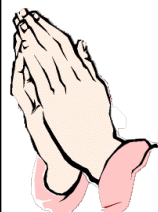

Words to Ponder...

Bearing Fruit for Jesus!

Fruit trees are one of the many wonders of God's creation. To see the beauty of the tree and its fruit, to enjoy its taste, and to realize that it all came from a tiny seed is almost beyond our comprehension. An apple seed is planted in the ground, and, with water and sun as nourishment, miraculously a seedling surfaces that develops into a fruit tree. After a period of time, the apple tree fulfills its mission by bearing apples.

We, as Christians, are like that apple tree. We, too, have been fed and nourished by God so we can bear fruit. *"You did not choose me, but I chose you and appointed you to go and bear fruit—fruit that will last"* (John 15:16). Fruit characterizes the life of the Christian steward. When we stay firmly connected to Jesus, we are told that we *"will bear much fruit."* Christ has given us the task of ministering to the needs of others and spreading the Gospel. As we stay connected to him through his Word and Sacraments, we discover God's perfect will for us, and we are empowered to please him by bearing fruit (Colossians 1:9-10). God has created us to bear fruit (Ephesians 2:10), but only through Christ is it possible for us to do so.

How do we bear fruit? It is good to talk about ourselves in these terms, comforting even. I like the thought of being an apple or a peach tree. But it is like the guy who is asked, "If you could be a tree, what kind of tree would you be?" If you are like me, that question produced what Sheldon Cooper on Big Bang called his "look of haughty derision". We at Holy Love have the chance to be someone who nourishes and provides for people needs, physical, emotional and spiritual. With the help of the Holy Spirit and in concert with the entire congregation, we can commit a



portion of ourselves to making that happen. Stewardship is not so much giving what we possess, as it is a sharing of that which we have first been given. We are to *"Live as children of light (for the fruit of the light consists in all goodness, righteousness and truth) and find out what pleases the Lord"* (Ephesians 5:8b-10).

Go and bear fruit!

Pastor's Page

People of God at Holy Love,

It's good to be back with you. As most of you know, I was gone on disability leave for almost six months after a skiing accident, and my doctors decided I'm healthy and recovered enough now to be back, but for now on a part time basis. I want to take some space in this newsletter to share with you what it means that I'm serving as your pastor again.

First, what the council and I decided on is that it makes sense for me to focus on being Holy Love's pastor for three days per week. I'll be at worship on Sundays. I'll be in the office and available to get together with whoever wants to meet one other day of the week (which will vary from week to week). And I'll dedicate one other day to working from home - I'll spend that time doing things like studying, writing, preparing lessons, and planning worship.

My expectation, based on my continuing recovery and on what the doctors have told me, is that I'll gradually increase the time I'm able to dedicate to serving as pastor over the next couple of months so that I'll be back to full time by December, just in time for Advent.

I need to tell you that I'm really glad to be back with you on a regular basis ... and I'm really glad to be healthy enough to be able to be back. I'm tremendously grateful that I was able to dedicate those first, and most crucial, six months exclusively to recovery. And I'm grateful that you're giving me space and permission to focus on continued recovery even while I'm returning to this vocation.

I also want to tell you that even though I'm back part time for now, I've missed being with y'all, and I'll be looking for opportunities to reconnect with this community. Feel free to show up on Sundays, at Social Networking or Theology Pub; or to contact me through email, text, or phone call, and we can set a time to get together.

More than anything, I want to tell you how thankful I am for the support you've graced me and my family with over these past six plus months. Your support and prayers were invaluable, and took a load off of our minds early on when we didn't know how much recovery I would make.

Thank you for welcoming me back. And thank you for continuing to allow me to serve as your pastor.

