We are a sub-unit of state government that works in partnership with USDA-Natural Resources Conservation Service and SC Department of Natural Resources to serve the conservation needs of Beaufort County.

The district is directed by a local board of volunteer commissioners who determine the local conservation needs of the county. Two of the commissioners are appointed and three are elected.

USDA-Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) Accomplishments

Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP) helps farmers and landowners build on existing conservation efforts while strengthening their operations.

Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) is NRCS' flagship conservation program that helps farmers, ranchers and forest landowners integrate new conservation efforts into working lands.

Beaufort County in FY 2025:

\$39,980 secured for new EQIP & CSP program contracts across 58.7 acres

**3 new program applications selected for funding:
2 EQIP and 1 CSP**

\$55,744 paid out for active CSP & EQIP contracts

This year USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service experienced major changes, including staffing, priorities, partners, and policies. NRCS programs received reduced funding, which resulted in less funding for landowners.

Despite these challenges, Ridgeland NRCS worked hard to provide technical and financial assistance to our local farmers, ranchers, and landowners.

Local NRCS staff made 65+ site visits throughout the year.

Boots on the Ground Outreach Field Work

Through a grant opportunity, we have been able to continue our outreach to Beaufort County landowners and farmers. This grant funds the field agent position, which educates and assists Beaufort County landowners and farmers with the programs available to them and helps them in the application process.



Seasonal High Tunnels, also known as hoop houses, collapsed under the weight of layers of ice and snow dumped on the lowcountry in January 2025. Our Field Agent worked tirelessly to find financial assistance for these landowners

Our Field Agent, Walter Mack, is well known throughout the farming community, giving him the ability to gain the trust of farmers to participate in federally funded programs. Although the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) provides a conservationist to SC counties, they are spread very thin. The NRCS District Conservationists cover multiple counties making it difficult to visit farms in person and build relationships with farmers. Through the efforts of Mr. Mack, those farmers are getting the support they need in order to grow and succeed with their farming efforts while conserving natural resources.






He made 87 farm visits in total; the map below indicates the locations of the visited farm sites.

Education Conservation Outreach

In FY25, Beaufort SWCD presented environmental programs to over 3,800 children and adults in 94 classrooms, at 16 festivals, and at Eco Camp


