Pastor's Reflections

One of the disciplines I try to do every day is taking a moment of my day to be in prayer. I have a selected set of prayers that I use throughout the week that I have found very meaningful. One of the prayers I use during the week is a familiar one to many of you. The prayer is called the Serenity Prayer. I have written the full version below.

I think a bit of explanation of the how, why and who of this prayer will be helpful. Reinhold Niebuhr wrote the prayer. Mr. Niebuhr was a German – American reformed theologian. He was born to German parents and raised in Missouri; he grew up being a part of the church his father pastored. He eventually became a pastor and has been described as the most influential American theologian of the 20th century. Mt Niebuhr eventually became a professor at Union Theological Seminary in New York City.

He initially wrote the prayer for a professor friend. The prayer is meant to encourage its readers in challenging times and to be clear about reminding ourselves that God is God, and we are not. The prayer is widely used in AA meetings to help people who are in recovery.

I have to say that I have been praying this prayer much lately. That is because of the "stuff of life" that somehow takes a hold of me and brings me down. I like the prayer because it reminds me that there are things in life I cannot change. There are also things in life that I can change and then probably the most important is the line: "the wisdom to know the difference." So often I do not have the wisdom I need to let things go and fight/ work for things I think I can change.

Are we living in challenging times? It seems to me that life has been in so much turmoil these days. With a new variant of COVID- 19 coming every several months or so. What is a person/ church/ community/ government to do? Masks? No masks? Singing? No singing? Go into the grocery store or pick up? Gather with family or not? So many questions so much information! So much hyperbole and almost panic in some cases thanks to the 24/7 news cycle.

Aren't we always living in challenging times? It seems to me whether we are in a pandemic or not these are challenging times. The gospel of Luke tells the story of the birth of Jesus. It was a challenging time. The emperor wanted a census taken. This was so the government could get more taxes from people. Everyone had to go to the place of birth. Mary and Joseph head out, problem is Mary is pregnant and Herod wants to get rid of the baby he has heard about through his sages who will be king. Talk about a challenging time! Thankfully, God guides the couple to a place where baby Jesus is born and the rest as they say is history.

January begins a new calendar year. In January we will be bombarded with gym memberships, at home exercise equipment and diet commercials. In January, the church celebrates Epiphany. In Epiphany we will hear texts from the Bible about how God in Jesus is "being revealed." What is God revealing to you these days? Is it a time to pick a prayer like the Serenity Prayer

and praying it regularly every day? Is God revealing to you that it is time to get back to the gym and start eating better? Is this Epiphany God calling you to take more opportunities in your day to be quiet, silent, and practicing more deep breathing?

Whatever it is please remember God is with you. Please remember that Emmauel – God with Us – Jesus has come into our world, amid challenges, struggles, and joys and celebrations.

May God give you the strength and courage to meet each day with: "serenity to accept the things you cannot change, courage to change the things you can, and the wisdom to know the difference."

Amen and Alleluia!

My student James Newsome will play for the service on Sunday, January 2. He is a senior at Marshall University, pursuing a B.F.A. in Piano Performance, and he is also taking secondary organ lessons with my colleague, Dr. Johan Botes. I am sure you will enjoy his playing.

I will be back on the organ bench at St. Paul on January 9, and the first choir rehearsal of 2022 will be on Wednesday, January 12 at 7 pm. Please feel free stop by or talk to me, if you are interested in singing or otherwise contributing musically. Pending the CoViD situation, state mandates, and church council decisions, I am planning on holding weekly choir rehearsals on Wednesdays at 7 pm, as usually.




FROM JENNY MURRAY:


I hope that everyone had a blessed Christmas and New Year It's really hard to believe that we are headed into year three of the Coronavirus pandemic. I would like to commend Pastor Mackey, the council and congregation for always choosing to put the health and safety of others first. SPLC has done a phenomenal job during this pandemic, and I couldn't be more proud of everyone that has been making the tough decisions related to COVID.

