

People of God at Holy Love,

It always feels like a whirlwind, like there's never enough time or space or energy or freedom to get everything done during December. It always feels like there's so much left undone; and some that's done, but not the way I'd want it to be; and some that's done well, but the list of the well done stuff isn't nearly long enough.

And when it's time for church to start (or for the party, or for Santa to show up), I almost always feel a little frantic - like I need an extra few minutes (or an extra hour, or an extra day) to make sure everything is the way it should be.

But then, after the frantic whirlwind of stuff left undone and not quite up to par ... after all that comes the calm. One of my favorite feelings comes when it's all done, when everything settles down. The anticipation, preparation, and planning give way to a certain kind of peace that would have felt foreign and inappropriate before. The feeling that things have been taken care of, that everything is the way it should be, and that I can relax for a while is really life-giving.

As a pastor, I feel that freedom to relax most significantly at about 11:30 on Christmas Eve (after the 10:00 pm service is done), and on Easter Sunday at about 12:30 (when all three services are done). It's about then that I feel myself melt into my office chair, and then into a couch when I get home. It's a beautiful thing to feel like everything is done, and that I'm not in charge any more.

The thing is, though, that it would be great if I felt that way all the time. Because that life-giving feeling I get "that things have been taken care of, that everything is the way it should be, and that I can relax for a while ..." ought to be my normal state of being. Because that's the truth that we proclaim as Christians - namely that Jesus has things taken care of, and I should relax and not worry about being in charge of the universe.

Of course, things in the world aren't the way they should be. But the promise embodied for us at Christmas by the Christ Child is the same as the promise pointed to in Revelation 21 - that God is creating a renewed place for us to enjoy the fullness of new life.

Most of the time when I feel that peace that happens for me after Christmas, I remember that all of the work I've been doing has been important to making sure the Christmas story is told well. But that even if I didn't do that work, the story of God's salvation of the world would still be complete. Because it's God who's in charge of the universe, and not me.

Thank you for your continued commitment to the Gospel work we're called to do together.

We are a friendly informal group. Please consider attending all the gatherings or come whenever you can. We take turns leading the study and providing treats.



Attend Church Regularly - Attending church regularly is a resolution that many people make, and with good reason. No matter your church-going background, it's a worthy goal. Worship services are opportunities for learning and reflection. They can provide periods of stability and rejuvenation in a hectic world—and provide a powerful community network.

Commit to reading the Bible...all of it - Regular reading of the Bible helps us better understand ourselves, our world, and our relationship to God and others. While the concept of reading the entire Bible might seem daunting, it can be done.

Memorize scripture - Memorization is a way to engage with scripture on a deep level. Choose verses that have special meaning to you, or relate to areas where you are striving for self-improvement.

Join a Bible Study- Encountering scripture with others in a mutual quest for meaning can expand your understanding with new viewpoints and illuminating discussion. Quite often a Bible study turns into deeper relationships with one another which is helpful when life happens.

Keep a Prayer Journal -A prayer journal requires you to sharpen your thoughts, desires, and feelings, to look for God's actions in the world around you, and to honestly evaluate your own actions—as you do, you'll be able to see your faith developing and deepening over time

Volunteer Locally - Christians are called to work toward building a better world in the here and now. Choose a local cause that's important to you and get involved! (Your church is a great place to start.)

Go on a Mission Trip -Mission trips, be they far or near, are powerful ways to see the world with new eyes, and to see God in action.

What are the 12 days of Christmas?

Christmas, according to the liturgical calendar, isn't just a day, but a season. Many Christians know the song "The Twelve Days of Christmas" or recall that Shakespeare's *Twelfth Night* is about the last night of Christmas. But what defines the Christmas season?

The 12 days of Christmas are a reversal of the season of <u>Advent</u>. Traditionally, Christians have fasted during Advent as we await the celebration of the birth of our Savior. The period from Christmas Day to the day before Epiphany (the celebration of the magi visiting Jesus, the baptism of Jesus and the beginning of his earthly ministry) is a period of daily feasting. This is surprising, given the reason for celebrating several of the days.

The first day of Christmas, the Feast of the Nativity, is obvious enough as a reason to celebrate. The Messiah has been born into the world! The next day, however, is the feast of St. Stephan, the first Christian martyr, who was killed under the authority of Saul of Tarsus/Paul (Acts 8:1). The emotional whiplash of celebrating the birth of the Savior and then the next day celebrating the life and martyrdom of the first person to die for Christ is stunning. However, tradition calls for a joyful feast to celebrate the faithfulness of Stephen, even unto death.

These 12 days help Christians remember that the life of faith is full of challenges and hardships but also contains plenty of reasons to celebrate as we remember the heroes and heroines of the church, and most importantly, our Lord and Savior.

The next day, the third of the 12, celebrates the life of St. John the Apostle. He was, traditionally, the only disciple who wasn't martyred. Tradition holds that John took care of Mary, the mother of Jesus, made disciples, grew old and finally died a natural death in Ephesus.

The fourth day of Christmas is the most shocking. The Feast of the Holy Innocents commemorates the death of all boys in Bethlehem, aged 2 and under, at the hands of Herod the Great's soldiers (Matthew 2:16-18). Again, we feel the emotional rollercoaster, as we're reminded that the Christian life isn't simply one of sweetness and joy, but also of pain, hardship and injustice. Nevertheless, the fourth day of Christmas is the *Feast* of the Holy Innocents, rather than a fast, because we celebrate the One who has conquered sin and death and doesn't surrender these precious little ones, or any others, to the grave forever.

The following days celebrate Archbishop of Canterbury Thomas Becket's resistance to injustice; the holy family; Pope Sylvester, who resisted the Donatist and Arian controversies (in many Germanic-speaking countries, New Year's Eve is still called "Sylvester"); the circumcision of Jesus; St. Basil the Great and St. Gregory Nazianzen, who defended the doctrine of the Trinity; Jesus' presentation and naming in the Jerusalem temple; the hermitage of St. Simon on the pillar; and even two American saints: Elizabeth Ann Seton and John Neumann.

These 12 days help Christians remember that the life of faith is full of challenges and hardships but also contains plenty of reasons to celebrate as we remember the heroes and heroines of the church, and most importantly, our Lord and Savior.