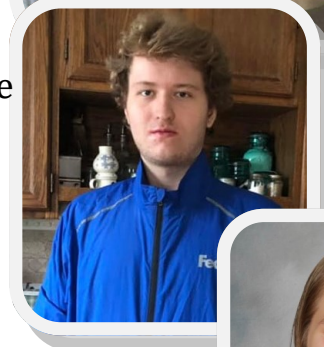

A Favorite recipe:

Aunt Viola's Apple Crisp

8 Cups Apples
2 Cups Brown Sugar
1 Cup Sugar
2 Cups & 2 TBLSP Flour
2 Cups Oatmeal
1 1/2 tsp Nutmeg
2 Cups Soft Butter
1 1/2 tsp Cinnamon

Peel & slice apples. Place in mixing bowl with Sugar, cinnamon, nutmeg and 2 TBLSP Flour. Mix to coat apples and set aside. In separate bowl, mix brown sugar, oatmeal and remaining flour. Cut in softened butter. Spread enough of the oatmeal mixture on the bottom of 9x13 pan and pat firmly to make bottom crust. Add apple filling and spread evenly. Top with remaining oatmeal mixture. Bake in pre-heated oven at 375 for 30 -35 min.

From the ELCA

With gratitude for those who have gone before and hope for the future, the ELCA gives thanks to God for the ministry of women. In 2019 and 2020 we celebrate 50 years of Lutheran women being ordained in the United States, 40 years of women of color being ordained, and 10 years of LGBTQIA+ individuals being able to serve freely.

As part of this anniversary year, we lament that women have been barred from serving and have been bullied, dismissed and excluded. We also celebrate the gifts and service that women have brought to our church and our world as pastors.



Nov. 22, 1970	Elizabeth Platz is the first woman ordained in a Lutheran church body in North America.
Dec. 20, 1970	Barbara L Andrews is first woman with a disability ordained in the US
March 4, 1979	Lydia Rivera Kalb is the first Latina woman ordained in a Lutheran church body in the US
Aug 26, 1979	Earlean Miller is the first woman of African descent ordained in a Lutheran church body in the US.
July 1, 1982	Asha George-Guiser is the first woman of Asian descent ordained in a Lutheran church body in the US
July 19, 1987	Marlene Whiterabbit Helgemo is the first American Indian woman ordained in a Lutheran church body in the US
Jan. 20, 1990	Ruth Frost and Phyllis Zillhart are the first openly LGBTQIA individuals ordained in a Lutheran church body in the US. The congregation that called them was expelled from the ELCA. Frost and Zillhart were formerly received back into the ELCA in 2010.
June 12 1992	April Ulring Larson first woman of European descent elected as a synod bishop in the ELCA. She was only the second female Lutheran bishop in the world.
Sept. 12, 1999	Louisa Grace is the first octogenarian woman ordained in the ELCA
June 7, 2001	Margarita Martinez is the first woman of color and first Latina woman elected as a synod bishop in the ELCA.
Dec. 12, 2009	Dolores McKay is the first woman of Middle Eastern descent ordained in the ELCA
Oct 1, 2011	Jessica Crist is the fist woman elected as chair of the ELCA Conference of Bishops.
Aug 14, 2013	Elizabeth Eaton is the first woman elected as presiding bishop of the ELCA.
May 5-6, 2018	Patricia A Davenport and Viviane Thomas-Breitfeld are the first women of African descent to be elected as synod bishops in the ELCA.

