Our Successful Partnership with The Nature Conservancy of SC

Before our partnership with The Nature Conservancy of SC (TNC) was created, we were not able to obtain a list of Beaufort County farms. Most of our Black, Indigenous, & People of Color (BIPOC) farmers were struggling and failing, but we had no way of knowing or helping. With the financial support and guidance of TNC, we now know the farms in our area, and we have been able to perform site visits in order to assess their needs and challenges. Meeting that goal, we have also been able to educate and assist the farmers with the programs available to them, and aid them in applying.



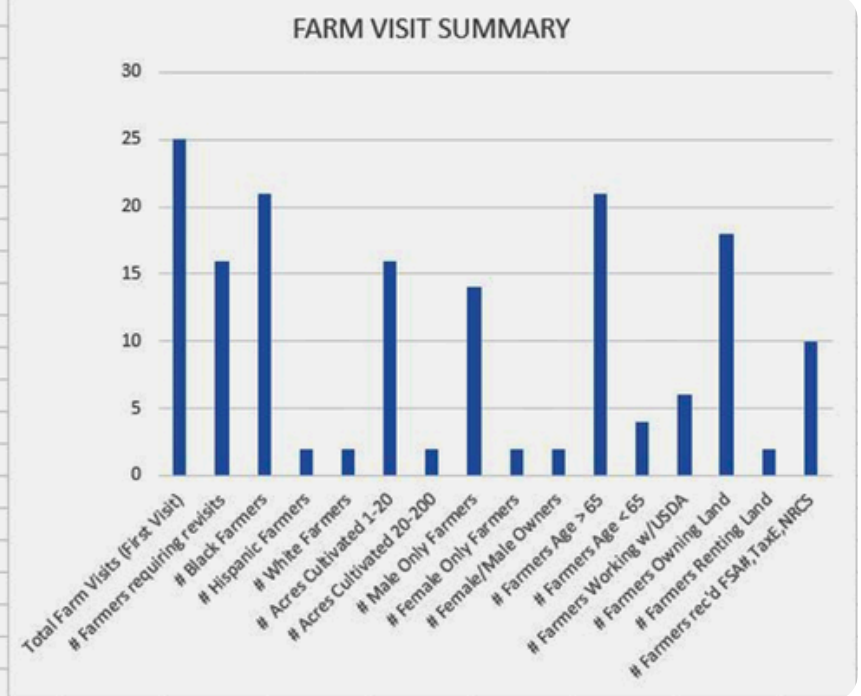

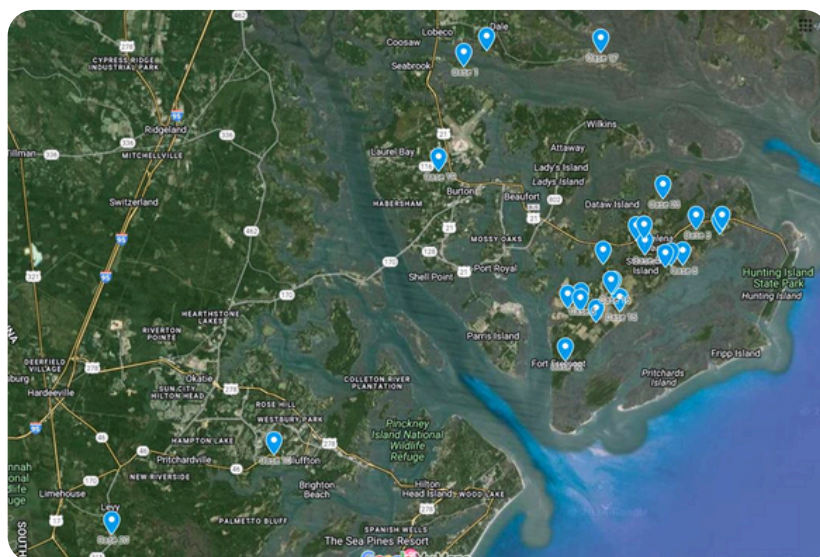
Our success is mainly due to the efforts of our Field Agent, Walter Mack. He is also a BIPOC farmer in the County, and is well known throughout the farming community. This was key to gaining the trust of BIPOC farmers to participate in federally funded programs. Although the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) provides a conservationist to SC counties, they are spread very thin. The NRCS District Conservationists cover multiple counties making it difficult to visit farms in person, and build relationships with farmers. Through the efforts of Mr. Mack, those farmers are now able to get the support they need in order to continue, grow, and succeed with their farming efforts.

The data from FY24 shows that 25 farms were visited by our Field Agent; 16 of those farms were revisited to assist with Farm Service Agency and NRCS application paperwork. He made 82 farm visits in total; the map below indicates the locations of the visited farm sites. The Field Agent also participated in 43 meetings throughout FY24.

Conservation and Education Outreach

In FY24, Beaufort SWCD presented outreach programs to over 5,750 children and adults in 72 classrooms, at 16 festivals, and at Eco Camp

Classroom Program Presentations



These first graders are learning about the importance of soil and what lives in it. While crawling through the “soil tunnel” they discover man-made wells and septic tanks, root vegetables, animal burrows, insects, and worms. Each student also receives a Soil Tunnel Activity Book. The Soil Tunnel program was developed by our education staff and meets current SC Science Standards. It is one of our most requested programs!

Pre-K-1st graders learn about the travels of a loggerhead sea turtle and the many challenges throughout its life through *One Tiny Turtle*- an interactive book (left). Middle Schoolers learn about point and non-point source water pollution and how to adopt habits to protect water quality through the Enviroscope watershed model (right).



Eco Camp 2024 – “Lowcountry Explorers”

Campers learned about our unique rivers, salt marshes, ocean shores, cultures, and wildlife. Each day included a special Lowcountry expert who shared their knowledge and experiences about dolphins, birds, salt water marsh ecosystems, reptiles, pollinators, sharks, turtles, and farm goats. The campers dove into fun hands-on activities like experiencing the Combine Ag Simulator (provided by Beaufort County Farm Bureau), a nature scavenger hunt, birding, fishing games, indigo tie-dyeing, and crafted fish, bugs and jellyfish. They finished the week by making camp scrapbooks, and enjoying lunch provided by the Farm Bureau of Beaufort County Women’s Committee.

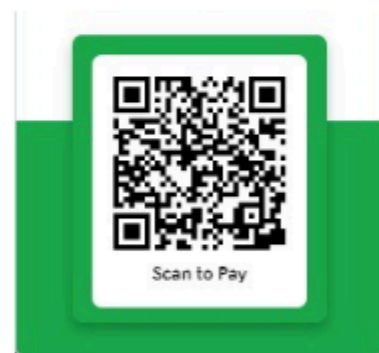
