Matesti Village Awareness Campaign



From Isaac and Caroline, Zimbabwe: On Thursday, the 16th of April, we were blessed to conduct a powerful community awareness campaign in Matetsi Village, Hwange Rural. The heart of this gathering was to shine a light on critical social challenges deeply affecting our young people—specifically early child marriages, teenage pregnancies, and the devastating rise of drug and substance abuse.

We pointed the youth toward hope and transformation in Christ, encouraging them to embrace prayer as a daily discipline and to pursue godly morals and integrity. These choices draw them closer to the Lord and equip them to build purposeful, dignified futures. Our teaching was anchored in 1 Timothy 4:12: “Don’t let anyone look down on you because you are young, but set an example for the believers in speech, in conduct, in love, in faith and in purity.”

A particularly moving highlight was the sharing of real-life testimonies from individuals who have overcome these struggles. Their stories offered both practical wisdom and living hope, serving as a tangible reminder that through God’s grace, change and restoration are truly possible.

A Young Womans Testimony



In early April Lowani was teaching on Passover and a young woman in the audience, hearing the Word of God taught, asked for prayer and deliverance. She testified that her father had enticed her into practicing witchcraft with charms and pledges to get what she wanted at school. Her grades began to drop, and she started falling asleep in classes. At that fellowship she was delivered from that dark power, to the glory of God.



Farm Brothers

Uganda is blessed with agricultural opportunities but many of those who would like to farm are poor and can not get started despite having the land to do so. The well-funded Muslim community offers loans to these people to help but charges exorbitant interest rates to those who are Christians. Loans are secured by the land so when the Christian owners default on their loan the land is seized back by the lenders.



John Kiuka is sponsoring a solution with a well-organized group of pastors to provide an alternative. The church-based group, "Farm Brothers," is based on the concept of using the little you have to build more through God's help instead of borrowing money. They provide a starting point for those who want to farm by providing agricultural products (seeds, pesticides, fertilizer) and services (expertise) for an acre. At harvest time participating farmers agree to repay Farm Brothers for the cost of the inputs plus 10% to fund organization expenses and expansion of the concept. The remaining profit provides the farmer with enough to self fund the next harvest plus have money for living expenses. Best practice help and monitoring progress is included along with coaching for bringing harvest to market.

LiveCharis funded startup costs for purchasing the initial agricultural products. The impacts for the individuals and community are substantial and provides linkage to Christian education. The pilot program supporting 25 farmers has started. The pictures show the setup of the Ag products inventory location from which the farmers are supplied. We look forward to see the farming progress!
