Pastor's Reflections

I have a cross stitch wall hanging that Kathy made for me that is hanging in my study here at church. The pattern/ saying is a familiar one: "God grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change; courage to change the things I can; and the wisdom to know the difference." Many people call this the Serenity Prayer. It was attributed to an American theologian named Reinhold Niebuhr. The fuller version of the prayer continues: Living one day at a time, enjoying one moment at the time, accepting hardship as the pathway to peace; taking as Jesus did, this sinful world as it is, not as I would have it; trusting that He will make all things right if I surrender to His will; that I may be reasonably happy in this life, and supremely happy with him forever in the next.

The full version of the prayer is one of the seven prayers I use during the week during my daily devotions. I find the term serenity title an interesting one. Serenity to me means peace and calm and the absence of conflict. That of course is not the case in life for any of us. All of us have had times as Niebuhr writes: accepting hardship as the path to peace. So many times I want to try to fix the hardships I encounter and have everything be all better. My experience has taught me that hardships help us to grow and mature. I have also learned that those hardships teach us about life, love, and God.

As we near Lent on February 22 we are reminded in the imposition of ashes liturgy on Ash Wednesday: Remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return. This is a reminder of the end all of us face. The Good News of the Gospel is that we do not face any of life alone. God has promised to be with us. The community of faithful servants in this church and others like it are with us throughout those struggles through their prayers and support.

The operative words in the first part of the prayer are ones that I haven't quite mastered, and probably never will. Those words of course are: **Accept** the things I cannot change – **Courage** to change the things I can – **Wisdom** to know the difference. Much of what I have learned from the prayer is accepting the things I cannot change and courage to change those I can. The courage to change things most always needs others in order to be accomplished. I have also found that more often than not lately I have had to accept the things I cannot change and move on.

Accept, Courage and wisdom of those three the last seems to me to be the hardest – Wisdom. Wisdom is such an elusive gift. Even Solomon who initially was gifted wisdom by God could not claim it in the end. Wisdom though it seems to me means waiting and listening. Wisdom needs patience to happen.

This Lent midweek we will be celebrating community each week. Every Wednesday in Lent we will seek to have the wisdom to discern community in different places and people. I pray you will gain some insight into wisdom.

Dear St. Paul Congregation,

I am happy to share two items of good news with you. The first one is that the new digital rehearsal piano for the choir room has finally arrived (the old Clavinova had stopped working; once digital pianos are 15 years or older, it is very difficult to find parts or even a repair person willing to come out). The new instrument is from the Yamaha Arius series and we purchased it from Music & Arts on Route 60, formerly Kerr's Music. (I have an Arius at home, too, so I can practice at night with a headset and not disturb the neighbors. It's a quality instrument.) The Music & Arts store manager Gary Wooten was very helpful and made us a good deal. It will be good to have a relationship with a local music store, in case we have need for repairs and/or musical purchases in the future. The new digital piano is portable and will be affixed to a dolly so that wheeling it around for outside services should be easier.

The second piece of good news is the announcement of a musical performance at St. Paul. If you are available and interested, please mark your calendars for Sunday, March 19, 2023, 5 pm for the spring concert of the Huntington Symphony Chorus. Jacob Smith, a Marshall music grad and Theatre, Choral, and Music Teacher at Spring Valley High School will conduct the ensemble in a mixed program featuring the Requiem by Gabriel Fauré, in addition to other choral works and art songs. The soloists will be Sarah Riddle (soprano) and Eric Brown (baritone). Jacob has told me repeatedly in the past that he thinks St. Paul has the most beautiful sanctuary in Huntington. I think this is a wonderful opportunity to connect with the Huntington community. The centerpiece of the program, Fauré's Requiem, is sacred, and you will recognize musical items that reflect our liturgy, like the Kyrie (Lord Have Mercy), Sanctus (Holy, Holy, Holy), and the Agnus Dei (Lamb of God).

Dear St. Paul Congregation,

January started off with a kickoff to CCC, LYO and Confirmation with a pizza party, learning about Jesus' baptism, reflecting on our own baptisms and playing bible bingo! We decorated large seashells with hearts, crosses and a dove on the outside and a picture of John the Baptist baptizing Jesus with a dove on the inside. We discussed the importance of water and how shells were used since they were readily available by the river or seashore. These kids get it! They have all been baptized and whether they remember their actual baptism or not, they know they were cleansed with water and that Jesus is in their heart and they must continue us to attend church and praise God daily. The Dove is a reminder of the Holy Spirit that moves through all of us to share in the Good News of our lord and Savior Jesus Christ. We continue to learn about discipleship and how to be fishers of men.

Creigh Pemberton showed a fine example of discipleship by joining our group and teaching us how to make playdoh. She was wonderful with the CCC group and it helped them to understand the importance of sharing our gifts with one another. The kids made the symbols of baptism that we had learned about- water, heart, cross, seashell and dove. They also enjoyed using nativity cookie cutters to make Mary, Joseph, angels, stars, donkeys, camels, sheep, shepherds and the wisemen. We discussed the importance of being a disciple and being a child of God. We are meant to share our gifts and share God's word and love with others.

How can we all be fishers of men? We must share more. We must share love with one another. We must share our gifts. We must share in kindness and show God's love and grace with others by helping one another. We made fishing poles with three fish attached. Each fish represented someone the kids would share Jesus with through the next week. They could help someone, pray for someone, show someone love or just simply tell someone that Jesus loves them. If we could all do this a little bit more each day, wouldn't we share Jesus' love and message just a little bit more? These kids are praying freely and from their hearts. We are focusing on action and showing love to all we meet. The timing seems appropriate since February is the month celebrating love. We will continue to learn stories of the bible and share God's love by taking action in our world. Our LYO group will participate in community service, cooking & serving at the Ronald McDonald House and a social activity of bowling soon. We look forward to sowing the seeds of love with one another.