As a country, we are getting closer and closer to ending this pandemic. Vaccines are now approved for everyone 5 years and older, and boosters are approved for everyone 16 years and older. I'm sure we've all heard of the new variant Omicron. The good, bad and ugly of Omicron is that it doesn't seem as virulent (potent) as Delta, but it is more contagious. The CDC continues to gather data about the Omicron variant. We have the tools to fight Omicron in vaccines, masks and testing.

We are seeing a spike in cases again in the US, and community transmission is in the red. The chart below represents total US cases from June 16, 2021 through December 22, 2021.



The cases in Kentucky (purple line), Ohio (green line) and West Virginia (blue line) are mimicking the spike in the entire country. The chart below represents KY, OH and WV cases.



The most common question that I get as a Healthcare Provider is "When should I quarantine?" It seems that this changes from time to time, and it can vary from institution to institution, especially with schools and workplaces. The below information is from the CDC and was updated on December 9, 2021.

Quarantine if...

You have been in close contact (within 6 feet of a COVID+ person for a cumulative total of 15 minutes or more over a 24 hour period), unless you are fully vaccinated

Stay home for 14 days after your last contact with a COVID+ person

Watch for fever, cough, shortness of breath, or other COVID symptoms

Try to stay away from people you live with, especially if they are high risk

If you are fully vaccinated, you do NOT have to quarantine unless you have symptoms (but you should get tested 5-7 days after your exposure and continue to wear your mask)

You may also be able to shorten your quarantine...

After 10 days without testing

After 7 days after receiving a negative test result on day 5 or after

Please do not donate items that contain peanuts.




Our condolences to Ingeborg White and family on the death of Bill White. Bill passed away on December 4.

PRAYER VENTURES FOR JANUARY 2022

- **1** New Year's Day Ask God to ground our aspirational resolutions and ventures in the promise that, through Christ, we will live in grace and freedom, knowing we are not alone in our endeavors.
- 2 Give thanks that, through Jesus Christ, we perceive God's grace, truth, creative might and will for humankind.
- **3** Slavery and Human Trafficking Prevention Month Throughout this month, pray for those victimized by human trafficking, which disproportionately affects women and girls. Pray for an end to this global tragedy, and pray that all who suffer its abuse, injustice and oppression will find freedom, healing, support and safety, especially in our communities of faith.
- **4** Ask God to bless the studies, service and travel of college and university students involved in "J-Term" experiences. Pray that they will grow in faith, wisdom, knowledge and understanding of the world, and that their experiences will inspire their vocational discernment.
- **5** Praise God for attending to the needs of humanity through us, utilizing our diverse gifts and generosity to serve our neighbors in need, everywhere.
- **6** Ask the Spirit to make us bright lights in our communities and world, sharing the good news of healing and hope in Jesus Christ and demonstrating God's unbiased love through our actions, words and influence.
- **7** Thank and praise God for restoring our relationships as children of God, so that we can live with faith, hope and freedom as new creations and siblings in Christ.
- **8** After a two-year pause during the COVID-19 pandemic, the ELCA's Young Adults in Global Mission program is getting ready to send volunteers out into the world again. Pray that the Spirit will guide the prayerful reflection of young adults as they discern how to respond to God's call to service and ministry with our global companions and churches.
- **9** Pray that everything we do during our baptismal journey in this world will point to God, who has redeemed us and redirected our lives through the birth, life, suffering, death and resurrection of Jesus our Savior, teacher, guide and friend.
- **10** Continue to pray for healing and unity in our nation, and ask God to draw us closer to our neighbors, especially those we perceive as different or opposed to our perspectives, beliefs or values. Pray that we will grow in understanding and respect for one another and will work together for the well-being of our communities and neighbors in need.
- 11 Give thanks to God for our companions and partners in ministry, especially the Lutheran World Federation, World Council of Churches, National Council of the Churches of Christ in the USA, Lutheran Ecumenical and Inter-Religious Relations Network, and our full communion partners.
- 12 Give thanks for the daily, life-giving work of the Spirit, which creates, strengthens and sustains our devotion to Jesus Christ. Pray that the Spirit will renew us and empower us to live as people of faith, gathered and equipped to love and serve our neighbor, bear hope into the world and share the gospel with all people.
- **13** Join our global companion churches in prayers of thanksgiving and hope for the scholarship awardees of ELCA International Women Leaders, which supports the education of women around the world through seminars, south-to-south exchanges, incountry study programs, and degree programs at ELCA colleges and universities.
- 14 Praise God, who is mighty and eternal, the creator of all that exists and the source of our blessings and strength.
- 15 Pray for our neighbors who are struggling with or recovering from COVID-19, discovering the long-term effects that will impact their lives or grieving the loss of friends or loved ones. Continue to pray for the well-being and renewal of health care workers dedicated to serving others in times of illness and vulnerability.
- **16** By turning water into wine during the wedding at Cana, Jesus taught us how deeply God is engaged in every aspect of our human life our joys, worries, celebrations, problems and sorrows. Praise God for knowing us so well!

