

### A Conversation About a True Brother.

#### James Walker Todd, Ph.D. Ed.

Dr. James W. Todd, 33°, an Illustrious Sir, as the 1990 Potentate of Alzafar Shriners, passed through the gates to dwell forever with God in heaven. Jim passed away on April 13, 2023. Jim was preceded in death by his parents, Morris W. Todd and A. Ruth Todd, a brother Morris F. Todd, and sister Carrie L. Peer. Jim was devoted to his maternal grandmother Maud Beatrice Holden, who, Jim always said, taught him almost everything in life he ever learned. Jim leaves to our earthly care his wife, our First Lady Faye L. Todd; children Elizabeth (Née Todd) and Timothy Culpepper and Jonathan Todd (Edward Welsh); grandchildren Benja-

min, Madeleine, and Jack Culpepper and Valerie and Kadin Todd Welsh; and his brother Duane A. Todd (Brandi).

Jim was born in San Antonio on August 16, 1948, and graduated from Robert E. Lee High School in 1966. Jim married his high school sweetheart, Faye, on August 16, 1968, at Trinity Baptist Church in San Antonio. That same year, he was called to active duty to serve in the 433rd Military Airlift Wing when North Korea illegally took the USS Pueblo in international waters. During his service, Jim

saw the world and made friendships that would last a lifetime. At twenty, he was one of the youngest loadmasters in the air force.

Jim owned and served as president of a custom picture and art frame company, Frame Tex, Inc. Jim then became co-owner and operator of a group travel agency, Incredible Journeys. Even after a successful run as a busi-



ness owner, being in business never satisfied Jim. His main drive was to be in service to his neighbor. After becoming one of the youngest Potentates ever to serve Alzafar Shriners, Jim earned a Master of Arts in Educational Administration from TSU (formerly Southwest Texas). He completed his professional goal with a Doctor of Education from Texas A&M University in College Station. First, Jim felt the draw to teach at MacAr-

thur High School. Then, as he improved himself in education, he found administration was his calling. He retired from the school district in 2012. It was then that Wayland Baptist University recruited him as an adjunct professor for the university. As was his nature, Jim continued upward to Director of Operations for the San Antonio area campuses.

I was honored to have called Jim my friend for over 40 years, an honor thanks exclusively to Alzafar Shriners. He was with us and served as our installing officer for this year's Alzafar Shriners slate of elected and appointed officers, which seemed so recent. We discussed our current presence,




then and now, when we were free of much of the persistent bodily pain we collected over the years. We laughed at ourselves back in the early eighties as we, tongue in cheek, berated our then-betters as old guys who had never heard of Rock and Roll.

As if yesterday, Jim and I discussed much of what our Alzafar was missing in the early eighties. We were in our early thirties and full of ourselves in our youthful exuberance. The Divan was not interested in our opinions in those days, but we tried. Jim and I proposed erecting five billboards on our 87-acre frontage, which at the time stretched from Sonterra to almost Blanco Road, I had sourced the billboards to be built in Mexico and exported with H-2 workers to be erected on our property for \$13,000.00 each. In the early eighties, each billboard would generate \$3,000 monthly in revenue. The Divan said it would detract from our

new temple. We then started to work on Alzafar membership. Jim called and said we needed to make more members from Laredo. I took on his challenge and toplined twenty-three new Shriners. I won the membership trophy, and the temple voted me a life membership (Bonus). We did our first circus

in Laredo with those new members. Jim then ran for the Oriental Guide and won. He earned it.

In Masonry, Jim was a member of Community Lodge #1201, Cibolo Lodge #151, and Davy Crockett Lodge #1225. Jim was enthusiastic about his Masonic and Shrine charitable work. He held many revered leadership positions of trust with Shriners Hospitals for Children, including the Scottish Rite Hospital in Dallas. For many years, Jim served as Chairman of the Board of Directors for the South Texas Learning Center, a unique place for a com-



prehensive Intervention for Students with Dyslexia in Central and South Texas. In 2000, he served as the District Deputy Grand Master for the Grand Lodge of Texas.

Jim and Faye found their spiritual home at the First Baptist Church of San Antonio (FBCSA) for 35 years. There, Jim was an ordained deacon who served with a big heart. He was called upon to serve on countless committees and co-

ordinate aspects of past capital campaigns. He was an ardent supporter of children and youth activities as his children came of age at FBCSA. He was an active teacher and director of his Sunday school class, always taking time to support those who needed a lift.

This Alzafar Unit competes annually against other Texas Shrine Shotgun Units at the Mid-Winter Meets hosted by TSSSA and the annual TSA gathering. You will


Allen "Bird" Ditmore, a Shotgun Unit founding member, provided the details for this historical account of our Alzafar Community for "Who

How about those pipes?!!