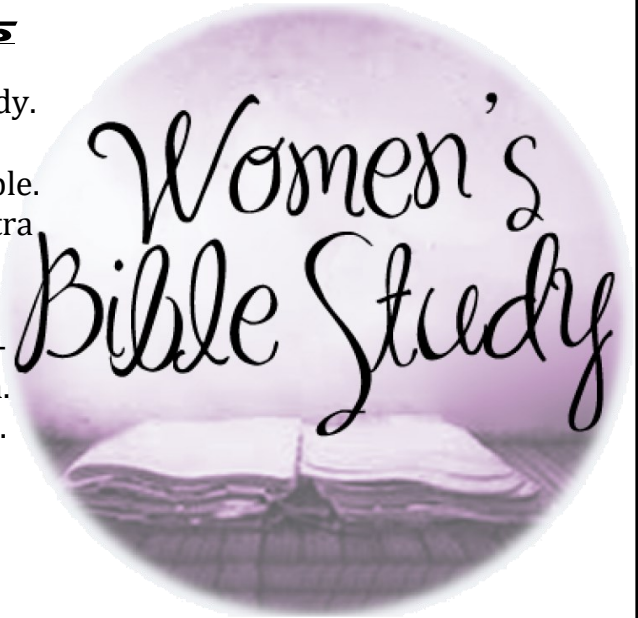

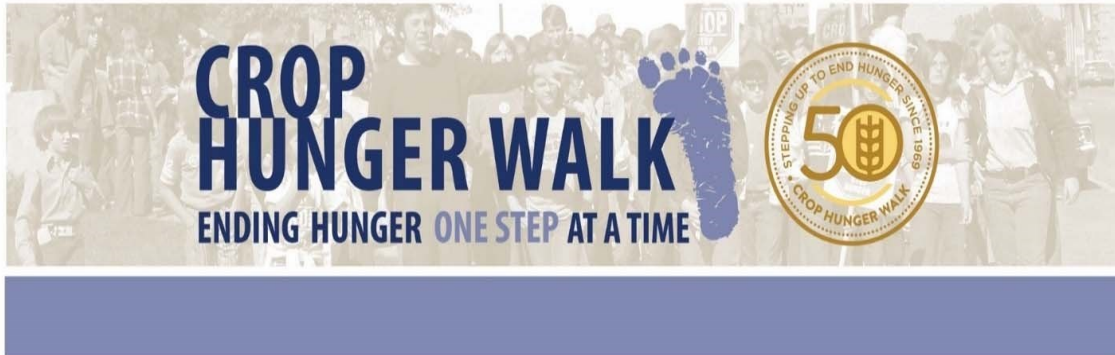
Lutheran Family Services Rocky Mountains

Luther and Lutheranism

Martin Luther (1483-1546)



Martin Luther was eight years old when Christopher Columbus set sail from Europe and landed in the Western Hemisphere. Luther was a young monk and priest when Michaelangelo was painting the Sistine Chapel in Rome. A few years later, he was a junior faculty member at a new university in small-town Germany, intently studying the Scriptures, “captivated with an extraordinary ardor for understanding Paul in the Epistle to the Romans.”

In these days Luther was tormented by the demand for righteousness before God. “I did not love, yes, I hated the righteous God who punishes sinners, and secretly, if not blasphemously, certainly murmuring greatly, I was angry with God.” Then, in the midst of that struggle with God, the message of the Scriptures

became clear, like a long-shut door opening wide. When he realized that a “merciful God justifies us by faith ... I felt that I was altogether born again and had entered paradise itself through open gates.”

What Luther discovered is the freedom of Christians trusting God’s mercy in Christ. As he later wrote, “Faith is God’s work in us. It changes us and makes us to be born anew of God. This faith is a living, busy, active, mighty thing. It is impossible for it not to be doing good works incessantly. Faith is a living, daring confidence in God’s grace, so sure and certain that believers would stake their lives on it a thousand times.”

This discovery set Luther’s life on a new course —both his own life and his public service as a preacher and teacher. When a church-endorsed sales team came to the Wittenberg area in October, 1517, Luther was concerned that the promotion and sale of indulgences undermined the promise of God’s unreserved mercy in Jesus and the faith that trusts that promise. His *95 Theses* or *Disputation on the Power and Efficacy of Indulgences* became the first of a life-long stream of books, sermons, letters, essays, even hymns in which he expressed his confidence in this life-giving promise from God, the Gospel, and its liberating implications for all of life in church and society.

Reformation Sunday will be observed October 27th this year. It commemorates the day Martin Luther posted his 95 Thesis which was October 31st, 1517. The following is an excerpt from an article written by M. Weiner. In the article Weiner addresses why Reformation Sunday is still relevant to us as Christians today. 1. Reformation Sunday gives us a chance to tell our story – a chance to remember. We all have a family story – how we got to this point in history...Reformation Sunday is a day when we remember and re-tell the family stories of our faith. Stories about men and women who came before us and taught us about the faith. Stories about people who risked everything so that we would be able to gather and worship in the manner that we do.

2. Reformation Sunday reminds us of the most important things. Throughout the year we preach about many things in church. About how we live our daily lives, the choices we make, the habits of our faith. On Reformation Sunday we are brought back to the most important thing – the thing that compelled Luther and others to risk their lives. On Reformation Sunday, we return to the core of our faith: **God loved us first, and God continues to shower us with grace and mercy.**

3. Reformation Sunday challenges us to do better. Through re-telling our story and returning to the core of our faith, Reformation Sunday prods us to do better. We are called to be more loving and grace-filled, because God was gracious and merciful to us. We are called to repent of the times that we have placed barriers that have kept others from hearing the Good News. We are called to remember that all that we are is a gift from God.
