The Women CyberSecurity Society (WCS2), a Canadian nonprofit dedicated to advancing gender equality in the security and tech sector, is thrilled to announce our collaboration with the National Council of Women of Canada in supporting Bill S-210—an essential legislative measure aimed at safeguarding children from online pornography.

At WCS2, we advocate for women’s and girls’ empowerment in the digital sphere and for their safety and protection online. Hence, we are proud to have contributed to developing an Open Letter endorsing Bill S-210. Under the guidance of our esteemed founder, Lisa Kearney, we conducted extensive research, compiled crucial findings, and built online platforms in English and French to facilitate organizational signatures supporting this essential bill.

[Bill S-210](#) proposes the implementation of an ‘age verification system’ akin to those used in tobacco, alcohol, and gambling websites. This measure is vital in ensuring that individuals accessing online content are of legal age, mitigating the risks associated with underage exposure to harmful materials.

Background of Bill S-210

Bill S-210, *the Protecting Young Persons from Exposure to Pornography Act*, is a Senate public bill that aims to restrict young persons' online access to sexually explicit material. The bill would make it an offense for organizations to make pornography available to anyone under 18 for commercial purposes. It would also empower a designated authority to take steps to prevent such material from being accessible to young persons in Canada.

The bill was introduced by Senator Julie Miville-Dechêne on November 24, 2021, and passed the Senate on April 18, 2023, after being studied and amended by the Senate Committee on Legal and Constitutional Affairs. The bill was then sent to the House of Commons, where it was sponsored by MP Karen Vecchio. The bill passed the second reading in the House on December 13, 2023, with the support of all parties except the NDP, which abstained. The bill was then referred to the **Standing Committee on Public Safety and National Security (SECU)** for further consideration.