The Alzafar Highlander BagPipe band continues to grow and rebuild its ranks. Once a large group of Shriners, the group has lost members over time and now works to rebuild its band of pipers. It's an exciting time for us as we get ready to bring those pipes back to life. So; what's the story with these instruments anyway; you may ask. Well..

Bagpipes are from a class of instrument known as aerophones. These instruments use enclosed reeds which get fed to them constantly by a reservoir of air, which is the bag. This air supply bag is fitted under the arm of the piper, typically the left, and then fed a steady supply of Scottish breath through a wee blow pipe. The piper will keep the air moving by compressing the bag consistently like a bellows. Our highlander will then use his crafty hands to manipulate the chanter portion of the instrument to create a melody as the air passes through the device from the bag and through a reed within the chanter. The great highland bagpipe has three drones sprouting from the top of the bag which usually rest upon the piper's left shoulder. This is where you get the constant droning sound, the constant hum. Once a piper places the instrument upon his lips the air won't stop and neither will the constant hum of those sweet pipes.

To become a piper one must practice regularly, first beginning with an instrument that looks a little like the recorder you may have played in elementary school. It is however not a recorder but a chanter, a reeded instrument our would-be piper must master before he is given the privilege to start bellowing on a set of bagpipes. Even after he begins the pipes he will start with the drone holes on his bag blocked off as he learns the art of blowing through the blow pipe and compressing the bag and keeping an even flow of air going as he fingers out a tune on the chanter. It's a bit like patting your head, rubbing your tummy, chewing gum and reciting Shakespeare all at once.

Possibly first mentioned in the book of Daniel in the Bible (Daniel 3:7; NIV) the origins of the bagpipes is not known with complete certainty but through the centuries Scotland has without doubt made it their own. The Pico Mhor (Scottish Gaelic for Bagpipes), considered



an instrument of war, once announced the battle cry of Scotland in war. Still viewed today as an implement of war some churches will not allow it played within their walls. Now Bagpipes are most commonly played at weddings, parades, ceremonies and funerals. It is said that the bagpipe is the only instrument heard in heaven. It is often played at funerals as to lead a soul to the gates of eternity. I like to use mine to wake the neighbors.

BAG PIPE FUN FACTS: 1. Traditional Bagpipes are made of animal skin 2. A bag pipe can be heard 10 miles away 3. Pipes were outlawed twice in Scotland 4. You can't adjust the volume on pipes 5. Scotland the Brave is sometimes considered the Scotland national song and next to Amazing Grace one of the best known bagpipe songs 6. Bagpipe history is bloody with some songs being of patriotic victory and others of vengeful mayhem.



# Shriners at the Border: Brothers Helping Children May 14, 2023 Shriners Children's Texas

As the ambulance doors closed, nearly a dozen Nobles of Shriners International – from both Mexico and the United States – gathered closely around and silently formed a line, each man laying a hand on the side of the ambulance and resting a hand on the shoulder of the man in front of him. They bowed their heads and silently prayed for the safe transport and speedy recovery of the child inside, who would soon be on his way to Shriners Children's Texas in Galveston.

On Valentine's Day, 20-month-old Fernando was playing at his family's home in Coahuila, Mexico, while his mother was boiling a pot of water nearby to make tamales. What followed was an accident all too common in households with small children; the pot of boiling water tipped and spilled on him. His parents rushed him to the local hospital, where they learned that Fernando had sustained serious burns over 35% of his body. After getting him stabilized, the team at the local hospital suggested he go to Shriners Children's Texas in Galveston, the only verified pediatric burn center in the state of Texas.

Having never heard of Shriners Children's, and knowing it was across the border in Texas, Fernando's parents were worried about how they would get him there for the high-level treatment he needed. They didn't worry for long.

"The local hospital coordinated with Shriners Children's and arranged our travel to the border with the help of the local Shriners in Mexico and a group of Shriners in Texas," Fernando's mother, Valeria, said. "We had never heard of Shriners Children's before this, but Shriners in Mexico and Texas made it easy for us and made all the arrangements.

The Laredo Shrine Club, a club of Alzafar Shriners based in San Antonio, stands at the ready to coordinate with their brothers across the border in Mexico to transport patients.

"We work as a team across international borders to ensure safe travel for these kids," said Rick Reyes, Potentate of Alzafar Shriners. He praised the quick communication between Alzafar Shriners, the Laredo Shrine Club and their brothers in Mexico. For Reyes, the accomplishment spoke not only of their effective collaboration, but also to their shared compassion, friendship and collective willingness of spirit to help those in need. "All these attributes are

When Fernando and his family arrived by ambulance at the Juarez-Lincoln Port of Entry Bridge in Laredo, the Shriners were there to witness his arrival and pray over him. "We are incredibly grateful to have played even a small part in helping that family," Reyes said.

