Words to Ponder...

Bearing Fruit for Jesus! "I am the Vine; you are the branches. If a man remains in me and I in him, he will bear much fruit"

~John 15:5

Being Fruitful

Fruit characterizes the life of Christians. The Apostle Paul tells us what that fruit is: *"The fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control"* (Galatians 5:22-23). This fruit will be evident in the lives of Christians as a natural outcome of Christ's living in us.

Jesus said, *"If a man remains in me and I in him, he will bear much fruit; apart from me you can do nothing"* (John 15:5b). It is interesting to note that Jesus did not say, "You should bear fruit." He stated that when we abide in him, it follows naturally that we will bear fruit. We are the branches, and we must stay firmly connected to the Vine in order to be mature and fruitful. Jesus calls each of us to abide in him.

Only as Christ lives in us are we enabled to bear the fruit of his character. Abiding in Christ, we minister to the needs of others as Jesus, the Vine, did during his life on earth. We feed the hungry, give water to the thirsty, entertain the stranger, clothe the naked, and visit the sick and the prisoner (Matthew 25:37-39), all in the name of Christ.



How Can We Bear Fruit?

Fruit is not an attitude we psych ourselves up to attain. We are incapable of training our minds to think only good and pure thoughts so that our resulting actions can be then applauded as well. We know that, try as we might, on our own we are unable to bear fruit. Yet we are told to *"bear fruit ... fruit that will last"* (John 15:16). Jesus stated, *"I am the Vine; you are the branches"* (John 15:5a). He is the Vine who bears the weight of the branches, who provides the needed support, who gives life-giving nourishment and energy to us his branches. Connected to Christ, the Vine, we branches do what comes naturally to any healthy fruit tree: we bear fruit.

Chosen to Bear Fruit

"You did not choose me, but I chose you and appointed you to go and bear fruit ... fruit that will last" (John 15:16). God has chosen each of us to be fruitful. The Holy Spirit shapes and molds us, his chosen people, through a lifelong process of sanctification so we can become fruitful. He calls, gathers, enlightens, and keeps us in the one true faith. The Holy Spirit gathers Christians together as one body and gives gifts to each believer so that all the members might be strengthened. He guides and directs our paths and is with us each step of the way. God has chosen to create, redeem, and sanctify us "... in order that we might bear fruit to God" (Romans 7:4b).

This fall as a part of our Stewardship drive, we, the people of Holy Love, will be called to the harvest, so that our gathered fruit of time, talent and treasure may be a blessing to all, within our walls and outside them in the wider world.

It's been a long time since I've written an article for this space, and an even longer time since I've been with you good people of God on a regular basis. I wish I had not needed to take this time off from actively serving as your pastor, and have been eagerly anticipating the day when I would be able to return to that role.

Anyway, I'll share the things that I know that you might be interested in right now.

The doctors have told me that they're ready to say that I can go back to work. Which is nice, because as soon as I was cleared to drive again in late August, I started feeling like I'd been off recuperating for long enough.


In talking with one of my doctors, he's agreeing that it would be fine for me to be back to leading worship at Holy Love starting on September 15. However, because I'm still facing the need for continued healing, his recommendation is that my return initially be on a part time basis – the doctor's order is that I'm cleared to work for three days per week.

I've shared this with the church council, who (I believe) agrees that a return on a part time basis would be fine, recognizing that the plan would be for me to ramp up to full time by just before Thanksgiving, in anticipation of Advent and Christmas.

That's a lot of details to say simply that I'm excited and looking forward to being back with you on a regular basis, and to us doing ministry together.

Thank you for letting me continue to serve as your pastor - and more significantly, for gracing me with permission to take time off from being your pastor in order that I could heal as completely as possible.

