and sent in another direction. With a full blown virtuoso cadenza, the bass clarinet suspends this activity briefly, followed by a final flourish and a race to the finish.