Once the family arrived in Galveston, Fernando received the highly-specialized care he needed for his burns, as well as compression garments to prevent further scarring. Fortunately, he did not need surgery or skin grafts, and after about 10 days, Fernando and his mother were able

to return home to Mexico with a great outcome, and to continue to heal.

"Having the opportunity to assist in any way possible, it goes a long way. That's what we do as Shriners," Reyes said. "We're wearing the Fez. That's the common denominator. Whether you're in America, in Mexico, or another country, you see that man wearing

# ALZAFAR BAND

Harold Clayton Lloyd, Sr. (April 20, 1893 - March 8, 1971) was an American film actor and producer, most famous for his silent comedies.

Harold Lloyd ranks alongside Charlie Chaplin and Buster Keaton as one of the most popular and influential film comedians of the silent film era. Lloyd made nearly 200 comedy films, both silent and "talkies", between 1914 and 1947. He is best known for his "Glasses" character, a resourceful, success-seeking go-getter who was perfectly in tune with the 1920's era America. His films frequently contained "thrill sequences" of extended chase scenes and dare-devil physical feats, for which he is best remembered today. Lloyd hanging from the hands of a clock high above the street in Safety Last (1923) is one of the most enduring images in all cinema.

Early Life and Early Roles

Lloyd was born in Burchard, Nebraska to James Darsie Lloyd (1865 - 1947) and Elizabeth Fraser (1869 – 1941); Harold's paternal great-grandparents were both from Wales. Young Harold was named for his paternal grandfather. Harold had an older brother, Gaylord (1888 – 1943), five years his senior. Like his younger brother, Gaylord acted in motion pictures, but his career was nowhere as renowned as Harold's. Harold's father was always dreaming up get-rich-quick schemes that ended in disasters. They eventually ended up in Omaha where Lloyd had his first acting experience in a local stock company. in 1912, his father, J. Darsie "Foxy" Lloyd was awarded the massive sum of \$6,000 in a personal injury judgement after being run over by a beer truck. Reportedly on the toss of a coin ("Heads is New York or Nashville or wherever I decided, tails is San Diego"), he and Lloyd moved west. Lloyd attended East High School and San Diego High School and received his first stage training at the School of Dramatic Art (San Diego).

Lloyd had acted in various vaudeville acts in theaters since boyhood, and started acting in one reel film comedies shortly after moving to California. He soon began working with Thomas Edison's motion picture company, and eventually formed as partnership with fellow struggling actor and director Hal Roach, who had formed his own studio in 1913. The hard-working Lloyd became the most successful of Roach's actors between 1915 and 1919. Although Lloyd's films were not as commercially successful as Charlie Chaplin's on average, he was far more prolific (releasing twelve feature films in the 1920's while Chaplin released just four), and made more money overall (\$15.7 million to Chaplin's \$10.5 million).

Lloyd did many of those dangerous stunts himself, but his career was not all laughs, however. In August 1919, while posing for some promotional still photographs in the Loa Angles Witzel Photography Studio, he was seriously injured while holding a prop bomb thought merely to be a smoke pot. It exploded and mangled his hand, causing him to lose a thumb and forefinger. The blast was severe enough that the cameraman and prop director were also seriously injured. Lloyd was in the act of lighting a cigarette from the fuse of the bomb when it exploded, also badly burning his face and injuring his eye. Despite the proximity of the blast to his face, he retained his sight.

In 1925, at the height of his movie career, Lloyd was initiated in Alexander Hamilton Lodge No. 535 of Hollywood. After his Third Degree, with his usual thoroughness and energy, he proceeded through both York and Scottish

Rites, then joined Al Malaikah Shrine in Los Angeles. He took his Royal Arch Degree with his father. In 1926, he became a 32<sup>a</sup> Scottish Rite Mason in the Valley of Los Angeles, California. As his movie work began to decline, he replaced it with ever-increasing activity in Masonry, especially the Shrine, becoming Potentate of the Los Angeles Temple in 1939. By the time he had stopped making movies altogether in 1949, he had become Imperial Potentate of the Shrine of North America, the first actor ever to be so recognized. He was installed into this prestigious position at Soldier Field in Chicago in the presence of a crown of 90,000 including then then President of the United States and fellow Shriner, Ill. Harry S. Truman, 33°. In recognition of his services to the nation and Freemasonry, Bro. Lloyd was invested with the rank and Decoration of Knight Commander Court of Honour (KCCH) in 1955 and coroneted an Inspector General Honorary. 33°, in 1965.

Lloyd died at age 77 from prostate cancer on March 8, 1971, in Beverly Hills, California. He was interred in a crypt in the Great Mausoleum at Forest Lawn Memorial Park Cemetery in Glendale, California.