From the ELCA



The Rev. Elizabeth A. Eaton was re-elected to a six year term as Presiding Bishop at the recent ELCA Churchwide Assembly in Milwaukee, WI. Elected as the ELCA's fourth presiding bishop at the 2013 ELCA Churchwide Assembly, the Rev. Elizabeth Eaton earned a Master of Divinity degree from Harvard Divinity School and a Bachelor of Music Education from the College of Wooster.

Ordained in 1981, Eaton served three congregations in Ohio before being elected bishop of the ELCA Northeastern Ohio Synod in 2006 and re-elected in May 2013.

Eaton's four emphases for the ELCA are: We are church. We are Lutheran. We are church together. We are church for the sake of the world. These four emphases are fundamental to identifying who the ELCA is. As presiding bishop, Eaton trav-

els extensively, representing the ELCA in a variety of capacities. This has included a visit to a Syrian refugee camp, commemorating the 500th anniversary of the Reformation with Lutherans from around the world in Namibia and participating in an ecumenical service commemorating the Reformation in the Lund, Sweden, cathedral with Pope Francis.

Eaton's husband is the Rev. T. Conrad Selnick, an Episcopal priest. They are parents of two adult children, Rebeckah and Susannah.

2019 ELCA Churchwide Assembly declares the ELCA a sanctuary church

CHICAGO — The 2019 ELCA Churchwide Assembly voted Aug. 7 to approve a memorial that affirms the denomination's long-standing commitment to migrants and refugees and declares the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) a sanctuary church body. The ELCA is the first North American denomination to declare itself a sanctuary church body.

As a sanctuary church, the ELCA publicly declares that walking alongside immigrants and refugees is a matter of faith. This declaration does not call for any person, congregation or synod to engage in illegal activity.

The ELCA has developed talking points to address what it means for this church to become a sanctuary denomination. In defining what this means for its congregations, the ELCA states that a sanctuary church will look different in the different contexts across the ELCA. The church cannot mandate or direct ELCA congregations and ministries to respond in certain ways.

The 2016 ELCA Churchwide Assembly passed the strategy to Accompany Migrant Minors with Protection, Advocacy, Representation and Opportunities (AMMPARO). Through the strategy, the ELCA invites its churches to become "welcoming congregations," which means to commit to spiritually and physically accompanying migrants in their communities, pray for migrant children and families, and advocate for a just and humane immigration system. More than 100 congregations and five synods across the ELCA identify as sanctuary.

Matthew 24:40: Truly I say to you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me.

Are you familiar with how our Holy Love Food Pantry works? Each month a team of dedicated volunteers totally empties the pantry, located in the narthex, and delivers

everything to either Aurora Interfaith (AICS) or Peace with Christ Lutheran Church (PWC). The process is really just as simple and straight-forward as it sounds – Member donations accumulate, volunteers deliver 100% of all items, and those in need of food are provided meals. We have been following this process for the past 18-months and during that time thousands of pounds of food have been donated, delivered, and distributed.

AICS and PWC each has its own distribution process and each is very well equipped to serve the needy with a wide range of food including meat, vegetables, fruit, dairy, etc. PWC, in particular, is only 3-miles east of Holy Love and focusses intentionally on needy in zip codes closest to Holy Love.

When grocery shopping you are asked to spend a few additional dollars on food to donate. Please donate <u>non-perishable</u> protein rich food such as canned tuna, salmon, chicken and beef, peanut or almond butter and nuts. Other excellent items include canned fruits and vegetables, beans, cereal, oatmeal, pasta and sauces. Donations of used <u>clothing cannot be accepted</u>. All you need to do is shop and place items on the shelves; volunteers take care of things from there.

We currently have enough delivery volunteers so that each has been called on every 6-10 months, or so, to make deliveries. However, the more the merrier. If you would care to volunteer please call or email Bob Apmann at 303-693-1802 or rgammg@yahoo.com. Additionally, both PWC and AICS offer numerous other hands-on volunteer opportunities. St. Jude's Run Update

Our family recently returned from our annual trip to Illinois in late July/ early August. While these trips to Illinois are a good way for us to stay connected with family and friends that we don't get to see on a regular basis, and provides our family time on the road to either connect or chill in our own little worlds for a while, it is definitely NOT an ideal time of year to be in Illinois. It is typically hot and humid during this time, and sometimes the people we want to see have decided to travel away for vacations elsewhere- even coming to Colorado and basically switching places with us.

