## <u>Dear Friends and Members of St. John's Congregations, Brothers</u> and Sisters in Christ Fellow Redeemed,

Can you ever get too much of a good thing? This is a penetrating question that leaves us thinking. The answer could be yes or it could be no-depending on what we consider a good thing.

Take for instance a tree in the back yard of the parsonage. Some time ago I ordered and planted a young tree that I had paid a small amount for. This tree came from a cut-rate nursery catalogue that I had received in the mail. I was intrigued by the description of this tree which was called a heart nut tree. The catalogue promised that it would bear abundant nuts at an early age. These nuts would be better tasting than the black walnuts and they would be easier to crack. Beside all this the nut meats were to be shaped like hearts.

Long story short, the tree grew nicely and it has begun bearing nuts (which look just like black walnuts, are still just as hard to crack and I can't tell what shape the nut meats are!) However, in the past few years it has had a good crop of nuts. This year is a bit different; the tree is loaded with nuts-more than I have seen before. You can't get too much of a good thing-so I thought until about 5 weeks ago. The heavy-laden limbs began sagging until they began breaking. As of today, about half have broken off or cracked under the load. In this case the abundance of nuts looks like a good thing but in the end, they have badly damaged this tree.

So also in our lives, the things that we might consider blessings: material things, abundant food, good paying jobs, extra free time, a bigger home, a new car, etc..... all can be considered good things-unless they over-burden us or cause us so many headaches and worries that we take our eyes off of God and quit trusting Him. When our blessings weigh us down or bring us to the breaking point-then we understand that you can get too much of a good thing. (Continued next page)

However, do not despair, there are some good things that we cannot get too much of. The good things consist of the love of God, His grace and mercy, the power of the Holy Spirit, the forgiveness of Jesus and the peace that He offers to us. We can never get too much of the hope that comes from God or the strength and fellowship that we receive as His redeemed children.

Remember what Jesus said of the Sermon on the Mount Matt 6:19-21

19 "Do not lay up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust destroy and where thieves break in and steal, 20 but lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust destroys and where thieves do not break in and steal.

21 For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also."

## Greetings in the Name of Jesus, in Whom we all belong,

### Ten Blessings of Foster Care, by Pastor Michael Salemink:

"The Gospel means we belong! We belong to our Heavenly Father. We belong because He creates, redeems, and calls each one of us. We belong to Father, Son, and Holy Spirit from fertilization to forever. And we belong to each other. All members of the body of Christ suffer together and celebrate together.

Sometimes foster children may feel like they don't belong to anyone. Abortion attempts to solve this difficulty with death. Fostering may result from brokenness, but it also provides opportunity for Gospel-motivated courage and compassion. Here are ten blessings of foster care:

- **1. Fostering can save a life**. A foster child faces the danger of not receiving the provision and care necessary for survival. Foster homes intervene in this emergency and rescue the little ones.
- **2. Fostering can preserve a family.** Foster care often offers space and assistance to parents encountering crises. It secures a stable context for their child until the parents can recover a healthier environment into which they may receive their little ones back for good.
- **3. Fostering can prevent abuses.** Many foster children have suffered interpersonal trauma. Removing them from such situations protects them from violence and danger.
- **4. Fostering can deliver the Gospel.** Christian foster families get to share the truth and love of Jesus Christ. They get to take part in God's miraculous activity of taking lost human beings as His own children.
- **5. Fostering can make a lasting difference.** Foster parents impact and improve the rest of the child's life. Their servanthood even benefits descendants by breaking generational cycles of dysfunction.
- **6. Fostering can mean receiving love.** A foster child shares his or her life and self with a foster family. And the training and support for foster families also form relationships and communities.
- **7. Fostering can lead to adoption.** Every child constitutes a gift and privilege from heaven itself. Nothing compares to the delight of a forever family!
- **8. Fostering can relieve and heal hurts.** A foster family's kindness helps soothe and resolve the emotional and physical wounds a foster child carries.
- **9. Fostering can draw families and marriages closer.** Shared sacrifice brings brothers and sisters together. Overcoming adversity together makes better parents.
- **10. Fostering can inspire and empower others.** Acquaintances, neighbors, and relatives may follow one foster family's example. They enrich their congregations, our communities, and even the entire country!" (LifeDate, Spring 2021)

"Oh, blest the house, whate'er befall, Where Jesus Christ is all in all! A home that is not wholly His—How sad and poor and dark it is! Then here will I and mine today, A solemn promise make and say: Though all the world forsake His Word, I and my house will serve the Lord!"

"Oh, Blest the House," Lutheran Service Book, #862

We know from our study of scripture all that the Lord did for Israel. He set them free from slavery in Egypt, and settled them in the land He promised to them. Yet although the Lord had done so much for them, they were still tempted to worship false gods. So much so that Joshua placed a challenge before them: "Choose this day whom you will serve" (Joshua 24:15).

Today we face a similar challenge, and as many choices. We are surrounded by other religions and other gods. Some people create their own personal religions. Some who claim to be Christians reshape their faith to match their own opinions. Others prefer to exalt science or a particular philosophy or worldview. Christian families are faced with raising children in a world that is as spiritually challenging as the culture of the ancient Israelites—if not more so!

In these times — and at all times — the Bible says that we should "give ourselves continually to prayer" (Acts 6:4). Prayer drives people to God—and God is ready to listen and answer. What a wonderful privilege so many families miss out on. Prayer and the study of God's word can unify and energize the family unit. It can be a reminder that we do not have to go out into the world without the power of God going with us. Through this direct contact with God, we can receive the serenity and security that will enable us to be a witness for Him in a dark and confused world.

The practice of prayer also equips family members to pray effectively amid the pressures of jobs, school, and the world at large. Prayer and scripture is the best way to prepare for whatever is in store for us in the critical and testing times of life. When difficulties come, we don't have to be dependent on the circumstances around us, but on the powerful, hidden resource within us—God Himself.

A family may provide the best of everything to their children—food, shelter, clothing, education, and loving care. Yet if the Lord Jesus is not present in the home, the living foundation is missing.

Just as Joshua reminded the Israelites of all that God had done for them, Christian parents and grandparents (and other Christians) have the privilege and responsibility to instruct children in the Word of God, to teach and encourage them to pray, and to remind them of everything that God has done for them in Christ Jesus. They need to know that their Good Shepherd laid down His life to save them, and that He now lives and reigns as their King. They can be certain that Jesus will keep them in His care and that, by God's grace through faith, they will live in His presence forever.

Joshua challenged Israel to worship God alone, and then confessed the firm foundation of his own household: "As for me and my house, we will serve the LORD" (Joshua 24:15). In the homes of families and individuals, in every Christian household, by the help of the Spirit of God, the same foundation is confessed: "Though all the world forsake His Word, I and my house will serve the Lord!"

PRAYER: Lord Jesus, keep parents and children in Your care and help them to grow in faith. Amen.

### PART TIME MUSIC POSITION