- **17** Martin Luther King Jr. Day Remember in prayer the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and his bold work, ministry, vision and sacrifice, which revealed all people to be children of God deserving respect, opportunity, equality and freedom from unjust laws. Ask God's help in righting the injustices that continue in our nation and throughout the world; pray for the wisdom, humility, courage and persistence needed to welcome all people into our church, society and institutions.
- **18** Week of Prayer for Christian Unity Throughout this week, pray with our siblings in Christ from diverse cultures, traditions and confessions around the world for the unity of the church, so that, together, we will shine a bright light of hope, healing and good news on our troubled world.
- **19** Give thanks for the variety of gifts manifest among our siblings in Christ and for the unity we have in Jesus, which enables us to accomplish together much more than we could on our own.
- **20** Thank God for our special relationship with the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), a full communion partner with the ELCA since 1997. Pray for the church, its members and its leaders, that together we will find new strength and resources for the work of sharing the gospel and serving our neighbor, especially in these challenging times.
- **21** "How precious is your steadfast love, O God! All people may take refuge in the shadow of your wings" (Psalm 36:7). Thank God for surrounding us with love and mercy on which we can rely.
- **22** Pray that the Spirit will inspire and lead people to respond to God's call to service through ELCA Global Mission as it seeks missionaries, volunteers and interns to walk alongside our global companions.
- **23** Give thanks that Jesus is our true Savior, light and hope the Son of God, who lived among us and continues to dwell with us through the Spirit.
- **24** January is when outdoor ministry leaders begin recruiting staff for our summer camps. Pray that the Spirit will inspire young adults to respond to the call to serve in our outdoor ministries across the country and to share their faith and enthusiasm with campers of all ages, backgrounds and abilities.
- **25** Ask God to help us understand that force, vengeance, wealth disparity and dominance over others are inconsistent with God's justice and power, and that these are revealed to us through Jesus' life and teaching, which exemplify humility, compassion, generosity, service, love without prejudice and advocacy for neighbors in need.
- **26** Rejoice and give thanks to God for uniting us in the body of Christ, which welcomes our diverse gifts, experiences, questions, complexities, ethnicities and cultures.
- 27 Pray for victims of violence and their families, that God will ease their pain, suffering and grief; pray for those who commit murder or other acts of violence, that God's grace will transform their hearts and lives.
- **28** Pray for our leaders and congregations, which create opportunities for us to study Scripture, share our questions and thoughts in conversation, and affirm one another's gifts for living the gospel, serving our neighbor and growing the church.
- **29** Pray for the ministry and impact of Lutheran Services in America, a nationwide network of 300 Lutheran social ministry organizations that serve 6 million people each year, using the gifts and skills of 250,000 paid staff and 150,000 volunteers.
- **30** Pray that our faith and confidence in Christ will embolden us to be public bearers of good news, hope and wholeness for all people, even in the face of intimidating challenges, criticism or skepticism.
- **31** Pray that the Spirit will help us understand and practice the qualities of love that God has shown us and that the apostle Paul commends to members of the church in Corinth: "Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth" (1 Corinthians 13:4-6).