"Why would you continue to travel by mini-van to West-Central Illinois at such a time as this?" you might ask. My short answer to you is, "It's for the kids." We come to Quincy Illinois for kids that are not our own children. We do it to be a part of a remarkable weekend of companionship with a common goal. We are a part of a nomadic-type convoy of fundraisers. We drive RVs, and run alongside the two-lane highway overnight for 135 miles to Peoria, Illinois in order to deliver as large a check as possible to St. Jude Children's Hospital. This is the St. Jude Quincy to Peoria Run.

Many of you have asked me about it, so this is not news to you, but for those that haven't, I am a "St. Jude Runner" and this year Alan is a "St. Jude Driver". Back when the hospital in Peoria, IL was finished 38 years ago, a group of like-minded (slightly crazy) people came up with the "Memphis to Peoria St. Jude Run" and from there, satellite runs all around the state of Illinois popped up. Six years ago I ran my first St. Jude run and became 'hooked'. We then moved to Colorado the following year, and because of the timing, I could not participate. I've been returning from Colorado each year to be a part of it since.

St. Jude Children's hospital is largely funded by an organization, ALSAC-American Lebanese Syrian Associated Charities with Danny Thomas (actress Marlo Thomas's father) as the leader, for creating St. Jude Children's Hospitals. What makes St. Jude a remarkable place is that through their unique funding model, NO FAMILY RECEIVES A BILL OF ANY KIND for their child's treatment to fight cancer, leukemia, sickle cell anemia, and many other devastating diseases. The St. Jude Runs do not support the research done by their hospitals, but rather that money goes directly to children and family care, and the cost of the run is covered by generous corporate sponsors.

Yes, the run is an enjoyable experience for us, but it is also one of great spiritual depth. We care for one another on the run, we pray for the children in treatment, and we mourn the children we've lost. We hold carefully in our hearts the families struggling with cancer that have not had their child referred as a St. Jude patient. We pray for a cure that will put St. Jude out of business. Since it opened in 1967 in Memphis, Tennessee, due to treatments developed by St. Jude, the overall childhood cancer survival rate has gone from 20% to 80%. In addition, St. Jude has achieved a 94% survival rate for ALL, up from 4% in 1962, and the survival rate for medulloblastoma, a type of brain tumor, increased from 10 percent to 85% today.

Without generous donations from caring communities of loving people like you, these statistics would not be. So again, from the bottom of our hearts, thank you for supporting our fundraising efforts. Alan and I raised just over \$3,200, Quincy runners raised \$120,000, ALL runners from 32 communities raised over \$5 million, and with the telethon, our one weekend event raised over \$11 million for St. Jude children and families.

Thank you for indulging in this letter with your attention, and putting up with my constant begging on the behalf of St. Jude kids. It is a passion for me, so I close with these questions: What is your passion? How do you live out your Christian mission of love as a part of fulfilling this passion? Do you have more passions than you have time and energy to serve? How do you manage your time and talents to best serve that love mission? I'd love to talk with you if you are struggling with paring down your efforts. The world has SO MUCH NEED that we can get bogged down with "compassion fatigue". Sometimes the cure for that is to focus in on one thing we can throw our energy and time toward, and see beautiful results.

"For he who sows to his flesh will of the flesh reap corruption, but he who sows to the Spirit will of the Spirit reap everlasting life. And let us not grow weary while doing good, for in due season we shall reap if we do not lose heart. Therefore, as we have opportunity, let us do good to all, especially to those who are of the household of faith." – Galatians 6:8-10.
