Often we hear the phrase: "Christmas through the eyes of a child." This is a sweet-sounding, sentimental saying that brings a smile to our faces and a pleasant picture to our mind. As the Thanksgiving/Christmas celebrations approach, Paula and I, (As Grandparents) are once again reminded that the children add an extra spark of excitement to our regular family observance of these Holidays.

But let's dig a little deeper into that phrase: "Christmas through the eyes of a child". Christmas is all about a Child. This is not just any child, but this Child is Immanuel, God with us; the great I Am; the Savior of the world; true God and true Man in one person; Jesus Christ!

Christmas—through the eyes of the Christ Child is the hope for the fallen world and the life for the spiritually dead, and the peace that passes all understanding because Jesus is the Prince of Peace.

The Real Reason

Have you ever experienced the Christmastime tug-of-war? As a parent, you want to shower your children with good gifts and revel in their expressions of joy. Yet you want to also say "enough is enough" with material possessions and remind kids why we celebrate the holiday in the first place. Although our society tries to remove Jesus from the Christmas holiday, he's the sole reason for its existence. Despite what retailers want you to believe, Christmas would still happen without overloaded shopping carts.

Most Christmas customs in the United States share two characteristics. First, it's usually hard to pin down their origins to a single source. And second, their roots almost always reach back to religious custom. As we move into the celebration of Advent, whether it's with wreaths in churches or calendars at home, it's easy to forget why we celebrate the season at all. After all it pales in comparison to the celebration of Christmas.

So how do we do it? How do we bring Jesus back into the center of the season? The answer is simple. Keep him at the center during every season – not just at Christmas. Every season has a Real Reason of Christ.

The season of Advent is characterized by waiting-waiting upon the Lord for presence to be revealed to us on Christmas. In this worship series for Advent, we look back in Scripture at those who waited upon the Lord for his promises to come to pass through the Christ Child. We also look forward, contemplating how we should wait upon the Lorde in this present moment of our lives, as God continues to make himself known to us.

Dec. 1, Wait upon the Lord with Faith (Galatians 3:8): Abraham and Sarah waited with faith for the birth of their son, Isaac, and we wait with faith for the birth of God's Son, Jesus, trusting that he will come at Christmas to save all people.

Dec. 8, Wait Upon the Lord with Hope (Psalm 130:5): The prophet Isaiah declared the coming of the Lord, which gave the people of Israel hope for the future. We wait with hope for the future because we know what the future holds—a Savior.

Dec. 15, Wait Upon the Lord with Rejoicing (Isaiah 25:9): Elizabeth rejoiced as she waited for the coming of her son, John the Baptist. And Mary rejoiced as she waited for the birth of her son, Jesus. In the same manner we rejoice as we wait for the coming of the Son of God.

Greetings in the Name of Jesus, Whose birth we celebrate this month,

Fear Not! was the message the angel had for Mary when told she would be the mother of Jesus, and **fear not!** was the message the angels had for the shepherds when they announced the birth of Jesus. Numerous times in the Bible God's people are told to **fear not!** Just as those words gave comfort to God's people many years ago, they are our hope for today in any circumstance.

Fear not! The God whose love caused Him to become a tiny embryonic speck inside Mary's womb, the God who was knit together in the womb and shaped and formed as a human being, the God who was laid in a manger, the God who was tempted as we are, the God who paid the awful, bloody price for our redemption, the God who rose victoriously from the dead---this God will not forsake those for whom He demonstrated this kind of love.

Fear not! Fear of an unknown future drives many young women to the abortion mills where daily 3,000 babies are sacrificed because of fear. Fear of suffering drives many people to feel it is compassionate to hasten death. Fear of not being forgiven drives many who have sinned against life to despair.

- To the pregnant young woman, we say, "Fear not!" Jesus was born for you. He loves you and will give you strength. He will help you do what is best for you and your baby, and He will support you through the loving arms of His people.
- To those who are suffering, we say, "Fear not!" Jesus was born for you. He knows about suffering. He knows how the love of God works in suffering. He will be with you and care for you through His caring people.
- To those who have sinned against life, we say "Fear not!" Jesus was born for you. He demonstrated His love for you and paid for your sins on the cross. He comes to you even in the depths of your grief and guilt to lift you up into His merciful and forgiving arms.

Fear not! The message of Christmas changes hearts and lives all year long. After all, we serve a God who works best in weakness---even in poverty---you know, like showing up in a manger!

"For behold, I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. For unto you is born this day...a Savior who is Christ the Lord." (Luke 2:10b-ll) (Adopted from LFL 2012 Christmas bulletin insert)

Sharing Christ's Love at Christmas

For so many in the world, Christmas is that time of the year when lights are up, stores are full, and the angel's declaration of "peace on earth" is celebrated by stressing over the perfect gift, or planning for a relative's upcoming visit. And for some, it can unfortunately be a time of loneliness too.

In the midst of this, we should keep in mind that Christmas can also be a time when someone who may be spiritually lost will actually consider matters of faith, and be open to learning more about Jesus.

So while Christendom may be "on-the-ropes" for some, it has left in its wake some cultural traditions that can keep the door open for us. For example, many non-Christians will still attend some sort of church service during the holiday season as part of a "tradition," like putting up a Christmas tree or hanging lights on the front of their house. It's certainly not ideal, but it does come with one redeemable feature: the opportunity for people to encounter the incredible power of the gospel.

That friend, acquaintance or family member who doesn't truly know Jesus is far more likely to attend a Christmas Eve/Day service with you than any other time of the year. So invite them—and let them know where to find St. John's on Facebook too. People will say 'no' to 100% of the invitations that you don't extend.

True, this isn't always easy. Christ's command to move beyond "comfortable conversations" and be His witness can leave us feeling a little scared, like Peter stepping out of the boat into the stormy waters of the impossible (Matthew 14:26–33). The fear is real. It's just misplaced.

Just like Peter, we all experience those moments. But that is only because we have taken our eyes off the One who rules the weather.

In the verses surrounding the Great Commission (Matthew 28:19), Jesus reminds us that he is the King and possesses all authority. He may have humbled himself to a manger, but now He reigns once again from His throne. And in verse 20, He makes a wonderful promise: "And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age."

The important four words you can remember this Christmas season as you step out and give the gift of the gospel are the same four words Christ gives to all who know and love Him: "I am with you."

At Christmas, we can't help but think of the thousands of people who are lonely, troubled, and looking for hope. Christmas is a reminder from God that we are not alone. The Prophet Isaiah said that His name would be called Immanuel, which means God with us (Isaiah 7:14, Matthew 1:23). God revealed in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus a love that rescues us from separation, sin and loneliness.

At this Christmas season we can be assured that Jesus Christ is here to give us hope, to forgive our sins, and to heal our spiritual wounds, if only we will let Him. If only we will tell others about Him.

The Christmas message has not changed in 2,000 years. Christmas still reminds us that God is with us.



What you need:


- Small twigs (various shapes and sizes)
- Hot glue
- Yarn
- Scissors
- Adult help

CHRISTMAS EVE


Christmas Eve service will be held at 5:30 p.m. on Christmas Eve. Practice for this will be announced at Sunday Services.
